

THE BUFFALO FATALITY.

The Fire in the Richmond Hotel-Some of the Startling Incidents.

Buffalo, March 19. - Some thrilling scenes occurred at the burning of the Richmond hotel on the fourth floor. M. C. Beggs, of New York, slept close to the elevator. When he heard the fire indicator he and one Devine got out on a ledge at the corner of the building. They saw a fire escape. They went back into the room and found another door leading into a hallway. It was locked. It would not budge. The fire was getting hotter and the smoke was sunocating. Finally they broke a space through the upper panel and crawled through. The small hallway commanded a fire escape and they made their way to the ground. Mr. Devine was unhurt. Mr. Beggs cut his right hand badly breaking the window. A large piece of flesh was gouged out of the wrist so that the pulse could be seen to

A. M. Merriman, of Toronto, represent ing Cox & Co., heard the indicator and cry of "fire," and ran to the parlour. The heat was terrific, and he was badly burned about the head, face and hands. The stairs to the lower floor were gone. "Let us run through the kitchen," cried a woman, and she started, but fell, overcome. She was lost. The rest of them escaped to the balconies and were lowered to the ground on ladders.

Mary Witt, housekeeper of the Richmond, was on the fifth floor when the fire occurred and made her escape with Mrs. Mann, The smoke drove her to a window. She hung to a ledge until rescued by the firemen.

H. B. Rumsey, of New York, is not expected to live. He was on the fifth floor, and as he rushed out of his room he ran against Mamie Mann, the little daughter of Mrs. W. J. Mann. He grabbed the girl and jumped to the roof of Bunnell's museum. He picked his way to the edge of the building, and both were brought down a ladder by the firemen. Mr. Rumsey was burned about the shoulders, face and arms, and inhaled the flames While getting out of the window he buried Mamie Mann in his night gown, and protected her from the flames. He was raving loudly in delirium, crying for the little girl.

Edward Whalen, travelling salesman, of Newburg, N.Y., fourth floor, heard the shrieks of the people in the halls. Opening his door he saw smoke and flames. He jumped to a shed below. Besides sustaining several fractures he is also terribly burned about the face, hands and feet. His legs and feet are burnt almost to the bone, and some of his fingers are burnt off. If his life can be saved his legs and several fingers will have to be amputated.

W. J. Mackay, insurance man, from Niagara Falls, third floor, in his flight fell through a skylight on the second floor and landed on a floor below. He managed to get out on the balcony and to the street on a ladder. His left arm and back are bruised.

One man, mad with terror, leaped from a third story window and was picked up on the stone sidewalk on Main street a mangled corpse. A man stood scantily clothed, at the fourth story, alternately surveying the flames behind him and the operations of the tireman raising the Hayes extension ladder. He was apparently busy calculating his chances. Up went the ladder and finally reached him just as the fire was bursting out of the window. He decended deliberately, without the sign of fear. At an upper window was one of the domestics. She leaped upon a fireman on the ladder, and caused him to lose his balance, but he hung on with one hand and caught the girl around the neck, holding her firm until he could regain his equilibrium, when he slid down the ladder to the ground.

Hugo V. Altschul, New York, assisted a number of women from the burning building. He then made his own escape by leaping from one building to another until he reached the street.

Clinton Bidwell, Pittsburgh, made a rope of the sheets of his bed and was badly scorched in his descent, but will recover. The total loss by the fire wil be \$400,000.

Buffafo, N.Y., March 19. - Firemen are searching the ruins of Richmond hotel fire wherever they can find them cool enough. The body of a man, burned to a cinder, was found this morning. It was not recognized. Henry B. Rumsey, one of the badly injured, died this morning.
