THE SCIENCE SCHOOL.

The Board of Trade Advocates Its Loca-

tion in Kingston-Its Reasons. The members of the board of trade held a meeting in the council chamber last night and expressed themselves regarding the school of applied science. In one resolution the board declares that "Kingston is the most suitable place for such an institution. Such a school would be of incomparably greater public benefit in Kingston than in a city without a university, colleges, or students." The school was desirable for instruction in the sciences relative to mines and minerals, (in view of the mineral resources of the district), as well as to agriculture. A petition was arawn up for signature by the members. In it the board recerred to the high reputation of Kingston as an educational centre, and the co-operation of the citizens in building up Queen's university, the Royal medical college, the Ladies' medical college, and other institutions of learning, and the growth of these had been a great benefit to the eastern part of the province. These institutions were the result of the private liberality of a large proportion of citizens. They were flourishing, and attended by several hundreds of students. A school of practical science would be of great benefit to Queen's university, and rice rersg, and could be maintained here at less cost and in greater efficiency than elsewhere. Eastern Ontario was interested in the proposed school, and the government were urged to locate it in Kingston.

#### GREAT FLOOD IN DAKOTA-

A Very Large Tract of the Countries Lying Under Water-Great Damage.

BISMARCK, March 21. - The gorge at Sibley Island is still intact, despite, the use of dynamite. The scene here is desolate and dreary. The river is still over six miles in width, the gorge at Sibley Island holding water to the highest mark that it reached yesterday. All of last night a swinging light was seen in the woods, and several vain attemps were made to send a rescuing party thither; the light was a signal of distress from a settler who, it is learned this morning by looking through a field glass, has been on top of this house since the rising of the waters, swinging a lantern in the hope of calling and securing help. His house is completely surrounded by water and is two miles from the shore of the new made stream, and is almost afloat. Two rescuing parties were sent out this morning and have found several families on the roofs of their houses. Field glasses are being used with good results, as numerous settlers have been discovered, some of them perched on floating timbers.

The worst is coming. The great rise at Fort Buford is now half way here, and will reach this point some time to-night. This will make the highest water ever known in these parts, and unless the gorge breaks at Sibley Island the city of Mandan will be in danger of annihilation. Little Heart River flows into the Missouri just below Mandan, and should ice in this stream break to-day or before the Buford rise arrives the entire surplus water of the flood will be backed into Mandan.

The high trestle of the Northern Pacific railroad is wrecked. Bismarck is the terminus of the Northern Pacific, Yesterday's passenger train, with its load of people, bound for the Pacific Coast and intermediate points, lay on the side track here all night, and will not be able to leave for several days. Renewed efforts to break the gorge at Sibley will be made, but it will be a waste of dynamite. The gorge consists of six miles of solid ice, wedged into the bottom of the river and piled to a height of thirty feet. Rescuing parties have not returned and there is the greatest anxiety over the result of their journey. All the mail routes are blocked. A stage starts for Fort Yates this morning with a load of passengers.

St. Paul, March 21.—Bismarck specials say that the river is rising an inch an hour, having already passed the high water mark of the flood of 1881. All the low lands are inundated. The only houses flooded on the Bismarck side are a few squares back. The only method of communication between the town is Via Chevenne and Ogden.

The Boston syndicate property, including the flour mill, some 50 residences and an elevator, shops, and everything on the south of the track, is submerged. On the Northern Pacific the trains are running through to Manden from Portland.
