



ALL AROUND THE HOUSE.

Up Stairs, Down Stairs, in Kitchen and in the Lady's Parlor.

The carpet beetle, often though improperly called "buffalo carpet moth," is an enemy greatly feaged by all housewives. The small size, fearful destructiveness and its power to resist usual insecticides make it a terrible pest, Experience has proven that it first attacks carpets, and there is where we may look for an assault. Like the common carpet moth it works first at the corners of the carpet. Professor Cook, of Michigan, who has investigated, the subject of these pests most thor-

oughly, recommends the following remedies: First, iron wet cloths placed over the affected part of the carpet, using flat irons that are very hot. The cloths may be two or more thicknesses of common toweling; wring out the water and then iron dry. The heated steam penetrating every fiber of the carpet and crevice of the floor, destroys the larvæ. To be successful the work must be thorough; a full head of steam is needed.

Another remedy is to brush the floor underneath the carpet with a strong solution of corrosive sublimate, the bi-chloride of mercury. This should be made as follows: Four parts (by weight) bi-chloride of mercury, one of chloride of ammonia (sal ammoniac) and fifty parts of water. This is surely fatal to bed bugs, and carpet beetles can hardly be possessed of more lives than are the bed bugs. The objection to this remedy is the virulency of the poison. Of course with care there is no danger.

Naphthaline, the crystals of naphtha, kerosene oil or gasoline would each and all kill the insects if freely used under the carpets. There are two objections to their use. They are all more or less offensive as to odor, while the last two, from their inflammable nature, might do great harm in careless hands. In case furniture is infested, the free use of gasoline would be the safest and surest remedy. In this case the articles to be treated could be removed to an outbuilding, and should not be returned to the house till the liquid had thoroughly evaporated. Woolen garments not in use may be protected by putting them in perfectly close boxes. Those lined with tarred paper are excellent for the purpose.

Ceiling Decoration.

The custom of papering ceilings has gone out of fashion in some sections of the country and in its place has come unobtrusive but artistic stencil ornamentation. The deep frieze will always be popular, although it has in part been displaced by a narrow border. The selection of either is a matter of taste. It is well, whatever may be the scheme of decoration, to have the ceiling relieved from the intense white.

The design here given for a cheap but attractive stencil ceiling is original and new and may be of use to many of our readers who are interested in decorative matters. As a color scheme for this design The Decorator and Furnisher, from which it is taken, suggests a grain of pale yellow (Naples) border in light blue, with lines and leaves in copper and

A Comfortable Cup of Tea.

"A comfortable cup of tea," says Marion Harland, "never comes amiss to a fagged housewife, be it served at breakfast, luncheon or dinner. The best way to insure its goodness-that is, that it be hot, strong and fresh-is to have your own tea urn or kettle on the table, with a spirit lamp burning under it. Scald the teapot, put in the tea; cover it with boiling water; put a 'cosey' or a thick napkin about it, and let it stand five minutes before filling with more boiling water. Wait a minute longer and pour out."

A Good Petate Soup.

Put into a stewpan three pints of white stock: take six large mealy potatoes, boil them until they are nearly done, cut them in slices until they are sufficiently tender to pulp through a sieve, with an onion boiled soft enough for the same purpose. Thicken with flour and butter, and season with white pepper, cayenne and sait. To enhance the flavor cream should be added, half a teacupful, previous to serving, but must not be permitted to boil after adding.

A Bag for the Dusting Cloth.

A bag for holding the dusting cloth is a great convenience, and may be made ornamental as well. Take a strip of butcher's linen 18 inches long for the back of the bag. Cut the front 5 or 6 inches shorter and both 61/4 inches wide. Sew together and bind with ribbon. The extra length in the back is pointed and fastens over on the front with a button and loops. It is swung by ribbons. The front may be embroidered before making

Cocoanut Cake.

The ingredients for cocoanut cake are: Two cups of sugar, three cups of flour. two-thirds of a cup of butter, one cup of sweet milk, the whites of five eggs, two teaspoonfuls of baking powder. Bake in layers. To make a filling for the cake take one pint of sweet milk, half a cup of sugar, one egg, three teaspoonfuls of corn starch, and cook thoroughly. Stir in this one grated cocoanut, and spread between the cakes.

How to Bake Eggs.

Salt the whites of the eggs while beating to a stiff froth, then spread on a platter. Place the yolks at regular distances apart in cavities made in the beaten whites and bake till brown.

Another way to bake eggs is to break them carefully on a buttered dish that has been strewn with rolled cracker; cover with seasoned cracker crumbs and bake until the cracker is browned.

Breiling Chops.

If cooks would only quickly sear chops, steaks or cutlets by first holding them close to a clear, hot fire, then move away, turning them every instant, the result would be a vast improvement over the usual mode of cooking.

Household Hints. A piece of soft flannel is better than a brush

for removing dust from silk dresses. In washing cotton goods with a satin finish, use borax water to restore the gloss. Canton flannel makes excellent dish cloths.

Keep flour and meal in a dry place. The only real remedy for obnoxious odors from cooking is through ventilation over the range or stove, carrying fumes into the
