SPORTING GOSSIP.

The Coming of Beach, the Australian Sculler, to America—Other Matters.

 NEW YORK, March 7.
 The Turf, Field and Farm is authority for the statement that \$10,000 was the amount offered William Beach, the Australian, champion sculler of the world, to come to this country to row Haulan and Gaudaur. I very much doubt that any such offer was made, but even if it should really prove to be true, and Beach should come over here and defeat both Haulan and Gaudaur, which I feel sure he would not be able to do, it would prove nothing, as Teemer could with very little trouble outrow either of the Americans, and, I think, the Australian as well. Beach realizes that he is getting past the time of life when an oarsman should be in his prime, and will make no matches with first class oarsmen unless he has things arranged to his own satisfaction.

Evan Lewis, the "Strangler," and Joe Acton, the "Little Demon," will wrestle their second match, best three in five, catch as catch can style, at Chicago, March 14. In the coming event the conditions will be slightly different from those which prevailed at their last meeting, three points now being necessary to constitute a fall. As I have before stated, Acton, if he wants to (and he is generally "out for the money"), will win almost as he pleases. He is the one man upon whom the "strangle" cannot be made to work. Lewis, by the way, wrestled Jack Carkeek a few nights since at Minneapolis, and the latter was unable to do anything after the first bout, owing to Lewis' "strangle" and "hang hold," which practically put him hors de combat.

Dominick McCaffrey may impress some few of his ardent admirers with the belief that he is not afraid of any of the heavy weights, but I will confess that I am of the opinion that Dom always wants both ends and the middle of the string. For instance, it was announced a few weeks ago that Dominick would shortly fill a week's engagement at the Conique, Philadelphia, meeting all comers. The engagement begins to-night, but in looking over the names of those who are to meet McCaffrey I have failed to find one who should not be a simple "marker" for any first class heavy weight in the country. The two best men whom he is to meet are Fallon, the young "Brooklyn giant," who will be a good one when he is a little older, and Denny Killen, brother to Pat.

Pat Killen verified my prediction made a few days ago when speaking of the Killen-McDonald ten round fight. The battle occurred on Friday night, at Minneapolis, and true to his word, Killen knocked out McDonald (Duncan C.) senseless in the second round. He would serve Patsy Carliff, the "Windbag," the same way with a few more rounds as leeway. Patsy knows this, however, and fights shy of the strong man from Duluth.

The League meeting which is to be held to-day at the Fifth Avenue hotel, this city, will effectually dispose of the much mooted question of the eighth club. There seems to be a very general impression that Indianapolis will be the fortunate city. I do not positively assert it, but I will venture the opinion that Indianapolis will not "get there," even if Kansas City should also fail to do so.

FLORIDA'S NEW SENATOR.

Hon. Jesse J. Finley Named in Place of Jones.

Hon. Jesse J. Finley, the newly appointed senator from Florida, is a native of Tennessee, but resident for forty years in the state he is now chosen to represent. Though 64 years of age he is still strong mentally and physically. He has had a strangely varied career as lawyer, soldier, judge and congressman to fit him for his new duties.

J. J. Finley was born Nov. 18, 1812, in Wilson county, Tennessee, and volunteered for the Florida Seminoles war early in 1836. Chosen captain of a cavalry company, he served with honor in that capacity through the campaigns of 1836-37. Admitted to the bar in 1838, he removed to Arkansas, where he was soon after elected to the state senate, but his property and domestic interests compelled his return to Tennessee before his term as senator expired, and he soon located in Memphis in the practice of his profession. In 1845 he was elected mayor of that city without opposition. The next year he volunteered for the Mexican war, and was chosen captain of an infantry company, but the regiment was not accepted, as the state's quota was full. He therefore removed to Marianna, in west Florida, and resumed the practice of law. Here he was again chosen state senator, and afterward served several years as circuit judge, in which position he won a high reputation. In 1862 he resigned his judicial position, volunteered for the Confederate army, was made a captain and then colonel of the Sixth Florida regiment, in which position he served actively under Gen. Kirby Smith. In 1863 he was made general of the Florida brigade, in which capacity he served with honor to the end of the war, being wounded at Resaca and Jonesboro. After the surrender he resumed the practice of law at Lake City, Fla. In 1874 he was elected to congress as a Democrat, obtaining his seat after a contest. In 1876 he again received a majority; his opponent, however, was given the certificate by the returning board, and Mr. Finley again obtained the seat after a contest before congress. He was re-elected to the Forty-seventh congress, receiving 13,165 votes to 11,953 for his Republican opponent. Thus he brings to his new position in the United States senate a rare and valuable experience as a legislator and judge.

The Liquor Code of Turkey.
 A common impression prevails to the effect that the Turks, among their other virtues, number that of sobriety. This cannot be literally true, for our late minister, Mr. Cox, has been investigating the matter. The Turks have laws upon the subject of drunkenness and its punishment, and this is one of the clauses: "Intemperance is proved either by admission of the person accused, or by witnesses who have seen him in the act of drinking. The flavor of wine from one's breath is not a sufficient proof; he may have eaten quinces, which give the same odor." Of course, every man who is fond of the bottle will lay it on quinces. It is possible that quinces supply in Turkey the place of clover in American bar rooms. Very few men will admit to a drink, even when their tongues and legs become hopelessly tangled. In view of the punishment provided in Turkey for the offense, it is presumed that quinces have to bear a heavy burden. "Punishment for
