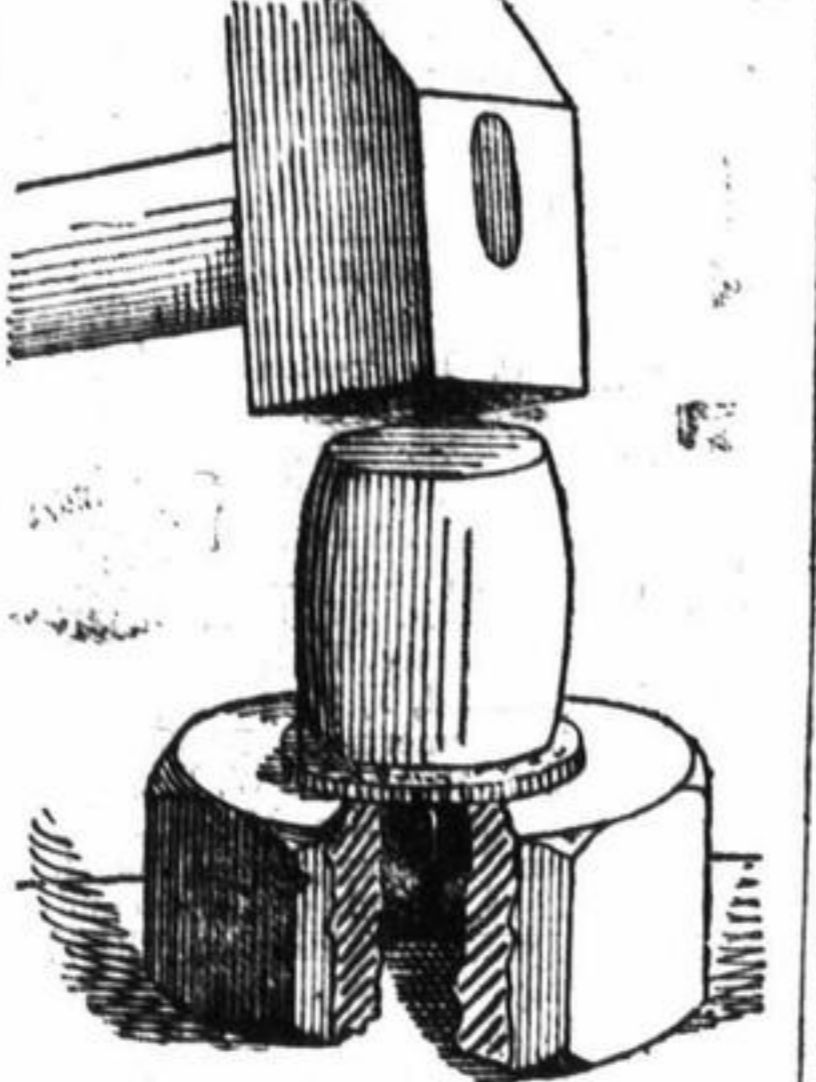

SCIENCE AND PROGRESS.

THE RED MAN'S STOLIDITY IS NOW TERMED STUPIDITY.

The Apparently Difficult Problem of Driving a Slender Needle Through a Copper Coin Is Solved by a Very Easy and Inexpensive Experiment.

We know that one body is harder than another when it is capable of scratching the latter. A piece of glass scratches marble; a bit of diamond scratches glass; so glass is harder than marble and the diamond is harder than glass. The steel blade of a knife scratches copper; so steel is harder than copper, and it is not impossible to pierce a copper coin with a needle that is much harder than it.



DRIVING A NEEDLE THROUGH A COIN.

The problem at first sight appears insoluble, because if we endeavor to drive a needle into a cent just as we would drive a nail into a board, we never fail to break the needle at each attempt, since steel, though very hard, is very brittle. But if, through some artifice, we succeed in holding the needle straight and rigid over the copper cent, we can drive it into the copper with a hammer. But our readers ask, by what artifice may this be done? The Scientific American tells how, and the process is so simple the wonder is there ever was any mystery about it.

It is only necessary to introduce the needle into a cork of the same length, when, being held in a true sheath, it will be unable to bend in any direction, and can be given a hard blow in the direction of its axis without being broken.

Under such circumstances, place the needle and its cork over a cent laid upon a bolt nut, or even upon a table that you do not fear to injure, and then take a somewhat heavy locksmith's hammer and strike the cork a hard blow, as shown in the figure. If the blow be true and a very hard one the needle will pass through the cent, and it will be impossible to remove it. The experiment may be tried with any other piece of money. We should add that success may not attend the first blow, and it will be necessary to make several trials; but according to the authority quoted the fact is real that a copper cent has been and may be traversed by a slender needle.

The Indian's Courage Questioned.

The prevalent belief that an Indian bears pain with perfect composure is likely to be overthrown, says Science, by the observations of Dr. Corbuser, among the Apache Indians. He finds that they do not endure physical pain any better than, if as well as the whites. Great pain renders them stupid, and the stolidity with which they are supposed to bear pain is not well maintained by them under small surgical operations, even the extraction of a tooth almost always eliciting a groan or a yell. The point which is usually on their faces conceals their expression. When this is removed, the changes induced by the emotions may be readily detected; anger is almost always betrayed by the expression of the eyes, fear by the dirty grayish color the skin assumes, surprise by suddenly drawing a breath, as if gasping, and sometimes by covering the mouth with one hand.

Barometric Wells.

Some wells near Geneva, Switzerland, have barometric properties. They have been closed at the top, except for a small air hole, and through this the wind blows in or out, according to the conditions of atmospheric pressure, sometimes with force enough to make a sound like that of a steam whistle. If a hat or any light article be put over the hole when the barometer is falling, it will be blown up at once; but if the outer pressure is rising, the draught will bring leaves and other light objects toward the well. The people of the village understand the action of the wells and make it their weather gauge. The origin of the phenomenon is easily explained. It is dependent upon the differences that may be produced at any time between the pressure of the air within the wells and that of the outer atmosphere.—Popular Science Monthly.

A Novel Life Preserver.

A novel device for life preserving at sea is one introduced by a Philadelphia (Pa.) inventor. It consists in automatically inflating canvas rafts, etc., by means of gas which is carried in a capsule under pressure. The liquefied gas, such as ammonia, carbonic acid or nitrous oxide, is carried in the compartment, while in the other is a powder adapted to burn in a closed vessel. Mechanism adapted to automatically ignite the powder is held under control by a disk of blotting paper, which, becoming wet, is ruptured, and the powder is then ignited, and in turn liberates the gas. The chief object of the powder is apparently to generate the heat, so that the expanding gas will not freeze the liquid.

New Method of Veneering.

A new method of securing veneer to its base consists in spreading glue or other adhesive matter between the veneer and the base, passing the two secured parts under a heated roller to melt the glue and cause it to enter the pores of the wood, then finally passing the connected base and the veneer under chilled rollers to harden and set the glue, and prevent the warping or shrinking of the veneer consequent upon the gradual cooling or drying of the glue.

The Walrus a Timid Animal.

Mr. Elliot denies the courage and ferocity commonly attributed to the huge, hideous monster known as the walrus or sea horse. It is, on the contrary, abjectly timid, and so covered with a wrinkled, warty, pimply hide as to recall degraded human "bloats." Its enormous tusks are used only in digging clams, and are very loosely planted in their osseous sockets.

Nickel Plating Zinc.

A scientist writes in a German publication in regard to nickel plating zinc (which has hitherto resulted so unsatisfactorily) that it can be successfully and easily accomplished by first dipping the zinc in mercury. A fine plating of the nickel can then be secured on the zinc with even a feeble galvanic current. Durable and susceptible to the highest polish.

PHYSIOLOGY AND HYGIENE.

The Tendency to Physical Degeneration.

Rose Terry Cooke's Plain Facts. Decided tendencies to physical degeneration in the American people are commented upon by a recent medical writer. This degeneracy he attributes to unnatural conditions, concomitants of our civilization. Recent studies of population indicate a rapid growth of the nervous and intellectual organism at the expense of the muscular and vital system. The extraordinary mental activity of the American people has long been a matter of national pride. Experience and observation show, however, that where this is purchased at the price of physical degeneration, it should be a matter more of anxious concern than of patriotic complacency. A quickened cerebral and nervous system makes heavier draughts upon bodily strength, and if these are not met by a corresponding increase of nutrition they will undermine the action of the whole system.

Among the causes for a decline in physical vigor, are noted the increased population of our cities and towns, and the relative decrease in farming population. The close confinement of city occupations and the lack of proper sanitary regulations, have made city life a serious absorbent of muscular and vital energy. Nervous and mental activity are greatly quickened in these centers, but the accompanying physical decline has been a matter of common as well as scientific observation. Added to this cause, are the artificial influences of education, which tell even more fatally upon the female than the male constitution. Each generation of mothers impart a decreasing measure of vitality to their offspring.

A Trained Left Hand.

Many are the advantages missed through the non-cultivation of the left hand. Occasionally an artisan is seen who is equally able to handle tools with either hand. Such a one has a constant advantage over his fellows, not only in the avoidance of fatigue, but in doing nice work and overcoming with ease difficulties that present themselves to those skilled only with one hand. The man who can use a hammer or knife or perform any other feat with the left hand at the same time that the right is busy will find frequent occasion to exercise his skill. Another and important reason for training the left hand to act with as great ease and precision as possible is that if injury occurs to the right hand the left can exercise readily all the functions possible to one hand unaided. By training the left hand in youth one would be spared, in such a case, from spending much valuable time in educating muscles hardened by age and unaccustomed to obey the will.

Warmth and Happiness.

Rose Terry Cooke gives vigorous advice as follows: If you want to be happy keep warm. Women are eaten up with neuralgia, doctors say. No wonder. They sit all the morning by a hot register, and then tie a five or six inch strip of bonnet over their back hair, a bit of lace fichu over their bangs, put on kid boots, with silk or thread stockings underneath, and dawdle along the pave with bitter winds smiting their temples, their delicate ears, their throats and the bases of what should be their brain.
