COMMERCIAL MAITERS.

THE KINGSTON MARKETS.

KINGSTON, March 23. - Very few cattle are being purchased hereabout. Butchers are securing western stock and paying from 34c to 44c per 16. Beef on the market is quoted at \$4.50 to \$6.50 per cwt. Beefsteak and roasts are selling at 10c to 121c per fb., an advance having been made during the week. Lamb, frozen, is worth 7c to 71c per th., and mutton 61c to 7c per th. Pork is \$7 to \$7.50 per cwt., and veal 6c per 16. by the carcase, and 8c to 9c per lb. for hind quarters.

In Montreal cows sold at \$18 to \$35 for poor beasts, \$34 to \$50 for good animals, and as high as \$55 for some extra good. Calves sold at \$3 to \$6 and \$6 to \$10, according to size and quality.

Barrelled pork sells at \$18 to \$20 per bbl.; hams, 12½c to 14c per lb.; bacon, 8c to 10c

Beef hides are declining in value. The figures offered are 5c to 71c per fb., according to grade; sheepskins, 75c to \$1.25, ranged as to the amount of wool they contain; deacons, 30s to 40c apiece; veal skins, 8c per lb.; rendered tallow, 43c per lb.; and wool, 18c to 20c per fb.

The fowl market has about closed. Chickens are worth from 75c to 90c per pair, and turkeys command from \$1 to \$2 each. In the course of a month the prices of chickens will decline because of the arrival of spring

Potatoes are worth 70c to 80c per bag. They are not at all scarce. Turnips and carrots bring 40c per bag; beets, 60c to 75c per bag; onions, \$1.25 to \$1.50 per bag; beans, \$1 per bushel, and cabbages, 75c to \$1 per dozen.

Apples of good quality cannot be bought under \$3.25 to \$3.75 per barrel, and they are quite scarce at that. Lemons remain at 20c. per doz., while oranges are advancing, and before a week passes will be worth from 25c to 30c per doz. Cranberries are 17c per quart; malaga grupes, 20c per fb.; bananas, 50c per doz.

Maple sugar, but not of this year's make, is shown in shop windows, and selling at 12½c to 15c per lb.; honey is 12½c to 15c per

have not been large, and the prices are a litle firmer. Grocers are making purchases at 20c to 23c per lb. Tub butter is not in demand. Eggs are very plentiful at 13c to 15c per doz.

In Liverpool the consumptive demand for cheese during the past week has been only moderate and prices remain unchanged at 63s. to 64s. for fancy fall-made goods. During the early part of the week some speculators bought heavily, and holders who were inclined to give way were soon cleaned out, but the market can not be quoted any higher. The receipts from the United States and Canada from Oct. 1st, 1886, to March 23rd, 1887, has been 463,037 lbs.

To these patients, who were considered to be suffering from the last stage of consumption, two rectal injections of carbonic acid, prepared by the process given by the French physician, were given each day, all the medicine being aban

The patients at once began to show signs of improvement. The night sweats ceased as if by magic, the almost constant pains from which they suffered vanished, the excretions of the body were regular and became natural and the appetite returned. The sick grew brighter and stronger each day, and since the beginning of the treatment one of the number has gained twelve pounds in weight while others have gained from three to five pounds in the same time.

How far the improvement will continue under the treatment cannot yet be judged. but the results have been so satisfactory that Dr. McLaughlin has abandoned all other remedies in the treatment of patients who can be induced to submit to the operation, and he is so agreeably surprised at the results that he feels almost ready to say that a cure for consumption, which has always been considered fatal when once developed, has been found.

The Phosphate Trade.

Recent developments make it probable that there will be a general revival of phosphate mining in Burgess on a large scale. Hitherto, though a large quantity of phosphate has been taken out, the workings have been more of the nature of quarrying on the surface, few pits have been more than forty or fifty feet deep. Recently Messrs, Cox and Green, who have the old Anthony mine, determined to sink on one of the pits for 120 feet and to drift 100 feet each way to test the working, whether they got phosphate or not.
