



KINGSTON, March 18.—(To the Editor):
A short time ago I noticed an article in the Whig, from a hotel keeper, complaining of the handicapping he experienced from shebeens and licensed grocers. Let me inform your correspondent that his part of the community is not the only one which suffers at the hands of the latter. We, the other grocers, compete also at a disadvan-tage with them. I do not object to the selling of liquor by them so long as it is done in the quantity prescribed by law, but when it comes to the glass "behind the boxes," whereof hotel-keeper complains, I know that in cases not a few, the purchaser receives an inferior class of groceries that he would not accept at a temperance store, and that for these stale goods and the two cents of indifferent liquor he imbibes he is mulcted in a sum of at least ten or fifteen cents. So long, however, as these groceries carry on this illegitimate traffic, so long must honest legitimate trade be injured thereby, and though "good wine needs no bush" in many cases an inferior article is preferred for the sake of the accompanying dram. This hotel-keeper may see that he has not the sole grievance in this clandestine violation of the

I think, however, he might have included others in his indictment. What about the licensed houses where, by no possibility, a traveller can secure either a meal or a bed, and where, perhaps during the inspection visit, a few articles of furniture are hired for a short time to fulfill the conditions and then returned? Has hotel-keeper no griev-ance here? It would appear to me they monopolize all the large easy profit, and leave to the others the least lucrative branch of the trade and all the drudgery of meals, beds, etc. -GROCER.

A Work for Spring.

TORONTO, March 19. - (To the Editor): In some recent letters, advocating the necessity of planting trees for shelter, the value of rows of evergreens as shelter to the most exposed sides of farms has been especially touched on. I would like, with your leave, to mention a method which I have seen adopted for this purpose with great success, at a time of year now rapidly approaching.

In the experiments I am aware a time has been chosen when, after the frost was out of the ground, it had, during a cold | can get night, frozen again to the depth of an inch or so. There having been plenty of young pine trees standing near, in the edge of the bush and in pasture fields, a number of men were obtained, so as to finish the job before the ground should again thaw; trees chosen about six feet high, and the earth cut round them with a sharp spade, so as to leave a circle about eighteen inches across. These then, when lifted, the slight frost above holding it altogether, came up with a circular mass of earth and roots two to four inches deep. They were carried at once and set in their places and the gaps filled with fresh earth. The loss in some hundreds of trees was not one in the hundred. If the chance spoken of be not obtained, it is better, for regular planting, to wait till the middle or last of May, or the first or second week in

There are, all over the country, in openings in woods and in fields, many thousands of young evergreens of proper size to move, which it would be extremely valuable to obtain and plant out along the north or most exposed sides of the farms. They are much better for the purpose than deciduous trees, as they give shelter the whole year round, and will be found especially valuable in winter, changing for the better, it has been well remarked, the whole climate of the farm. A couple of days given to such work at the right time would be found the best investment possible. - Yours, etc., R. W. PHIPTS.

THE CONVICTION QUASHED.

A Magistrate Refused to Testify for Fear of Breaking up a Court.

The somewhat celebrated case of the Queen vs. Sproule has been finally decided, by the conviction being quashed without costs. It will be remembered that the license inspector laid a complaint against Joseph Sproule, of Odessa, in October last, for a violation of the Scott act. The case was tried before magistrates H. S. Davy and I. F. Alysworth, and a conviction ob tained. The defendant subportaed one of the magistrates as a witness but the magistrate refused to leave the bench to give evidence, on the ground that the bench would be broken up and that both magistrates must be sitting and acting together throughout the trial. On this and other grounds the defendant applied for an order miss to quash the conviction, and after a number of adjournments the matter was finally argued last month. The court held that the magistrate was bound to give evidence and that he need not have left the bench to do so. This settles a much disput-
