The accompanying cut shows the burning gas well which was discovered in Findley, O., something more than one year ago. Mr. Wright, in St. Nicholas, tells the following story about this well: The gas was conducted 48 feet above the ground, through a 6 inch iron pipe and when lighted the flame rose from 20 to 30 feet above the pipe, as shown in the picture.
