

SCIENCE AND PROGRESS.

THE TRICYCLE AS A MEANS OF EXERCISE FOR WOMEN.

Preventing Boiler Explosions-A Fuel to Take the Place of Coal in Prairie Countries-Simple Experiment on the Principle of Inertia.

In treatises upon physics and mechanics, inertia is defined as that property of matter which prevents it from putting itself in motion when it is at rest, or from bringing itself to a state of rest when it is in motion. It is by virtue of the principle of inertia, says La Nature, that dust is expelled from our clothes when these are beaten, every particle of it tending to a state of rest.



THE PRINCIPLE OF INERTIA.

Cited with experiments on the principle of inertia by the authority quoted is the one represented in the accompanying cut. Upon the forefinger of your left hand, held vertically, lay a visiting card, and upon this place a silver dollar and try to remove the card without touching the coin. In order to do this give the card a smart fillip with the fingers of the right hand and it will fly to a distance, leaving the coin balanced upon the forefinger. Care must be taken to give the fillip in an exactly horizontal direction, and in the plane of the card, as shown in the

Preventing Boiler Explosions. A mode of preventing boiler explosions has been patented by B. Meyer, Gleiwitz, Germany. It consists in bolting a metallic plate over an opening in the shell, with a strip of packing between to make a steam tight joint. This plate is of such strength that it will be torn out, it is claimed, before the elastic limit

Fuel for the Prairie.

An Iowa genius has introduced to notice a new fuel, which is designed to take the place of coal in the prairie countries. This fuel is made by grinding corn stalks and coarse prairie grass together, moistening them, and then pressing the pulp into blocks about twelve inches long and four inches thick, and dried. It is reported that one block will give an hour's steady heat. This fuel can be produced for \$3 per ton.

An Engineer's Invention.

A western trade journal calls attention to the clever contrivance of an engineer who has a copper urn attached to the steam pipe above his sight feed cylinder oil cup. The urn is kept full of oil, and is connected by a small pipe to the feed cup, which may be filled from it at any time by the manipulation of a couple of valves. The arrangement is a decided improvement on trying to pour a thick stream of cold oil into a small bole in a hot oil cup in the dark.

Smallpox and Cowpox.

The generally accepted theory that smallpox in man and cowpox are one and the same disease is disputed by George Fleming, LL. D., a veterinary surgeon of the British army. One of the best authorities quoted in support of the theory was the late Mr. Ceely, who reported that he had succeeded in producing cowpox by inoculating a cow with smallpox matter. Dr. Fleming believes that Dr. Ceely was misled in this experiment, and that what he really used was vaccine, and not the virus of smallpox. His experiment was subsequently repeated on twelve heifers by Dr. Klein under Dr. Ceely's supervision, and, though smallpox matter was inserted abundantly into the incisions, cowpox was not developed in any of the animals. Similar experiments have been performed in France and Italy, and the results have all been the same as those in England. Dr. Fleming holds that all these experiments go to show that the two diseases are not identical, nor can cowpox be produced by inoculation with smallpox

The Tricycle for Women.

Of late years a great advance has been made by the women of this country in the direction of physical culture, and lawn tennis, rowing, horseback riding, tricycling, etc., have become more or less popular. Among out door sports the tricycle is recognized as a useful and enjoyable means of exercise, and is numbered by Col. Higginson, William B. Howland and other enthusiasts as one of the greatest boons to American women the present century has brought.



THE LADY'S TRICYCLE. Mr. Howland, in The Scientific American,

claims that the tricycle is mechanically adapted to afford the best possible exercise at the smallest expense of fatigue and nervous energy. The whole body is thoroughly exercised, and yet so perfectly adapted to human needs is this exercise that the fatigue of a ten mile ride is less than is experienced in walking one-tenth of the distance. The practicability of the tricycle as a vehicle for the daily use of women is, in Mr. Howland's opinion, undoubted. He says: "There is scarcely a large town in the land where there are not some ladies who use the tricycle as others do their horse and carriage. It is always ready at the door for an errand to the market, a call on a friend, a spin for pleasure or a journey to the next town."

The original cost of a tricycle is about the same as that of a very ordinary horse, but once bought, the expense attending its opera-tion is almost nothing. The use of tandem tricycles is rapidly increasing in this country. The special edvantage of the tandem is that it affords conveyance for two persons, and allows use of the strength of both in propelling the machine.

Telephone Wires.

The results of the investigations of the general authorities in the matter of telephone wires, in Germany, where the wires are mostly made of steel, have just been published. The investigations were made directly after some very hard snow storms, and the results were decidedly in favor of the steel wires as regards durability. It was found that phosphor bronze wires are of but little worth; steel wires showed very favorable results, but those of silicium bronze were proved to be by far the best in every way. THE WONDERFUL VOYAGE.

A Trip Full of Peril and Suffering-Clothes Rotted off the Men.

The world has been interested of late by accounts of the voyage across the Atlantic of the yachts Coronet and Dauntless. But while those yachts were sweeping across the Atlantic, almost under the eyes of the world, a far more remarkable voyage was nearing its close. A little sloop, only twenty feet long, seven feet wide, and four and a half feet deep, arrived at Dover on the 28th of March after a voyage of nearly ten thous-and miles and lasting ten months. This little vessel, named the Homeward Bound, sailed from Natal, on the east coast of Africa, a thousand miles beyond the Cape and sailed up the Atlantic, touching only twice on the way; and at last reached Dover, with all on board well and hearty. It must be remembered that she rounded "the Cape of Storms" in the middle of the southern winter, and beat up the stormy Atlantic through the wild tempest which compelled the Dauntless and the Coronet to heave to, and left some doubt whether the estaunch vessels would survive its fury. Yet the Homeward Bound was only of six or seven tuns burden, her gunwale was only eighteen inches above the water level, and her crew, including captain, cook and all hands, comprised only three men. Their clothes had almost rotted from their limbs during the ten months of continuous exposure to the weather, and their little craft was almost worn out in its battle with the tempest and the fierce buffeting of the ocean. Yet the men were hearty and cheerful, apparently unconscious that they had done anything of a very extraordinary character. The only reason they gave for undertaking the voyage was a desire to show the world that "it was not impossible to weather the Cape of Good Hope in the wors: season with a small craft."

LOCAL EXPENDITURE.

Inland Revenue and Weights and Measures' Offices-Figures in Detail.

The expense of running the office of the canal tolls inspector was \$1,192.52.

The refunds of tolls on the Welland canal paid to the Kingston and Montreal forwarding company, totalled \$5,717.15; Montreal transportation company, \$13,017.98. Refunds on the St. Lawrence canals : K. & M. forwarding company, \$459,46; M. T. Co. \$3,168.09.

The cost of the local weights and measures department was \$2,462.08; and for the inspection of gas, \$846.82.

During the year 5,288,861 gallons of spirits were entered at the internal revenue office, and 115,256 lbs. of malt manufactured. For brewing purposes 291.786 lbs. of malt was used and 103,245 gallons of malt manufactured; of tobacco leaf 4,223 lbs. was used; 12,476 lbs. of material were used in the manufacture of cigars, and 645, 550 cigars were made from it. The duty paid on these amounted to \$2,351.70.

Of coal oil 2,062 packages were imported and \$618,50 collected for an inspection of it. Of vinegar 4,287,322 gallons were made here and \$556 coffected for duty and inspec-

tion fees. The detailed expenditure at the internal revenue office was as follows: F. Rowland, collector, \$1,518.96; C. T. Dickson, exciseman, \$1,176; P. M. Keogh, \$676.20; A. Hanley, \$783.96; T. Grimason, \$617.40; J. E. Miller, \$686.04; J. O'Donnell, \$588; E. Fahey, \$284.16; R. Slattery, \$228.58. Salaries, \$6,559.40; contingencies, \$784.82; total, \$7,342.22.
