**PASSING EVENTS AS RECORDED BY OUR CORRESPONDENTS.**

Anglin's success in securing a position on the G.T.R.—A party attended the tea-meeting at Pine Grove, Pittsburg, on the 16th inst.—The surprise party at Mr. John Sear's was a complete success.—A mass meeting is to be called in the temperance hall for the purpose of agitating for a daily mail.—Cadet Robinson, of the S.A., is on furlough and visiting relatives here.—A deer was captured on the north shore of Loberough Lake recently.

**NEWBORO.**  
 March 22.—It is whispered that our thriving little hamlet is to have a newspaper, which, if established, will show our cosy village up to great advantage.—Great interest is taken in the talk of horse race at Westport, on Thursday, between Michael Rappe's horse, "Barney R.," and T.C. Singleton's horse, of this place. There are to be two trials. The first in Westport as above, and the second one here the week following.—Robert Bilton and Sarah Baker were united last week by the Rev. Mr. Tennant.—The concert in connection with the musical convention at Elgin was a grand success. Quite a number of our village folks attended.—The banquet at Portland, in honor of the three conservative members for North and South Leeds, was well attended. The Rev. Mr. Wright, of this place, delivered an eloquent address.—The many friends of Mrs. Robert Webster will regret to hear of her long and serious illness.—W. Donovan, contractor, has re-commenced work on the railway. Messrs. Lewis and Knowlton have also commenced work on it, having been awarded the contract for the completion of a portion of the road.

**WESTBROOKE.**  
 March 21.—Two deaths occurred here on Friday last, one that of Mrs. Jones, relict of the late William Jones, who came from England about 30 years ago, and has nearly ever since been a resident of this county, much of the time at Collinsby. She was on Sunday interred at Sand Hill cemetery beside her husband. She leaves a large number of mourning relatives.—The death of Miss Beull, step-daughter of Mr. Scrivens, sr., had been painfully expected, she having had a protracted illness. The burial took place in Pittsburg.—Edward Powley, while cutting wood for Thomas Sproule on the 17th, inflicted a gash 5 in. long on his foot. Dr. Hemstead tied the artery and dressed the wound.—Sugar making has not commenced yet; weather too cold.—An old American visited this place on Saturday, putting a piece of perforated white metal on lamp wicks to make a better light, and selling rights. The people who tried it are not charmed.—Mrs. James Sproule, sr., is quite ill; general debility of the system.—John Cooke, while carrying a pail of water the other day, fell and inflicted a painful wound on the elbow.—It is thought that a counter petition will be circulated in the township praying the council to make no rebate of any part of the late Dr. Bigham's indebtedness.—The county council of Lennox and Addington on a vote refused to pay their share, \$54, charged against the county for the Westbrooke drainage scheme rate.—lost, 10 to 10 re payment of their share to the treasurer of Ernestown.

**DELTA.**  
 March 23.—Already railroad accidents are reported. Two men were considerably injured by a derrick. One of them had one of his thumbs taken off at the first joint and two fingers bruised; the other had one of his legs badly bruised and some of his fingers injured.—A joke in the Italian camp resulted rather sadly the other day. It seems that one of the men pointed a revolver at another, not supposing it to be loaded, but it was loaded all the same, and a bullet went whizzing through the neck of the person at whom it was aimed, passing within an eighth of an inch of the jugular vein. Fortunately the victim of this decided foolish practical joke is getting along nicely. Two other Italians had a skirmish in the same camp on Wednesday. One of them stabbed the other three times on the arm and once on the head-making a gash two inches long. Dr. Sinclair, of Delta, attended all of the cases. No action has been taken.—Another wedding is on the tapis.—J. A. Bell is making improvements on his store, putting in plate glass front and renovating it upstairs and down stairs. He intends putting in a large stock of goods this spring.—J. Shields, of Kingston, has opened a tailor shop here.—D. Bermingham, of South Lake, has taken apartments from J. A. Bell, and is going to open a law office. He speaks of having Mr. Craig, of Kingston, to join him.

—The ladies of the saved army have left us after converting about fifty persons. They are now working in Lyndhurst and are apparently very successful, large crowds attending every service. One of their converts in Delta walked all the way from this to Lyndhurst to attend service one evening last week. His zeal is equal to that of the young soldier of Wolfe Island who went to the north-west.—J. McKee passed quietly away on the morning of the 8th inst. His bereaved widow and family have the sympathy of all their friends.—Last week Mrs. G. Hoffman was summoned to the death bed of her mother, Mrs. Lilly, of Plum Hollow.

**SYDENHAM.**  
 March 22.—The band work, as the new development of evangelistic fervour is called, continues to awaken much interest and bids fair to leave a prominent mark on the religious experience of the adherents of the Methodist church. The work was commenced by Rev. David Savage about two years ago. He had noticed the wonderful results following the operations of an "Hallelujah band" in connection with a revival of religion in Belleville. Mr. Savage being engaged about that time in revival work at Petrolia took hold of the idea and resolved to organize a band amongst his people. The conditions of membership were: 1st, experience of conscious salvation; 2nd, consecration to God and his work; 3rd, members to be above the age of fourteen; 4th, abstinence from tobacco and intoxicants; 5th, willingness to bear testimony for Christ on any fitting occasion; 6th, to be under the direction of the "band" leader for service at any point and at any time, circumstances permitting. In response to an appeal for members sixty persons presented themselves the first day. The first public service was signaled by the conversion of several souls. Since then the movement has spread in a wonderful manner, calls having reached Mr. Savage for help from several states of the Union. Multitudes have been led to the Saviour, and the experience we are having in Sydenham there can be no question of the value of the movement, not only to the Methodist, but all other evangelical churches. During the past week the frame church here was crowded and with very few exceptions the best of order was preserved. As to the results who can tell? God alone knows, but this can be said: Many who confessedly were far from God have been induced to seek him and have begun to pray. So far, not counting the smaller children of the Sabbath school, over eighty are either seeking or have found salvation. One thing which has impressed your correspondent is the thorough work carried on in the enquiry room, conducted by the pastor, Rev. S. D. Chown. The way of salvation has been plainly pointed out, and that in the simplest manner, and with most gratifying results. The work is to be continued here during this week by Messrs. Stacey and Brokenshire. Mr. Mahood, having been detailed to commence work in Harrowsmith in conjunction with two lady band workers, arrived from the west. We are looking for great things in connection with this revival.
