

Important to Travellers.

NEW YORK, March 5. The passenger agents and railroad managers, who have been discussing the provisions of the interstate commerce bill, have arrived at the understanding that there will be practically no change in the immigrant rates, and no change of percentage allowed to steamship companies regarding mileage rates. There will be no discrimination except as to ministers. Theatrical companies, and shows of all kinds, will be obliged to pay full rates Excursions will remain about the same except as to long journeys. The most important change will be as to second-class rates, which will be made uniform throughout. This will result in a marked increase in rates over some of the routes.

MAUNA LOA.

The Sandwich Islands Volcano Which Is in a State of Eruption.

Mauna Loa, the burning mountain of the Sandwich Islands, perhaps the most extraordinary volcano in the world, after a season of comparative quiet, suddenly broke out in January last with an eruption far greater than has been witnessed in this generation, this event preceding by only five weeks the appalling and destructive tremors on the Mediterranean. On the night of Jan. 16 a great flame suddenly sprang up from the mountain summit and lighted all the island and adjacent ocean. In a few hours this light disappeared, only to be followed by thirty-six bours of almost continuous trembling of the earth, exciting general terror. The record showed 383 separately defined shocks, with lighter tremors between. Then on the 18th came one terrific shock, and immediate v after it the whole side of the mountain also the timber line seemed to burst, and from the fissure gushed an immense river of lavwhich swept all before it in its progress to : sea, twenty miles away. Yet so rapidly die the flery mass cool that it was two days reaching the water. "Sunday night at o'clock," writes a lady who witnessed it, "the cry was raised, 'The mountain has burst!' and stepping to the door we saw the flery current moving down the westers slope. We were struck dumb, we were facinated at the awful sight, though it was :

Vouna Loa (meaning great mountain) is a er part of me isia . ! of H. watt. The vol-the lava thrown out in a fluid state at many eruptions has flowed at a very gentle slope, and the soil formed from its detritus is extremely fertile. Yet for long intervals between these wonderful eruptions the mountain is so quiet that travelers can descend into the main crater. The largest eruptions occur on the sides of the mountain toward the southwest, and in consequence the island is being slove extended in that direction. The terminal crater, called Makua weo weo, is circular and 8, 00 feet in diameter, but from it extend two fissures, which increase the greatest length to 13,000 feet. It is fortunate for science, and probably for humanity, that the late emption was witnessed by many intelligent observers, and that scientists with proper apparatus are now on the spot.

SPORTING GOSSIP.

Lon E. Myers, American Sprinter-The Suburban Handleap. [Special Correspondence.]

NEW YORK, March 3. Lon E. Myers, the American sprinter, and Harry Hutchens, the English representative, both of whom are at present in Australia, recen'ty ran a race of 240 yards. Hutchens, gr - ly to the surprise of everybody, succe of in brooking the tape about two feet in advance of Myers. Had the contest been at 75. 1.0 or even 125 yards I should have expected this result, but at 240 yards I have always supposed that Myers was well nightin-

WERE THEY BOODLERS?

One View of the Purity Agreement Signed by the Political Parties.
