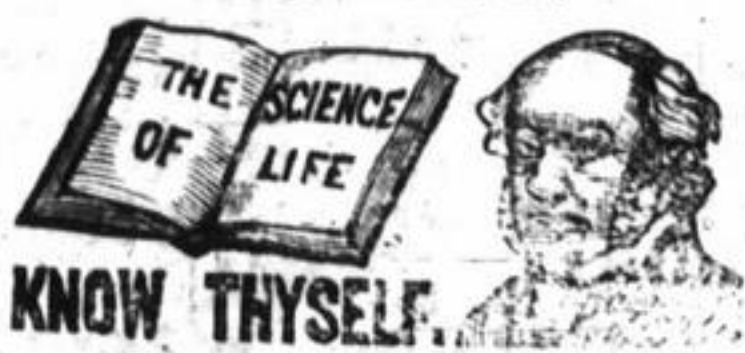

BASE-BALL PARAGRAPHS.

The Business Beginning to Boom Again - A Great Amalgamation.

The Detroit club have signed Briody, the catcher of the defunct Kansas City club. Roach, the new left-handed pitcher of the New York club, has arrived. Syracuse is negotiating for the use of the Atlanta, Ga., grounds for a week in April. Dave McKeough, Utica, left for Cincinnati on Saturday. Mike Griffin also left for Baltimore.

McCormack, the pitcher, will probably be sold by Chicago to either Detroit or New York.

Utica will start the season with six pitchers, namely, Hafford, Pendergrass, Bainswine, Byrnes, Reardon and Harvey.

Mallory, who pitched a few games for the Hamiltons last season and then went to Port Hope, has signed with Wheeling, Va. Manager Wright, of the Philadelphia club, has found a new second baseman named Lee Woodwell. He played with the Des Moines, Ia., club last year.

Charlie Sweeney, who played with Syracuse for a time, has been married in California to a sister of Jim McDonald, who played with Oswego in 1885.

It is stated that a plan is on foot looking to the amalgamation of the national league and the American association into one powerful league composed of twelve clubs.

Anson has an idea that his Chicago team will be as strong as ever this year, and feels confident that the Chicago will again win the championship under his management.

A baseball man has invented a rubber home-plate, across which players' ananities may be flung with safety. If somebody will now invent a rubber umpire a delightful reliance will be imparted to the "kicking."

Treasurer Billings says the Boston directors never make a division of the profits and as a consequence they have \$90,000 in the treasury. This money they now propose to expend in making their club the best in the world.

Von der Ahe, of the St. Louis Browns, is in a terrible predicament. He ordered his players to report in St. Louis on March 10. Of the fifteen reserved by him only five put in an appearance. The world's championship series with Chicago begins April 7, and it seems very much as if there was a "combine" among all his crack players to force him to pay the exorbitant salaries which they demand.

The Detroit salary list for the approaching season is, in round numbers, \$47,000. Brothers and Richardson get \$4,000; Rowe and White, \$3,500 each; Bennett, \$3,000; Baldwin, \$2,800; Hanlon, \$2,200; Thompson, the big right fielder, \$2,100; Getzein, \$2,000; Dunlap, \$3,500; Ganzell, \$1,800; Jimmy Manning, the left fielder, who had an arm broken on the Polo grounds last Decoration day, \$1,900; Smith, pitcher, \$1,800; Conway, \$2,200; Twitchell, \$1,200; Gillen, catcher, \$1,800; Shindle, \$1,600; Watkins, manager, \$2,000, and secretary Bob Leadley, \$1,000.

POLITICAL POINTERS.

Blake to Remain Leader - The Results of the North-West Elections.

Mr. Cargill will be re-elected by acclamation for East Bruce.

Mr. Colter, the counted-out M. P. for Haldimand, will enter a protest against the election of Dr. Montague.

Aldric Ouimet, M. P. for Laval, and C. J. Coursol, M. P. for Montreal East, are candidates for the speakership.

It is reported that Sir John Macdonald will visit Washington to confer with Secretary Bayard on the fishing question.

Competent authorities claim that Mr. Mercier will be sustained in the Quebec assembly by a majority of twelve.

The Canadian Gazette foreshadows the retirement of Sir John Macdonald from the premiership in favor of Sir Charles Tupper.

Hon. S. H. Blake, now in Ottawa, denies that his brother intends resigning the liberal leadership. Hon. Edward Blake is now in Georgia.

Davin had 322 majority in Western Assiniboia. Mr. Hardisty will probably capture Alberta, and Macdowall is certainly elected for Saskatchewan.

It is said that Sir Hector Langevin is to be made leader of the government in the senate; that Mr. Chapleau will get the leadership of the Quebec contingent.

The dominion cabinet intend to consider the Manitoba disallowance question, so that Manitoba may know at once what the dominion government's policy regarding Manitoba railways is. Norway has promised to grant all railway charters applied for in the legislature.

In the event of all the old members seeking re-election in British Columbia being returned, and adding the four new members from the North-West Territories, there will be 89 members in the new house of commons who were not in the last house. Of the 85 outgoing members 63 were supporters of the government and 22 of the opposition.

TALKING ABOUT SAM JONES.

What His Income Is - A Clergyman in London on Sam's "Insults."

A remark made by Rev. R. J. Treleavan on Sunday evening in London is occasioning comment. In announcing a parlor social he said: "I suppose a number of you will be surprised at this announcement, coming as it does in the face of what Sam Jones said on Friday morning. But if you believe all that he says you are bigger fools than I take you to be. With all his faults, I love him still; yet I do not endorse all he says. If I thought that God called me to preach to what he called you - 'hogs' - I'd step down and out of this pulpit now and forever. But I say to you in this respect, as I would of a prayer meeting, 'Come thou with us and we will do thee good.'"

Rev. Hugh Johnston writes to the Mail denying that Sam Jones received \$10,000 for one month's work in Boston. Messrs. Jones, Small, Maxwell and Excell, received together \$3,000 for their services in Boston. The receipts were in excess of the expenditure, but a large amount was given to the People's church, in which the services were held, a church struggling with a heavy debt.

LETTERS TO THE EDITOR.

Needed Improvements. KINGSTON, March 16. - (To the Editor): Now that the spring is coming on we may hope to see some of the street improvements, already passed by our council, shortly begun on, and some of them are a necessity and would add greatly to the beauty of the city.

Where is there a more beautiful drive or walk than out King and up Barrie street? It is true that after leaving Union, on the way up the latter, the buildings are hardly as ornamental, but a great many nice structures have recently been erected, noticeably the store and buildings attached of Mrs. Adair, and even up the continuation of William street or Agnew's Lane the laudable example has also been followed. On Earl, between Barrie and Division, slightly buildings and terraces are rapidly being erected, and such would be the case on Young were the proposed widening of that street carried out.

In common with many others who own property there I am anxious to erect substantial dwellings in place of the poor tenements now disfiguring it, and which now structures would not only remunerate me and them but tend to beautify and adorn the city. Until the march of improvement talked of, and passed by the council begins, we are unable to take the initiative, not knowing how or where the proposed widening will take place.

Let our municipal representatives push the matter forward by early spring, so that we can get to building, and I venture to affirm we shall before fall make the short block between Barrie and Division streets a credit to that part of the city.

As it is the only street leading off Barrie, which requires enlargement in that section, there should be no delay, nor should we be kept until late in the year before we can secure mechanics at reasonable, if any, wages.
