T E LAST PENALTY.

A Female Admirer of Longfellow Hanged Publicly in Liverpool.

LIVERPOOL, March 16.—The public hangman executed here his namesake, Mrs. Berry. What Mrs. Druse was to the United States, Mrs. Berry was to England. She was convicted of poisoning, with sulphuric acid, her eleven-year-old daughter for the purpose of obtaining £10 insurance money. She was also charged by a coroner's jury with poisoning, with tincture of arope, her own mother, so that she could secure about £200 of insurance money. No one doubts that Mrs. Berry was guilty, although she died protesting her innocence; and the last words she said were to ask Heaven to forgive the doctor "who swore my life away." On the table in her cell were a bible, a prayer book, Longfellow's poems and a large number of letters. In speaking about her child she said: "Do you know that beautiful poem of Longfellow, 'Resignation'? That poem expresses my feelings as regards poor Edith." Then she took up the book and began:

There is no flock, however watched and tended
But one dead lamb is there!

She then read the whole poem with an eloquence which, with its surroundings, her solicitor said was truly awful. She called his special attention to the line "There is no death! What seems so is transition."

and said she should like to have that placed on the gravestone of poor Edith, her daughter.

The solicitor introduced the question of the presentation of a petition for her reprieve, but she said: "I am quite resigned. I have little to live for. Those whom I loved best are already gone. I look upon death now as five minutes' journey by train, and when I get out of the train at the other station the first one to meet me on the platform will be my daughter Edith."

The drop was from the level pavement of the yard into an eight foot bricked pit, causing instant dislocation of the neck. The scaffold, except for the hanging rope, looked like a large wellhouse erected on the ground.

At the last stroke of the hour the woman and a small procession emerged from the prison into the yard. Her nerve broke, she went into hysterics, and fell fainting into the arms of two female warders. They supported her to the padded drop, where she revived long enough to declare: "I am innocent."

Only the short sentence from the service for the dying was read, and the murderer was dead. Death was instantaneous. Close to Mrs. Berry's body lie in the same kind of graves the remains of Catharine Flannigan and Margaret Higgins, who three years ago were executed in Liverpool, for poisoning Higgins' husband to obtain insurance money from the same benefit society as that in which Mrs. Berry's mother and daughter were insured.

POLITICAL POINTERS.

Compensation for Working Men—The Result in Algoma.

Premier Mercier has removed Benjamin Trudel, chief of the Quebec river police, from his office.

It is also rumoured in Ottawa that the seat for Queen's, N. B., will be declared vacant and a new election held.

Hon. Mr. Fraser will move in the legislature for a special committee to enquire into the question of workmen's compensation for injuries.

Mr. T. Farrow denies that he wrote the anonymous letter to the *Globe* stating that the tory party would not follow the lead of Sir Charles Tupper.

At the recent election for the provincial assembly in Queen's County, Nova Scotia, the tory candidate, Mr. Collic, lost his deposit.

Those who wonder at the delay in obtaining complete returns from Algoma forget that the superficial area of Algoma is greater than the balance of Ontario, which elect ninety-one members.

The election deposits of Messrs. Perley and Robillard, the conservatives elect for Ottawa, were made in a similar manner to that of Mr. King in Queen's, N. B., by an other gentleman than the authorized.

To remove any disqualification under which Mr. Cargill, East Bruce, might suffer on his election being gazetted, he was granted a small office, thus vacating his seat. The writ for the new election will be sent out at once.

There is every prospect of a lively row over the assistant clerkship of the Quebec legislative council. There are two claimants for the position and both are here asserting their pretensions. One of them is F. Desaulniers, M. P. for St. Maurice, who was appointed by the late Ross government through Speaker La Bruere; the other is A. Desaulniers, ex-M. P. for Maskinonge, who claims by right of appointment from the Mercier government when they cancelled La Bruere's nomination. The affair is resolving itself into a struggle between the speaker of the council (prompted by the opposition) and the government. Mr. Desaulniers, of Maskinonge, the tories claimed as their supporter, when it was believed he was elected to the house of commons.

Sudden Death.
William Campbell, of Broughan, was found on Thursday last in a dying condition, not over twenty-five yards from his own door. It seems he had been down to the post office the evening before, some six miles from home, and left there about 10 p.m. for home and appears to have arrived at the place above mentioned. When seen by his wife he was on his knees with his hands against a fence. Being assisted into the house he only survived a very few minutes afterwards. He had not been well for some time previous, and it is supposed he took a bad turn on his way home. He leaves a wife and two young children to lament his sudden demise.
