CINCINNATI'S SUBURBAN HOMES.

The Queen City of the West and Her Neighboring Villages. [Special Correspondence,1

CINCINNATI, April 4. Cincinnati, pre-eminently above any of the great centers of population of the country, should be a city of suburbs. Wedged in on all sides by high hills, her summers are suffocating and her winters are rendered wretched by coal soot. She is a victim to poor ventilation. While she is protected from ravaging winds, she cannot benefit from their cleansing and cooling qualities. She is not unhenithful, but had she more loopholes for the entrance and exit of refreshing breezes her inhabitants would be less prone to seek country

The growth of her suburbs has been some thing wonderful. On all sides they have sprung up with surprising alacrity. Acres of wild and in many cases untilled land be a disappeared, and in their place, chrysnis like, are thriving hamlets of beautiful houses. imbedded in pretty lawns, with the usual accompaniments of well kept drives and attractive foliage. Cincinnatians displayment a fondness for the outlying districts have been about equally divided in their professors for the highlands and lowlands. White hun dreds have built along the banks of the Chiboth above and below the city, fully as many have chosen abiding places on the hill tops, or up the valley. Much of this has been due to the enterprising real estate dealer who have purchased tracts of land, divided them into towns, with pretty names, laid out wide streets, erected several very tasteful and gayly painted houses, and then offered the remaining lots at most temptingly low figures.
