

#### COMMERCIAL MATTERS

THE KINGSTON MARKETS.

KINGSTON, March 9. - The mild weather has caused a drop in the price of butter. Packed butter only brings 15c to 18c per lb., and fresh butter 20c to 22c per 16. The highest prices reached during the winter were 23c for packed and 28c for fresh. Lard is worth 10c to 121c per fb.

Eggs are going down in value, and dealers are not offering more than 16c to 20c per dozen for the freshest. The supply is more than the demand.

Cheese is selling at 12c per fb, by the box, or 15c by the pound when cut. The cable quotations remain at 64s per cwt.

There has been little change in the price of vegetables, quoted last week. Beans are worth \$1 per bushel, and onions \$1.25 per In fruits apples are \$3 per barrel, and

dried apples are very scarce at 5c per lb. Lemons and oranges remain at 20c to 25c per dozen. A few boxes of strawberries, from the south, have been shown at from 50c to 60c per box.

Flour, farmers', is quoted at \$2 to \$2.20 per cwt., the choice grades running up to \$2.60 per cwt. Buckwheat flour, now used, is selling at \$1.75 to \$2 per 100 lbs.

Honey at 10c to 121c per fb., can be bought either strained or in the comb. New maple sugar is expected next week. Barrelled salt is worth 90c. Fine salt is

quoted at \$1.25 to \$1.30 per sack, and coarse salt 75c per sack. Little barrelled pork is handled here, but it is worth \$21 per bbl, a big jump owing

to the corner created in Chicago. Hams 11c to 13c per lb.; bacons, 10c per lb.; farmers' sides, 83c per fb.; fresh pork 7c to 8c per Beef is going off slowly. Fore quarters are selling at 3c to 5c per fb., and hind quar-

ters at 41c to 6c per 1h. Butchers pay \$7 per cwt. for the carcases of western fat cattle. Frozen meat is selling at from Sc to 10c per to. by small lots, and western meat at 10c to 12c per lb. Lambs are quoted at 7c per lb, by the carcase.

Few fowls can be bought. Chickens are worth from 75c to 90c per pair, and turkeys bring from 124c to 15c per ft.

Hay is rolling into the market from Wolfe Island and other points, and is selling at \$7 to \$8 per ton.

The farmers have brought in considerable wood during the past two weeks. It is worth from \$4 to \$4.75 per cord.

The elections are over, the excitement has almost subsided, business has again settled down, and still the grain outlook has not materially improved. Two cliques have been organized in Chicago, one has cornered May pork and run the prices from \$11.875 per barrel up to \$21 per barrel ; the other clique have taken hold of May wheat at 78% per bushel, and carried it up to 86%c, with every probability of advancing it to \$1 per bushel. Such cliques have a very depressing and disastrous influence, causing the losses of millions of dollars, distress, the breaking up of happy homes, poverty to overtake prosperity, ruin to supplant luxury. and all simply because a few unprincipled monied men can band together and by their combined wealth buy up all the visible wheat and pork in the United States, lock it up and then manipulate prices to suit themselves. Such is the influence of money when held by heartless men. Although wheat and pork have been manipulated as above stated, it has had no influence on our market for the simple reason that our dealers refuse to respond. The supply and demand remains as before and nothing war rants the unnatural rise. Barley is not warranted; it is flat and unasked for, and may so remain. No malster will buy Canada barley at 10c to 15c above Illinois and Wisconsin barley, and the buyers know it perfectly well. Unless the duty is taken off Canada barley the farmers had better drop the raising of the cereal entirely. Barley under the present circumstances cannot improve in price. Peas have dropped twopence in ten days in Liverpool, and the outlook continues very blue. Barley, corn and oats will be brought into competition with peas for cheap chop feed, consequently peas cannot advance in prices here unless Liverpool dealers desire and the chances are ten to one against such a thing. Oats and rye are now asked for and with the unprecedentally large stock in store, all over the country, are likely to remain as flat as dish

THE KNIGHTS OF LABOUR.

Cardinal Gibbons on the Situation Archbishop Tachereau's Position.

ROME, March 10. - In an interview to-day Cardinal Gibbons said his and manager Straniero's reports, although published through a wonderful stroke of newspaper enterprise, were in the first instance confidential. The cardinal said: "I am, and ever shall be, the enemy of plutocracy, of soulless corporations and men. The Catholic church will take the side of the weaker against the stronger in this instance. There is no question of the secret societies. Mr. Powderly, and many other chiefs, are good Catholics. Above all I wish it known that there is no essential divergence between my self and the archbishop of Quebec on this subject. The French Canadian society is not that of the United States, and perhaps the French ecclesiastic or administrative mind is more inclined to take alarm than we, and to see revolutions behind every hedge. America is quite able to take care of itself and the interests of the American citizens. It will be time enough to consider all sorts of side issues when they are raised."

#### FINANCIAL CRASH AT HAND.

An Authority on the Subject-The Difficulty of the Case is Increasing.

NEW YORK, March 10. The World's Washington says a high government official said yesterday: "There will be a financial stringency very soon, which, in my judgment, will lead to a panic. There are constant accumulation of money in the treasury without any form of relief possible after the first of fiscal year. This is certain to be followed by a crash. It may be tided over to next fall, but in my judgment the event is not over two months away. If congress were to be assembled to morrow the crash would come before they could get through wrangling over a measure of retief. The failure of the deficiency bill also adds to the complications of the present financial situation. Whether this financial stringency can be headed off until next fall depends very much upon whom the president places at the head of the treasury." The correspondent says that this gentleman is not an alarmist. He is a serious, grave man of affairs, who understands the financial situation thoroughly
