

COMMERCIAL MATTERS

A GREAT RAILWAY DEAL.

NEW YORK, March 9.—The Times and nounces that the control of the B. & O. RR. Co. has passed into the hands of Alfred Sul ly, of New York. Negotiations with President Garrett had been in progress for some time yesterday, and late into last night there were important meetings relative to the transaction. To-day Sully will be able to show a written contract, by virtue of which Garrett puts him in possession. The combination acquired includes the Central railroad of New Jersey, the Philadelphia & Reading system, the Richmond Terminal and Richmond & Danville properties, the East Tennessee, Virginia, and Georgia lines, the Central railroad of Georgia, and the B. & O., and of all the properties there is to be made one great trunk line, with 16,000 miles of track. There is no longer any question about how the B. & O. road is to get an entrance to New York. The Jersey Central and Reading lines give that. With the control of the B. &. O. RR. Co. goes also the control of the B. & O. Telegraph Co. It is considered probable that Garrett will continue in the presidency. Some of the strongest and most influential monied interests in this country and Europe, with Sully inhisnew venture, are about to become affiliated with him. Calvin S. Bryce and Gen. Thomas, of the East Tennessee, Virginia, and Georgia syndicate, were invited into Sully's confidence some time ago, as was John G. Moore, head of the Wall street firm of Moore & Schley, Drexel, Morgan. & Co., Brown Bros. & Co., Winslow, Lanier & Co., and other influential bankers are quoted as cognizant of the deal and interested in it. Jay Gould has been for some days in close communication with a representative of Sully, but it may be stated authoritatively that as yet Gould has been admitted to no share in the deal, and if there is to be any settlement of the telegraph war the terms of that settlement are all yet to be arranged. Gould expects to see Mr. Sully personally to-day. A despatch to the Tribune from Baltimore

says it is believed that arrangements are practically completed by which Garrett will sell his interest in the Baltimore & Ohio RR. The understanding is that Garrett has acquired the stock held by the J. S. Hopkins university (about 15,000 shares) together with those previously owned by the Garrett family, and with whatever amount of stock additional may be necessary to give the control of the property to the syndicate, headed by Alfred Sully, Gen. Samuel Thomas and Calvin S. Bryce, the leading spirits in Richmond terminal. It is understood that the syndicate, when it comes into possession of the property, hopes to negotiate a contract with the Pennsylvania railroad by which the line built by the Baltimore & Ohio, between Baltimore and Philadelphia, will be sold to Pennsylvania, and the contract with the Western Union Telegraph company by which it will acquire Baltimore and Ohio telegraph lines. As an additional consequence of the change of control of the railroad the company's express business will be absorbed by one of the great express companies of the country. The object of these sales will be to relieve the company of a heavy floating debt, stated by some as high as \$15,000,000, and hardly claimed by anybody to be less than \$9,000,000 or \$10,000,000 which has been run up in the course of Garrett's management. The amount of the Baltimore & Ohio consolidated stock, now outstanding, is \$14,792,566, of preferred \$5,000,000. The city of Baltimore owns 3,250 shares, and has seven directors in the board. The state of Maryland holds large interest, and has four directors, while the individual sto-kholders are represented by twelve directors. The understanding is that Garrett has been given the option on a controlling amount of the Baltimore & Ohio stock at a price not yet

General Samuel F. Thomas said last even ing: "I am not in a position to talk about this transaction, for it has not yet been consummated. Negotiations have made fav ourable progress, and have reached a stage where I think there is reason to expect that the wildest of hopes of those who are aiming at reconciliation will be realized."

MR. BEECHER'S COURTSHIP.

Great sympathy is expressed for Mrs. Beecher at this time. It was forty-seven years ago that Henry Ward Beecher, a student at Amherst College, discovered her worth. It came about in the usual way.
