

#### COMMERCIAL MATTERS.

THEIKINGSTON MARKET.

KINGSTON, March 16.—This has been a very quiet week, and one without any change in the value of market produce. Meat remains in the same state of dullness. The butchers are not making any purchases and the farmers are not killing their cattle. From \$4.50 to \$6 per cwt. is naid for beef by the carcase. Sheep and lambs are rated from \$3.50 to \$5.50 per head. Veal is expected upon the market in the course of the next few weeks.

In Montreal at the cattle market business was fairly active and the prices offered were: Good to prime milkers from \$40 to \$45; medium to fair \$28 to \$35, and common small cows from \$20 to \$25 each. Calves sold at from \$3 to \$6 each, according to size and condition.

Butter has remained steady at 20c to 22c per lb., and eggs are bought at 15c to 18c per dozen. There is plenty of old butter and packed eggs that cannot be sold with any readiness.

Vegetables, fruits, fish, and fowls all remain at the figures quoted last week. The cheese market remains unchanged

the cable quotations standing at 64 shillings per cwt.

Just now there is some interest in the horse market. There is a fair demand in the United States and for some time past a great many breeding mares have been taken across the ice. No duty is exacted for this class of stock. Several dealers have, however, got into trouble because the government hold that breeders must not be sold and the importers have been disposing of them Seizures have been made in consequence. Then English officers are here to secure remounts for the army, and this fact will tend to increase the value of equines. Horses for farm purposes are worth from \$75 to \$120; fair roadsters from \$100 to \$140, and fancy drivers and saddle beasts from \$125 to \$160.

The grain market is very quiet, and the prices quoted by the dealers are: Barley, 40c to 45c per bush.; peas, 50c per bush.; wheat, 70c to 75c per bush.; oats, 25c to 30c

per bush; rye, 40c to 45c per bush. The grain section of the Toronto board of trade has issued resolutions asking farmers generally to discontinue the use of Mensury. Russian, or Imperial varieties of barley, because these grades do not find favour with American malsters and brewers. Heretofore, owing to the superior quality of the barley grown in Canada, the farmers have been enabled to compete successfully with American growers in the markets of the United States, even with a duty of 10 cents per bushel against the Canadian grain. The farmers are also asked to have more care exercised in the selection of red winter wheat seed. It should be well matured and not mixed with white winter wheat, as the mixture, although producing a sound, healthy grain, makes it unfit for grading as red winter wheat, and, consequently, deterior ates its value.
