HOT TIME IN THE HOUSE.

A DEBATE ON THE GAZETTING OF THE ELECTION RETURNS.

Why Conservative Members-Elect Were Hurriedly Registered and the Liberals Held Back-Sir John Had a Reason fo Being Fast as Far as Kingston is Concerned.

OTTAWA, April 20.—Mr. Davin's bill to amend the Dominion Land Act was read a first time. In introducing it he delivered a

long address. Mr. Peter Mitchell seconded Mr. Charl ton's bill to amend the Seduction bill, which was read a first time; also Mr. McLelan's, respecting public officers; Mr. Pope's, to amend the government's railway account; Mr. Davin's, to amend the Territories Real Property act; and Sir John Macdonald's act to establish a department of trade and

The government will not grant money for a military demonstration in honor of the Queen's jubilee. The salaries of revising officers have not been fixed, but up to date \$44,000 have been paid out on account. A dozen returns were asked for and granted.

THE OPPOSITION WORKED UP. The first real debate of the session was initiated by the opposition regarding the gazetting of members. Hon. Mr. Mills rose to a question of privilege. The privilege of members had been invaded. It was a clearly defined principle that ministers should The first shipment of ore will reach the | not interfere with the clerk of the crown in chancery in election matters. Yet it was evident that some interference had been practised somewhere between the returning officers and the gazetting of the elections. Conservatives were gazetted and reformers withheld. On March 5th 7 tories and only 1 reformer were gazetted; on March 12th 28 tories and 5 reformers; on March 19th 14 tories and 3 reformers; on March 26th 2 tories and 18 reformers; on April 2nd 1 tory and 6 reformers. Other instances were as bad or worse, and the conduct of some parties connected with the elections should be enquired into by the house. He would move that the clerk of the crown be requested to attend at the bar of the house with all correspondence relating to the returns.

Sir John observed that as there was no urgency the usual notice should have been given. If irregularities had occurred they would be tried by the house or proper tribunals. But he would let that pass. The hon, gentleman had abused the clerk of the crown in chancery, the returning officers, and everybody he could abuse. It was charged that great abuses were caused by their altering the law, and that sheriffs and registrars were the responsible parties. But they were not responsible to the govern ment, and they were responsible to a hostile government. It was as mach as the office of a sheriff or a registrar was worth if he dared to be impartial. The returning officers were respectable men and did their duty. If they had transgressed there were recognized tribunals for their punishment.

Mr. Robinson of Hastings, said : "I was one of the first gazetted and my returning officer was the registrar and a reformer. It was when the opposition began to roar that Mr. Robertson began to realize that he had put his foot into it, and he subsided.

Hon. Mr. Jones, of Halifax, then charged that in the Nova Scotia provincial elections Messrs. Foster, McLelan and Thompson were fighting against the provincial government election.

DEBATE GETS WARMER. Mr. C. H. Tupper showed that 'he visit of the three ministers was subsequent to the provincial elections. Before the advent to power of the liberals in Nova Scotia the judges appointed the sheriffs; now the gov-

ernment selected the most bitter partisans it could find Then Mr. Casy's stated that Sir John's was the worst-tempered speech he had ever heard. He challenged the government to give the name of a registrar or sheriff who

had been threatened. Mr. Casey said the longer the probation the greater the chance of finding out circumstances against him. (Ministerial laughter.) That was the reason why the leader of the government got himself gazetted so quickly for Kingston. (Loud opposition laughter.) The honorable gentleman knew that he had been unseated once for Kingston and feared that he might be agair if time were given to look up the facts.

(Cheers.) Mr. Ives rejoiced to have heard the Quebec members classified as tories and reformers. He held that in Ontario the large majority for the government to a great extent justified the manner in which the gazetting took place. In Quebec in almost all cases the sheriffs and registrars were ap-

pointed as returning officers. Mr. Kenny, of Halifax, said the fact that dominion ministers had spoken in provincial elections in Nova Scotia was to their credit. Mr. Daly, of Selkirk, denounced the the charges that in Manitoba the returning

officers had acted in a partisan spirit, saying that until his opponent came to Ottawa and consulted Mr. Blake a protest against him had never been dreamed of.

Mr. Davin, too, came to the rescue of the government. In stating that many of his opponents were government officials concluded: "But so far as I am concerned not one hair of their heads shall be moved." He charged the opposition with bringing on the debate for the sake of scolding.

Mr. Wilson, of Argenteuil, persisted in calling the opposition grits because Mr. Mills had referred to the other side as tories. Messrs. Prefontaine O'Brien, Beausoleil, Weldon (St. John). Fiset, Lister, Paterson (Essex), Blake, White, Watson, McMullen and Platt spoke.

Sir Richard Cartwright said Sir John declaimed against the hostility of local governments, but what were he and the minister of the interior, the late minister of finance, the minister of justice and others doing be fore the late provincial election? Travelling about the country urging the people to defeat the Mowat government, but that government was sustained by a large majority, (cheers) and the reason was because the election was held on a fair list with impartial returning officers. The announcements of the returns of liberals, he said, were delayed, as he judged, for the double purpose of giving an unfair advantage in presenting election petitions, and in case of need to give time to manipulate the returns, as there was only too much reason to believe had been done in several cases. He supported the resolution.

MR. BLAKE'S SPEECH. Mr. Blake had specifications of some fifteen or twenty different charges against returning officers and other persons.

The speaker held that this was foreign to the motion, and Mr. Blake laid the papers aside for another opportunity.

Hon. Mr. White replied. The upshot of the whole business was that at 10:30 at night the motion was unanimously adopted. On the whole Mr. Mills made out a fair case and Mr. Blake ably seconded him.

LOCAL LEGISLATURE.

Pasaing the Work Along-Resort Now to Special Morning Sessions.

Toronto, April 21. - The house yesterday morning, in committee of the whole, decided to report favorably the bill incorporating the McMaster Baptist university. The act was amended by a clause providing that the course for matriculation and degrees should be as thorough and comprehensive as that of the Toronto university.

The Ontario Factories act was called up for a third reading, but E. F. Clarke objected to the clause allowing young children to work in canning factories during summer months. His point, that the labor organiza-tions objected to this change, delayed a third

reading until later in the session. Hon. A. S. Hardy supported his resolution, declaring the government's intention to depart from the system of leasing Central prison labor to private parties at the close of the present contracts in 1889. He closed by stating that the time until the expiration of the old contracts would be used in an endeavor to devise a plan of keeping prisoners profitably employed without putting the product of their forced industry in competition with the work of free labor.

At the afternoon session amendments to the municipal act were considered. The qualifications for reeves, councillors, mayors, aldermen, etc., in incorporated villages shall be \$400 freehold and \$800 leasehold. in counties \$600 and \$1,200; in townships,

\$400 and \$800; in cities \$1,000 and \$2,000. Then the university bill was reviewed particularly as to the incomes and property of the various Toronto colleges. The pre sent value of the endowment of Upper Canada College, including the site is \$600,000. The site is to be sold. The college is to be permanently endowed with \$100,000, \$120, 000 will be spent in erecting a new college building, and \$20,000 set apart for a site. The balance of the \$600,000 will be transferred to the endowment of the University of Toronto. The university's present endowment is \$1,002,000, deriving an annual revenue of \$63,000 and \$12,000 fees. The teaching staff of the university will be increased to 15 professors, 10 lecturers and 8 fellows.

BATTLE O'ER THE SEA.

THE COERCION CAMPAIGN GROWS WARMER EVERY DAY.

Lord Salisbury on the Crimes Act-Mr. Gladstone Apprecia tes American Sympathy-Mr. Biggar to Sue the London "Times" for Libel-Sure of Success.

LONDON, April 20.-Lord Salisbury, in an address before the Primrose league at Albert Palace last night, said the hollow agitation carried on during the Easter holidays by the opposition had failed and the government's cause was the country's. Mr. Gladstone's imagination deceived him when he attempted to prove that his party's prospects were very bright. The suppression of crime in Ireland did not mean supression of liberty. Yet Mr. Gladstone condemned the repression bill. A danger of the present day lay in catch words. Mr. Gladstone mentioned those who separated from him in the tone of a father lecturing his children. He preached at and almost prayed for them, but it never occurred to Mr. Gladstone that perhaps they had something to complain of. They were unable to change their opinions in a night as he could. Lord Salisbury prophesied that Mr. Gladstone would find it difficult to gather around him any new recruits. What had he gained? He gained the eighty-six very devoted followers of Mr. Parnell, who had been charged with having approved murder and who had refused, or whose friends had refused for him, to enter the witness box and deny the charge; this course Mr. Gladstone approved. Mr. Parnell had been assisted with funds subscribed by men who advocated murder. When a man was accused in such a manner it was not open to him to put the accusation aside with the copious use of the elegant vocabulary his friends had introdued into the house of commons. He was bound to enter the witness box and deny it The victory Mr. Gladstone obtained in 1880 was won by a fund of misrepresentation that could not be repeated. The couservatives were now an organized party, powerful enough to refute falsehood and disseminate the truth. The present government would, hand down unimpaired to their successors the great trust of the empire committed to their care, [Cheers].

The Parnellites are Excited.

LONDON, April 21.—The Parnellites are indignant at Lord Salisbury's speech at Albert Palace and talk of bringing his remarks under the notice of the house of commons. As a result of the reiteration of its charges by the Times an effort will be made to bring the editor and publisher before the house of commons and make them prove, if they can, the truth of the allegations made

by them. Mr. Biggar will sue the Times for libel, and make that paper's articles on "Parnellism and Crime," of the series of which the Parnell letter was the culminating part, the ground for action.

How can I ascertain the height of a tree in J. D., Gananoque. This problem cannot be solved mathematically. Practically, it may be done in two

1. If the forest be a dense one, the easiest

way is to climb the tree and measure it. 2. If the surroundings be sufficiently clear, take two strips of wood, each five or six feet long, by two or three inches wide. Nail them together at one end so as to form an angle of forty-five degrees. Fasten a cord at the base of the tree, and carry it out, at right angles to the tree, to such a distance as will enable you to align one side of your constructed angle with the top of the tree, the other side being placed on, and level with, the cord.
