

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

### ALLEN AND THE SCOTT ACT.

Another Critic at Work-Evidence That the Scott Act is Not a Failure.

The utterances regarding local option in Canada, to which Mr. Grant Allen recently gave expression in the Pall Mall Gazette, have called forth a rejoinder from Mr. W. Canning, of Moss Side, Manchester. Writing to the Manchester Guardian, that gentleman says:

"Under the above heading you quote today from an article contributed to the Pall Mall Gazette by Mr. Grant Allen. statements of that gentleman are so general. ly hostile to the evidence of well-known competent witnesses that it provokes no surprise to discover that they are also hostile and contradictory to one another. The fact is forgotten that a local option act is enforced in localities where it is adopted, and where not adopted it is not enforced, and does not prohibit. The enforcement of a purely local act in Manchester cannot affect the population of York, and if it be true, as he tells us, that crowds of people from the surrounding districts go to Kingston to drink, the fact that they are compelled to charter trains and excursion steamers and seek "a square drink" at a distance, is abundant evidence that the act adopted in their own localities prohibits effectually there. It has succeeded when it has secured local prohibition. Would Mr. Allen regard it as evidence of success if those so determined could buy and sell drink under an adopted prohibition law? They are compelled to flee like Jonahs from before its face, and that is to him evidence of its failure. Prohibition prohibits, therefore he thinks it is not a success.

"He tells us that the people who go to Kingston, and there drink to excess, would but for the act have remained in their own village and drunk only "as much as was good for them." The zeal with which these people charter trains and steamboats, and travel to a distance "for no other purpose on earth then to get drunk," is to him a proof that they would not get drink if it were made easier for them to do so. Of course! And if the laws against burglary were only removed Bill Sikes would cease to go forth at nights "for no other purpose on earth" but to commit burglary. He has discovered that it is more difficult for sober citizens to get a quiet glass then for the other sert of citizens to indulge in spasmodic drunken orgies. Those who sell drink are punished with heavy fines and imprisonment, and they of course prefer to sell to offence and increase their prospect of punishment. It is the law again! He rejoices as a friend of human liberty that local option prohibition has, as he says, failed. Does he know that local option is local liberty to settle communal affairs? And yet he would deprive the people of this power and replace it in the hands of their rulers. I fail to see why a magisterial decision is more favourable to human liberty than a popular one. It is useless to follow his statements further. There is ample evidence to combat his general conclusion that the local option in Canada has failed."

### POLITICS OF THE DAY.

Principal Grant Condemns the Tactics of Party Leaders and Party Press.

HALIFAX, March, 22. - Mr. J. W. Carmichael, ex-liberal M.P. for Picton, and a leading member of the Presbyterian church, last week published a letter in the Presby. terian Witness, which alleged that Rev. Dr. Grant, at a general assembly meeting charged that "the government was responsible for every drop of blood shed in the north-west rebellion." Principal Grant publishes a characteristic reply, saying that he made no such charge, but said : "We had been guilty of a national sin, and if we did not repent worse would befall us. The mere fact of turning the government out of office would be questionable repentance." Principal Grant continues : "He also quotes from an article written by me last October for the Christmas number of the Montreal Star, a paragraph that has been made to do much party service lately, implying at the same time that it refers only to the present government. I stand by every word in that paragraph, but it is melancholy that a man like Mr Carmichael can see in it only a party weapon. I join with him in condemning the defence of the old Pacific scandal. Will he join with me in condemning the new Atlantic scandal, the attempt to break up 'our country, - the insolent attempt to detach a province by holding out to it a bribe of impossible trade adva tages and condema every attempt to purchase counties in details' Does he imagine that only one party tries that game ? Does he imagine that the purchasable members of parliament sit only on one side of the speaker?" Dr. Grant goes on to denounce the party press as responsible for the fact that honest men must assume an attitude of suspended judgment. In regard to the charges made by the party papers, he says: "The party organs have discredited themselves too hopelessly to ask us to take their words or oath for anything where party interests are concerned. To them more than to any other cause is to be attributed the fact that bad men are sometimes elected to parliament. The heart of the people is still sound, but the people have been calloused by constant cries of 'Wolf, wolf,' against everyone not of a particular stripe, and so when the genuine wolf comes they are insensible to the most piercing screams.

Furthermore, the city is directly connected, by the Kingston and Pembroke railway, with a district extremely rich in mineral deposits, the importance of which is beginning to be practically realized."
