BROADBRIM'S LETTER.

LATER EXPERIENCES IN A GREAT AMERICAN CITY.

Beecher's Influence Remaining Behind Him - New York as a Manufacturing City-The Thousands Who Toil in its Centres - How They Live, and Move, and Have Their Being.

BROOKLYN, April 22. We are drifting towards a real estate boom such as this country has not seen for years, and every week hundreds of permits are granted in New York and Brooklyn for buildings, the aggregate cost of which is many millions. We are troubled with a surplus of population, and it is to be a serious question how to dispose of them. As worked at present the big Brooklyn bridge can dispose of passengers at the rate of fifteen thousand an hour, and with additional terminal facilities they expect to run it up to forty thousand an hour, or for the three busy hours, from three to six, 120,000. The rush in the morning and evening is something fearful, and the miracle is how all these thousands cross with so few accidents. The same tremendous pressure that is experienced on the bridge, is felt on all the elevated roads, and it is evident that somethat must be done, and that right speedily, to help us to move the people up-town. What is the cause of this terrible pressure you ask? The solution is very easy. It does not seem to be generally understood that New York is not only the financial centre of the United States, but is one of the greatest manufacturing cities in the world. Between two hundred and two hundred and fifty thousand people work down town in New York, and fully a hundred thousand live so far away that they have to patronize either the bridge, the ferries, or the elevated roads. The immense appreciation of property on the lower part of Manhattan Island is almost without precedent in the history of our country, and there seems to be no evidence that we have reached high tide. I have spoken several times about the splendors of our new buildings, but every day brings something new and startling. But as I said the momentous question is, What are we going to do with the people ? It is now felt that these elevated roads are at best only a temporary expedient and a most unslightly expedient at that, and I think public sentiment is crystalizing towards underground roads. A desperate effort is now being made to seize Broadway for an elevated road, but if ever Broadway is given up for a road it will be underground. It is singular how things come around. A tunnel was started on Broadway over twenty years ago. They finished about three hundred feet of it, and then the scheme collapsed, but the piece of the tunnel remains there to-day, and I should not be at all surprised to see it started once more, and carried to a successful finish. We may stand Jake Sharp's railway, but we will never allow an elevated road on Broadway. The underground road seems to be the only reasonable solution of

how to move our people.

The two cities of Brooklyn and New York were struck with an ague at a little political job put up by one John Martin, who hails from our goodly city. Mr. Martin is a machinist, and has an eye to business. So he proposes to erect a new bureau for the inspection of steam boilers. His bill proposes a chief engineer at Albany, and three sub-inspectors in every assembly district. This would provide fat offices for about four hundred henchmen, all to be appointed by the chief engineer. The powers accorded to these inspectors would permit them to close up every factory and stop every engine in the state. No man could have a little engine to run an electric light without employing a licensed engineer whose wages would be five times the cost of the light. New York has had the odium of much villainous and oppressive legislation, but no job either in the present or any past legisla-

ture will compare with Mr. Martin's bill. The death of Mr. Beecher has had a very extraordinary effect in obliterating sectarian lines and in bringing about the era of universal brotherhood. In a city filled with the most eminent Congregational divines, his eulogist was an orthodox Episcopalian and the rector of the mos; fashionable congregation in the city. Several of the most mportant contributions to his monument have come from Hebrew synagogues. Dr. John Hall, the episcopal divine spoken of above, is now making a tour of the Jewish congregations of New York and Brooklyn, and is greeted with overflowing audiences everywhere. This certainly looks like the light of the new dispensation, when an episcopal minister is invited to Jewish synagogues, and a Jewish rabbi is invited to lecture before the straight-backed Calvinists of the Long Island historical association by as good a Presbyterian as the Rev. Dr. Storrs. But while the lines of religious tolerance seem widening in one direction, there are still evidences of religious bigotry. which remind one of the dark ages. Every year the Sunday school children of Brook lyn have a May festival, at which all the orthodox schools parade. For years past one-half of Brooklyn has ignored the Unitarian and Universalist Sunday schools, and refused to let them parade with the other Sunday school children, and the consequence has been bitter feelings at each recurring season. The liberal clergymen, of which there are a great many in every denomination, have year after year contended for the freedom of the parade from all sectarian bias, but up to the present time those having control of the Sunday school union have successfully barred them out. Between forty and fifty thousand children parade, and that such a joyous occasion should be marred by such narrow-minded and criminal bigotry is a disgrace to our civilization. The spring exhibition of pictures at the

Academy of Design is fully up to the standard of former years. The noticeable feature of the exhibition is the large number of candidates for the mantles of Troyon and Millais. Now while an original Troyon may he a work of exceeding merit, and from a financial stand point a pearl of great price, a bad imitation is like an indifferent canvas struck by a lightening of paint-pots, and is anything but lovely or commendable. Many of Millais' and Troyon's pictures look as if they were left unfinished, as though the artist had just laid out his work and then left it, but it is the rage. A person dropping such a hint in any art gallery would be immediately arrested by the police as a hopeless lunatic. So if you want to pass as anybody, just scop opposite a Millais or Troyon, throw up the whites of your eyes, and say Be youtce ful, and when you come to the canvas of an American artist, look over your shoulder at it and pass on. By attention to these and a few other minor rules you can pass in any of our New York galleries for a person who has a great deal of knowledge on the outside of his head. But to recur. The two artists named and a few others have had a demoralizing effect upon American art. Notwithstanding this, however, the collection is a good one, slightly discounted after New York has seen the Seney, the Morgan, and the Stewart collection. Speaking of

George I. Seney, it is only a year ago since

his magnificant collection of pictures were

sold under the hammer to pay his debts.
