EMPEROR WILLIAM.

TWO SCENES IN THE LIFE OF GERMAN'S RULER.

All Deutschland Celebrating His Birthday This Week—How the Aged Sovereign and His Helpmeet Appear at Their Present Advanced Time of Life.

All Germany is this week celebrating the Emperor William's birthday, and the aged sovereign is the recipient of many tributes of esteem not only from members of his court and nation, but also from other European potentates.

The engraving of the emperor and empress that is given presents a very good idea of their present appearance, although it is understood that his majesty has become a trifle more stooped and in some other ways shows greater traces of his extreme age than is indicated in the picture, which is from a photograph taken a year or more ago.

The other two pictures illustrate two very important scenes in the emperor's life—one showing him as a boy in 1808 looking out of a window at Kenigsberg and the other showing him looking out of the same window, as king of Prussia in 1871. His emotions upon these two occasions must have been very different, but he could not have felt that certainty as to the future when crowned king of Prussia that he did when a few years later, and after Sadowa, he was chosen emperor of Germany. For in 1861 he had yet to learn whether he could win the affection of his people or not. Till that time he had been only a "soldier without congenial occupation, a prince of marked unpopularity." When he was made emperor he had already made a conquest of the hearts of the Prussians.

Emperor William has been on the throne now twenty-six years—a reign of only average duration if measured by the lapse of time, but one into which more has been crowded than all that occupied the years of two or three of his immediate predecessors. He was a soldier when Napoleon was banished to St. Helena by the battle of Waterloo. The number of those who were fighting men at that time and who still survive is small indeed, and it is worthy of note that one of them is the ruler of a great empire.

In these days of progressive republican principles royal personages are usually considered as mere figureheads, without much personal force or individuality. And it has often been said that to Bismarck, much more than to the emperor, Germany has owed its present strength and position among European nations. But it should not be forgotten that the emperor has always been in the field himself whenever there was fighting to be done, and that he selected Bismarck for a political adviser and representative at the same time that he chose Moltke to be at the head of his army. And it should also be remembered that no matter how much genius they have shown in the administration of the important matters entrusted to their charge, they have conformed their conduct to the general lines laid down for them by their royal master.

And no one, however much he may dislike the emperor's policy, can fail to admire the vigor, his strength of purpose and his unswerving fidelity.

SPORTING TOPICS.

Baseball Gossip—Something About Peter Kemp, the Australian Oarsman.

[Special Correspondence.]
NEW YORK, March 21.
A contemporary reports that Spalding stated that he was recently offered \$5,000 by Billings of the Boston for Clarkson's release. This is scarcely probable, however, as the handsome Chicago pitcher is not nearly so effective as formerly, and \$5,000 ought to buy a first class man.

Peter Kemp, the Australian oarsman, should forever be disqualified from rowing with reputable men, if the following account of his carryings on in his recent race with Neil Matterson and Stansbury, furnished by an Australian correspondent, be true. He says:

In the final heat of the outrigger race Matterson, scratch; Kemp, 4s., and Stansbury, 4s., competed. After rowing a short distance Matterson got up to Kemp and attempted to pass him on the inside. This Kemp would not allow, nor would he a second time. Neil then sheered right out to the outside and was passing Kemp easily. Peter, however, deliberately pulled out also, the result being that Matterson fouled Kemp in his own (Matterson's) water, and held up his hand. As it was on a lake, however, and round an island, no umpire or other official could follow. Neil had asked him to let him pass each time he came up to Kemp, but the latter would not, so on the boats coming in contact Neil tried to shove himself clear, when Peter deliberately struck his hand through Matterson's boat, and upon Matterson putting his hand through the canvas of Kemp's boat, the latter struck Matterson a heavy blow in the back. By this time Matterson's boat was rapidly sinking, and he had to swim to the shore through a lot of thick weeds. Meanwhile Stansbury and Kemp rowed in first and second, and upon being asked where Matterson was, Kemp said he hoped the fellow was drowned. Matterson managed to swim to the shore thoroughly exhausted. When sufficiently recovered he proceeded to the shed where the boats were kept, and upon seeing Kemp remarked, "You were a coward, Peter, to treat me in the manner you did." Kemp then in a brutal manner struck him right in the nose, knocking Matterson down like a bullock, and upon Charley Matterson running into the shed, he was struck at also by Kemp, but fortunately was not hit. A regular uproar took place, but eventually all proceeded back to Goulburn, when several clergymen and other respectable gentlemen gave evidence of the cowardly assault, and the matter will come before the courts in Sydney. Neil called upon me and gave me those particulars, which are corroborated by independent witnesses. Neil's nose is broken and crooked, and his eyes blackened, so that you would scarcely recognize the handsome young oarsman that was so recently with you. Great sympathy is felt for him, and the clubs are going to disqualify Kemp for life.

On the second day of April, on the Pacific slope, the question of supremacy between two of the fastest trotters in the country will be definitely decided. Oliver K and Harry Wilkes will trot best three in five heats to harness for a stated purse of \$10,000. Harry Wilkes is, of course, a slight favorite in the betting, but his supporters find no difficulty in finding takers for all the money they care to wager. I would not care to make a positive prediction of the result of the race, as the animals are very evenly matched, but I am inclined to think that Oliver K will be landed the winner if he goes to the post in the prime condition he is now reported to be in.

The Danforth-Barnes fight for the featherweight championship will probably occur on Thursday night of this week.
