COMMERCIAL MATTERS. THE KINGSTON MARKETS.

KINGSTON, April 20.—The grocers are feeling better. They say that business is

looking up. With the opening of navigation they expect to do considerable business. For the past few months trade has been very dull, in fact worse than it has been during the winter.

Potatoes in great demand. A dealer has had letters from Aultsville and Brockville, and the prices quoted there were \$1 per bag. The farmers were asking \$1 to \$1.10 per bag on the market. Two car loads are expected here in a few days and it is thought that nothing less than 90c. per bag will take them. The dealers who supply the penitentiary, asylums and military institutions are being pinched as their contracts were at very low figures.

Apples are in demand at \$3.50 to \$4 per bbl. Stocks are very low.

Little old cheese in the market. "I don't think," said a merchant, "that there are two dozen of old stock in the city." The wholesale price is 13c. per fb., and the retail 15c. per ib. Yesterday James Redden purchased a quantity of new cheese, the first on the market, from Keeley and Macauley, of Railton. The price paid, and the cheese is

only eight days old, was 11½c. per lb.

Fresh butter has dropped in value. Yesterday 22c. to 25c. per lb. was asked. Supply is fair. Merchants have plenty of tub butter on hand. They are selling at a sacrifice. One dealer sold twenty-eight tubs at a loss of \$75. It was thought, early in the winter, that butter would be scarce, so heavy purchases were made. The farmers, however, not disposing of their cattle made

butter, thus creating abundant supply.

Eggs are quite plentiful and bought at
12c. to 14c. per dozen. In large quantities even lower figures are given. In a few weeks the quotations will not be above 10c. per dozen. Then packing will be begun and shipments made to the United States.

Plenty of maple sugar on the market. The farmers have had fine weather for making it. It is worth 10c to 15c per lb. Maple syrup \$1 to \$1.25 per gal.

New lemons arriving and selling at \$3 to \$4.50 per box or 20c to 25c per doz.; oranges are 25c per doz.; malaga grapes scarce, 20c to 25c per 1b.; pineapples 25c to 50c each, and bananas 50c per doz. Cranberries are almost out of season. They are 17c to 20c

per qt.
At Point St. Charles, Montreal, the cat tle yards did an active business. Of export stock a good number of cattle were taken at 4c to 4½c per lb. There was a brisk demand for butchers' cattle, and mostly all the offering were bought up at 3c to 4c per lb. live weight. The receipts of sheep continue light owing to the small supply through the country. Lambs were plentiful and met with a good demand at \$2 to \$5 each as to quality and size. The receipts of calves continues fair, for which there is a good enquiry, but prices are lower at \$2 to \$10 each as to size and quality. For hogs all offerings were bought up at 5½c to 6c per lb. live

There has been no change during the week in the local prices for meats and cattle. The dealers are pleased that the cool weather has remained so long, for it premit-ted of Easter meat being worked off without spoiling.

Hay is offered at \$8 to \$9 per ton. There is plenty of it in the country. The farmers who could hold did so in the hope of a rising market, but they have been disappointed and are now disposing of it at whatever figures they can secure.
