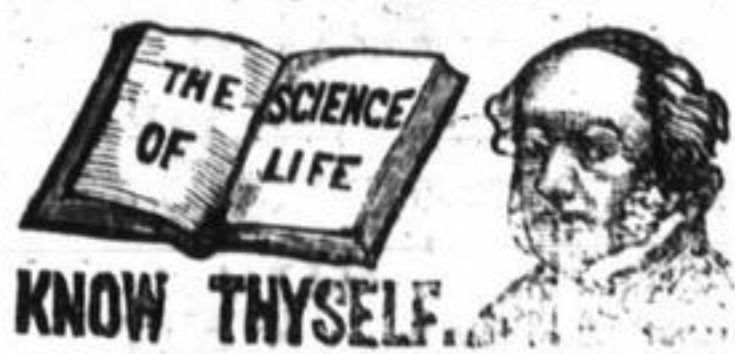

The death is announced at Drummondville, of Maud Stanton, owned by George Chalmers, of Winona.

John L. Sullivan made application for membership in a new athletic club at Boston, and was black-balled.

Slosson, the billiard champion, is going to Europe to spend a couple of months with Mme. Patti in Wales.

The Hamiltons start on their trip south next week. The first game is to be played on April 2nd in Washington.

Von der Ahe must pay the salaries asked for by the twirlers. Foutz signed at \$3,500, and Carruthers and Hudson will be allowed all they have asked.

The governor's signature only is wanting to prevent Sunday baseball playing in Missouri. Without them Von der Ahe cannot make his team pay.

A commercial man offers to wager \$500 that he could pick a team from the Capitals and Brockvilles that could down any team in Canada at lacrosse.

Ready Gallagher, Cleveland, and Dick Collier ex-champion middle weight of England, met in Cleveland. Collier was knocked out in one minute and seven seconds.

Little Vic's mother has gone to Carleton Place. The mare was owned by Rev. R. D. Mills, of Eganville, and changed hands at \$200, although she is sixteen years old.

A match between Patsy Cardiff and Pat Killen for \$1,000 to \$5,000 a side is the outcome of hot words in Minneapolis. The mill will take place after Cardiff's fight with Sullivan.

The famous race mare Kincesh, which has just died at Pesth, Hungary, had a remarkable record. She ran fifty-four races, never was beaten, and earned \$90,000 in purses besides cups.

H. M. Johnson, ex-champion sprinter, Milwaukee, has been offered \$2,500 a year and expenses, in addition to half his winnings, to go to Australia and compete against the sprinters there.

The Star baseball club, of Syracuse, N.Y., is paralyzed by a verdict of \$3,000 against it, gained by John R. Cole, who was injured while watching a game last summer by the fence giving way.

Since the league meeting in New York, the Boston directors have made three offers for Richardson's release from Detroit, namely, of \$5,000, \$6,500 and \$7,500. Each offer was refused.

The number of miles the different league teams will travel is as follows: Boston, 10,311; Detroit, 10,000; Pittsburg, 10,000; New York, 9,980; Chicago, 9,918; Washington, 9,673; Philadelphia, 9,504; Indianapolis, 9,006.

ARE THERE SUCH THINGS?

A Hotel Man Says Whiskey Stills Are in Full Blast in the County.

A hotel-keeper, from a point on the Kingston & Pembroke RR., in the city to-day, was asked what effect the Scott act had upon the drinking customs in his locality. He responded by stating that he and many others were quite satisfied that the act had been passed. "Why," said he, "we all sell liquor, and sell more than we did before the act was passed, and are not compelled to pay license fees. We are never short of whiskey, for there are several stills running night and day. The article turned out is not as good as that got from the distilleries, but will do in a time of scarcity. The whiskey made by the stills is thick and has a smoky taste."

"Do you think inland revenue officers could find the stills and bring their owners to justice?"

"No, sir; there is not a man in Kingston who knows the country sufficiently well to travel through it. They would be gray headed before they'd find their way back to the city." The still owners are said to be shrewd, and are quietly increasing their capacity. "May the Scott act long live," said the hotel-keeper as he left the reporter.
