



A Horrible Place-A Graphic Description

of a Visit to It-Enough! KINGSTON, March 10. - (To the Editor): was startled the other day by such a ghastly and revolting account of what may be witnessed within the limits of our city that I resolved to verify the facts. The scene was the nuisance ground at the western end of Johnston street, and accompanied by a friend, I strolled thither on Wednesday afternoon. Before we passed the last houses on the street our nostrils were assailed with a horrible stench. I have been through chandleries, knackers' yards, and rubber factories, but they were ottar of roses to this. They say that in Cologne, that city of sweet perfumes, there are thirty thousand obnoxious smell. Even a slight variety as in Cologne would have been grateful, but here the breeze carried on its dank breath nothing but the foul heavy steam of corruption and decay. Protecting our nostrils we reached the veriest charnel field ever beheld in a civilized com munity. It was not a Golgotha, for although the picked and bleached bones whitened the ground, and to most persons such a sight has an appalling effect, yet the repellant sensation was swallowed up in disgusting contemplation of the festering scraps of flesh and tumuli of rotting garbage which almost concealed the more cleanly relics of death from view. Close by lay the body of a horse, which, however, shapely in life, now, through the combined action of sun, wind and rain, had swelled to obnormal proportions, rendering the hide so tense that my friend suggested a change of base, lest the pent-up gases should rend the mighty carcase asunder and bespatter us with putrifying fragments. As yet it was untouched by dog or bird, save where the eyeless sockets shewed that some crow had selected what to the corvine tribe is the daintiest delicacy. Describing a detour we secured the wind in our backs and entered the precincts of this Kingston aceldama. Greater objects of horror met our gaze. The disjecta member of the dead animals lay thickly where they had been carried by the dogs until surfeited with their horrible repast. "Just fancy," said my friend, "how many a pet dog must be fondled after a long absence by his kind master and mistress, after participating in this ghoul-like feast. If I only thought my Neptune had been here, much as I value him, I would shoot him. I could not bear the sight of him." One magnificent coal-black Newfoundland especially attracted our attention. He staggered to his feet in an imbecile attempt to welcome us. It was in vain. His legs refused to sustain him, and he rolled helpless ly over beside the hideless deacon calf on which he had been preying. (Sic.) His enormous bulk of body and attenuated legs showed he must have been a constant boarder, for who knows how long? Doubtless the snow and rain pools served him for drink, so he needed not to quit his quarters. Whether caused by the motion or not I do not know, but he seemed suddenly seized with a violent spasm. His agony seemed so intolerable that we wished for a weapon to end his torment. But we had seen enough, and we hastily struck out for Johnston street. Even on our way, though, we per' ceived that the time-honoured adage of 'Dog will not eat dog' has its exception, as sometimes we saw a lean, gaunt, mangy cur feasting on a more plethoric brother, who

had fallen a victim to his carnal appetite. Surely, thought I, we have seen the worst of this business, but I had reckoned without my host. Two thirds of the way across ; several little white objects were seen scurrying around the body of a horse. They were a litter of white pigs, which had taken refuge inside the cadaver and which they alternately used as a meal or a dwelling. Alarmed at our approach, the little monsters started for a neighboring building, which, we are told, contained one hundred porkers, but not until their cry of distress had brought upon us their infuriated mother. Adieu to that scene; we had a surfeit of nausea for one day. - EXPLORER.
