It was with disappointment that we, a day or two since, examined carefully the diplomas sent from England, and awarded to the exhibitors at the Colonial and Indian exhibition. They were surposed to be superior works, instead of which they are crude in design and finish, and not such mementos, at any rate, as should have been given to those winning distinction in art. The colonial committee, and Dr. May, on behalf of the Ontario education department, must surely have experienced some slight twinges of conscience in the distributing of them among the painters and sketchers of Canada. The medals are exceedingly handsome souvenirs and worthy of the reputation of the royal

The Union is the name of a weekly journal devoted to the maintenance of the union of three kingdoms. It has three objects specially in view : To counteract the influence of the Irish press, to enlist the sympathies of loyal Irishmen, and to keep the British public specially informed upon the sayings and practices of the Parnellite party. Accompanying a late number is a cartoon illustrative of the plan of campaign and the government's method of dealing with it. Chief Secretary for Ireland Balfour is shewn in the act of arresting W. O'Brien, of the United Ireland, for collecting rents illegally, the former declaring "Robbery is robbery, and he who takes what isn't his'n when he's caught he goes to prison." Certainly the plan of campaign, while one effective way of bringing some landlords to time, is not based on law and cannot have the countenance of law-abiding people. Tenantsmay have heaps of grievances and suffer much at the hands of the landlords, but after all we question the wisdom of their resisting the demands of the latter, appointing trustees of their own choosing, and paying to them the rents of their own fixing. Those who indulge in these schemes, however well-intentioned, must ultimately

come to grief. The average bald-headed man pays no attention to the announcements of hair-restoratives. So much imposition has been practiced upon the unfortunate ones that it is not surprising they should be more or less incredulous. But they must have respect for one who was once bald-headed, is such no longer, and is willing to tell what brought about the change. Such an one is Dr. Henry S. ### MISSIONARY CONVENTION.

Encouraging Words for the Mis-ionary Students-Pleasing Art Exhibition.

There was a large attendance at the missionary convention in Queen's university last evening. Many graduates were present and took a deep interest in the addresses. In the first part of the evening J. F. Smith, president of the missionary association, occupied the chair. The choir led in a hymn, in a vigorous way, and Rev. S. Houston offered prayer. Then Rev. G. McArthur, of Cardinal made a short address president. Cardinal, made a short address, reviewing the work of the association in years past. In 1881 it had maintained one man in the domestic mission field, it then sent men to the north-west, and, as the missionary spirit grew, was about to send a representative to the foreign work. He predicted success, and that all the needed supplies would be forthcoming if the association had faith in

Rev. R. J. Laidlaw, of Hamilton, spoke of the responsibilities resting upon mankind in regard to missionary effort, and led the audience up to the cheering point as he de-tailed the circumstances in the life of a young man whose mind had been properly influenced by encouraging words given to him when he entered upon a college career. "He came to Queen's, studied hard, and tonight," said Mr. Laidlaw, "I read his name in the evening paper as a graduate in theology. That young man, who by unremitting work and self-sacrifice has won his laurels is none other than the gentleman who fills the honored position of chairman of this meeting. (Cheers.) And I am not the only person in Hamilton who is interested in his welfare. (Great applause.) He has many friends there." The speaker said it was desirable that Mr. Smith should go to his work fully equipped. If he desired to finish his course in medicine the speaker knew of a church that would gladly supply the needful whereby to send him out fully capable to do any work that was required of him.

Rev. John Hay, of Campbellford; Rev. A. H. Scott, of Owen Sound; and Judge Macdonald, of Brockville, briefly expressed sympathy with and work of the missionary association of Queen's university. Rev. H. M. Parsons, of Toronto, strong and broad shouldered, made a stirring address. He congratulated the association upon its departure, and hoped that when its missionary went forth it would send a rope over God's throne to China, and that its members would all hold on here while their missionary was tugging at the other end. He spoke of the witness of the spirit in answer to earnest prayer, and referred to individual results of a most wonderful character. To the disobedience of the church in the past was due the heathendom of the present. If they awoke to the requirements of the occasion there would be an outpouring of the holy spirit that would not stop until the world was won for God. The greater the amount given for missionary effort the grander the the contributions for all home necessities.

Principal Grant made some stirring remarks upon unselffishness, and at 11 o'clock the service concluded.

### The Art Exhibition.

Three rooms in the college were devoted to the exhibition of the works of art and curiosities from foreign lands. The reading room wall was covered with over eighty paintings and drawings. Among the contributors were Messrs. C. W. Wrenshall, Colin Scott, R. T. Walkem, Foreshaw Day, D. Fowler, Carr Harris, Mrs. E. A. Power, Mrs. Fraser, Misses Britton, Bermingham, Machar, Fraser and Shaw. Some of the paintings were the work of Canadian and English artists, but the majority of them were the work of local talent. The display was certainly very fine. In another room was a collection of curios from the New Hebrides, China, India, West Indies and the North-West. Young ladies volunteered the necessary information as to the character and uses of the various articles. Mrs. Marshall, in another room, displayed a collection of Japanese goods, which were critically examined. The collection was a very pretty one. The curiosities will continue on exhibition for the next few days.

### THE GAWDS ARE COMING.

And the Entertainment of Them is Left Whally to the Citizens.

The special committee, appointed by the council to devise a scheme by which the Governor-General's Foot Guards would be suitably entertained during their visit to this city in May, held its third session yesterday. Besides the mayor and Alds. Mc-Intyre and Smith there were present Lieut. Col. Villiers, D.A.G., Capts. Galloway, Murray and Shannon. Ald. McIntyre explained that it had been the opinion of some of the aldermen that probably the council would not vote a grant to the reception fund. Ald. Drennan said Col. Oliver, commandant of the Royal Military college, suggested that the officers of the garrison entertain the officers of the guards. Capt. Galloway said the officers of the 14th battalion were in favour of turning out with the guards on the Queen's birthday. If the city could not entertain the local corps its officers would do so. Col. Villiers explained that the city was not called upon to entertain the men comprising the visiting regi-ment. If it had been asked to come to the city then the citizens would be in duty bound to entertain the officers and men. It would be sufficient acknowledgment perhaps, if the officers were given an home" in the City hall. An affair of this kind would be attended by the girls, and he had travelled over Canada and yet failed to see prettier, or as pretty, girls as those resident in this city. Ald.
