COMMERCIAL MATTERS.

THE KINGSTON MARKETS. KINGSTON, April 20.—The grocers are feeling better. They say that business is looking up.

Potatoes in great demand. A dealer has had letters from Aultsville and Brockville, and the prices quoted there were \$1 per bag. The farmers were asking \$1 to \$1.10 per bag on the market.

Apples are in demand at \$3.50 to \$4 per bbl. Stocks are very low. Little old cheese in the market. "I don't think," said a merchant, "that there are two dozen of old stock in the city."

Fresh butter has dropped in value. Yesterday 22c to 25c per lb. was asked. Supply is fair. Merchants have plenty of tub butter on hand.

Eggs are quite plentiful and bought at 12c to 14c per dozen. In large quantities even lower figures are given.

Plenty of maple sugar on the market. The farmers have had fine weather for making it. It is worth 10c to 15c per lb. Maple syrup \$1 to \$1.25 per gal.

New lemons arriving and selling at \$3 to \$4.50 per box or 20c to 25c per doz.; oranges are 25c per doz.; malaga grapes scarce, 20c to 25c per lb.; pineapples 25c to 50c each, and bananas 50c per doz.

At Point St. Charles, Montreal, the cartle yards did an active business. Of export stock a good number of cattle were taken at 4c to 4 1/2c per lb.

There has been no change during the week in the local prices for meats and cattle. The dealers are pleased that the cool weather has remained so long, for it prevented of Easter meat being worked off without spoiling.

Hay is offered at \$8 to \$9 per ton. There is plenty of it in the country. The farmers who could hold did so in the hope of a rising market, but they have been disappointed and are now disposing of it at whatever figures they can secure.

THE PITH OF THE NEWS.

The Spice of the Morning Papers and the Very Latest Telegrams.

The population of Winnipeg is 24,100. The ecclesiastical bill was passed in the German reichstag to-day.

James Russell Lowell sailed to-day for Europe. The knights of labor ask restrictions on Chinese immigration.

Sheriff Clark, of the Thunder Bay district died at Port Arthur, aged 60 years. Rev. R. H. Warlen has been elected moderator of the Montreal and Ottawa synod.

David Tripp, of Sophiasburg, cut his foot while splitting wood and died from blood poisoning. At Sissonville, W. Va., chopped his wife to death with a hatchet while under the influence of whiskey.

The relations of Crown Prince Rudolph, and his wife Princess Stephanie, of Austria, are strained almost to the point of separation. Four variety actors were fined \$25 each at Cincinnati for performing on Sunday.

The law and order league was the prosecutor. Freight rates for cattle between Toronto and Montreal have been increased by the C.P.R. from \$23 to \$34 per car, and by the G.T.R. \$25.50 to \$44 per car.

By a collision on the main line of the Louisville, Evansville and St. Louis air line railroad three men were killed, two fatally injured and two are missing. Kiowa Comanche Indians killed W. H. Strinson and two of his men, near his ranche, in Greer county, Texas, Tuesday. A general outbreak is imminent.

The number of emigrants from Germany, who passed through Hamburg, Bremen and Stettin during 1886 was 66,671, a decrease of over 22,000 from the previous year. Rudolph Schanbelt, the alleged anarchist thrower of the Haymarket bomb, Chicago, is in Christiansa, Norway. He denies throwing the bomb, but is sorry he did not do it.

A coke train on the Pittsburg, McKeesport and Younghighygheny railroad, ran into a boulder near Fuller station and wrecked the firemen and a brakeman was crushed to death. A deputation has urged protection to the iron industry of the dominion. They ask for a regulative protection in the different stages in the manufacture of iron.

The ministers will consider the matter. Mr. Gladstone writes that he does not desire a general election to parliament until the English mind is ripe on the Irish question, as the Welsh and Scotch minds are, but that time is rapidly advancing. Five colonial delegates have been created knights of St. George and St. Michael. They are: R. Thornburn, Newfoundland; J. W. Downer, South Australia; T. Upington, Cape of Good Hope; J. Lorimer, Victoria, and R. Wisdom, New South Wales.

Major Ballington Booth and wife have arrived in New York. They take charge of the Salvation army in the United States. A. D. Middleton is attached to the staff of Claffin's dry goods house, New York, and in the same department with his brother. G. W. Creighton is to be a candidate for the position of coal inspector should the by-law relating to the weighing of coal pass the council.

Deacon White, of Brooklyn, is to purchase Mr. Beecher's Peckskill farm for \$100,000, and present it to his son when the latter marries Col. Beecher's daughter. The Stevensons, brother and sister, who have been connected with the Lindley dramatic company, left for their home at Ottawa on Saturday evening. They will join the company again in a few days.
