THE RETALIATION BILL. According to the Washington correspondent of the New York World it is now practically settled that there is to be no execution of the Retaliatory Fisheries act.

A high government official, who is well informed about the attitude of the president and cabinet on this subject, declares that the action of congress is looked upon by Mr. Cleveland and his official advisers as hasty and impulsive and ridiculously inconsistent with the ability of the government to give effect to the aggressive spirit of the act.

"It is expected that American fishermen will be treated more brutally in Canadian ports this summer than they were last year, because the dominion officials are irritated by the hostility of congress, and because they have the support of the home government, which makes them much stronger than the States from the fighting standpoint."

What ground the World's correspondent has for arriving at the conclusion embodied in the above quotation we cannot surmise. Though not wholly approving of the course pursued by our government in its treatment of this question, we fail to see that the American fishermen were to be treated more leniently yet with a firmness sufficient to demonstrate that the interests of the country were not to be trifled with.
