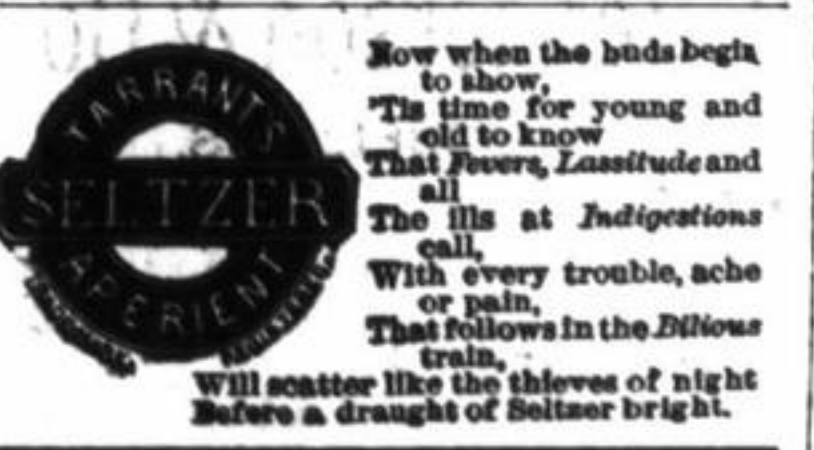

THE KNIGHTS OF LABOUR

A COLUMN OF NEWS ESPECIALLY INTERESTING TO THEM.

Instances in Which the Unions Have Triumphed - Strikes, and How They are Coming Out - Outlook for the Year's Work Very Encouraging.

The painters of Hartford are on strike for nine hours. Reports from western cities show great activity in building operations.

Three knights of labor assemblies have organized at Pittsburg, Ky. Limestone city lodge, K. of L., Kingston, has over two hundred members.

Hereafter California convicts will be allowed to work at nothing but jute. A district assembly of shoe and leather workers will organize at Boston June 6th.

All the granite stone cutters in Brooklyn, 130 in number, are on strike for an advance of 10 per cent.

The masons and their helpers in Rochester are on strike against working ten hours a day.

The Pennsylvania textile manufacturers have been greatly encouraged by the steady increase in orders. Labor troubles in their trade are rare.

The dry goods "sales gentlemen" of New York have organized, and consider themselves the most aristocratic assembly of the K. of L.

The stone masons of Boston, Mass., and vicinity have received a charter for a branch of the International bricklayers and mason's union.

Engineer members of the order of the knights of labor propose the formation of a national assembly, and a convention, to be held May 1st, is talked of.

In Pittsburg 400 striking glass-house boys visited the factories on the south side and compelled the boys to come out for the 10 per cent. advance.

Oswald Ottendorfer, proprietor of the New York Staats Zeitung, recently gave 175 of his employes a dividend of 10 per cent. on their total earnings for a year.

The moulders employed at the Lafayette can works, Lafayette, Ind., are on a strike because the management will not recognize the shop as a union establishment.

Labor assembly 1005 of Leadville netted \$3,000 at its recent charity ball at Colorado. The knights cleared over \$7,000 at their recent fair in Dover, new Hampshire.

Fifty bottomers and lasters, who struck at Goddard & Stone's shoe factory, Worcester, were ordered to return to work or remove their tools. They obeyed the latter order.

State Senator Murphy's bill in the New York legislature limits the working hours of bakers to ten a day. They labor now from twelve to eighteen hours daily in overheated basements.

The hatters employed by Cummings, Matthews & Co., Orange, N. J., have been locked out. Their employers want to cut their wages 50 cents a week, and they want an advance of 50 cents.

The Brooklyn master carpenter's association received a delegation from the master framer's association and passed a resolution pledging them their support in the present strike.

The strike at the Union steel works, in Bridgeport, Ill., has been settled, the furnace men resuming work by order of the executive committee of the district assembly. The men claim to have gained their point.

The machinists in all of the tube works in Western Pennsylvania made a demand for an advance in wages of fifty per cent. for night work, the increase to take effect on May 1st. They wish to abolish night work.

The union labor party of Dubuque, Ia., elected J. Voelker, mayor, and eight members of the common council. Voelker had more than 600 plurality over the democratic candidate and 900 over the republican candidate.

The journeymen carpenters union has ordered its men out unless the framers strike is settled by next Tuesday. The journeymen carpenters of New York have pledged their Brooklyn brethren \$9,000 in the event of a strike.

The strike of 900 men, of various trades, engaged in the new wing of the Equitable building, New York, resulting from the employment of nine non-union workmen, was settled by the discharge of the non-union men.

A CRASH AT MORRISBURG.

A Train Goes Through a Bridge - Narrow Escape for the Express. MORRISBURG, April 22.-A terrible railway accident occurred one mile east of here this morning about 4 o'clock. Naah's creek, now a foaming stream, is here spanned by an iron bridge, resting on two stone piers.

A freight train, going west, went through the bridge, carrying the engineer and fireman to instant death. A brakeman was thrown into the creek, but he was rescued nearly dead. Thirteen loaded cars were piled into the gorge and smashed to atoms. The driver's name is Stewart. It is said that the bridge was inspected last week and pronounced safe. The supposition is that the stone piers had been undermined by frost. The loss will be very heavy. Express trains had crossed the bridge only an hour before, and the morning express from Toronto was to cross the unfortunate train here.

RUCTIONS AT A MEETING.

Called by the Ladies - Smashing the Furniture For Weapons to Fight With. LONDON, April 22.-At a meeting of the Ladies' Liberal Association, at Kensington, last evening, at which several members of parliament were present, a row arose on the Irish question. Finally the platform was stormed and a free fight ensued, in which the furniture in the hall was smashed and the pieces used as weapons. The police succeeded in restoring order after a hard struggle, making several arrests. Many persons were injured, including two members of the house of commons. The ladies present, among whom was Mrs. Ashton Dilke, whence their way to the sides of the hall, whence they witnessed the row.

THE FLOOD IN MONTREAL.

The Water Raising Very Rapidly - Covering a Great Extent of Territory. MONTREAL, April 22.-The flood of last year has been repeated and to-day Point St. Charles, Griffintown, and adjoining streets along with St. Paul, Commissioner, McGill and other streets are all under water. The people are removing as much of their goods as possible in boats. Business in these districts is suspended. Between six and nine o'clock the water rose fifteen feet and at noon it was five feet deep in the Albion hotel and had extended back as far as Victoria square. At two o'clock the water was eighteen inches lower than it was at its highest point last year, and the flood then was considered the greatest ever known here.

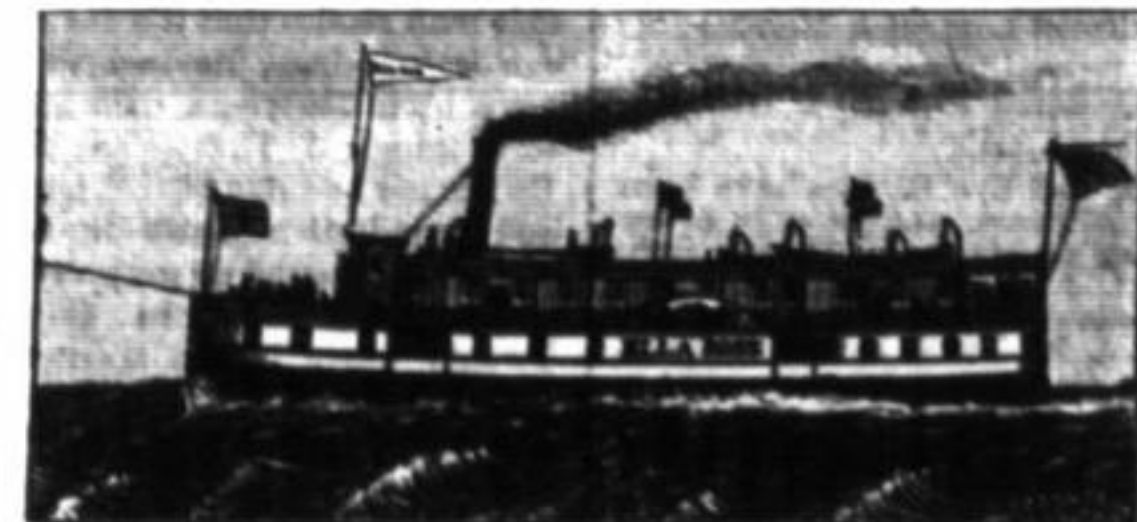
