MISSIONARY CONVENTION.

Encouraging Words for the Missionary Students—Pleasing Art Exhibition.

There was a large attendance at the missionary convention in Queen's university last evening. Many graduates were present and took a deep interest in the addresses. In the first part of the evening J. F. Smith, president of the missionary association, occupied the chair. The choir led in a hymn, in a vigorous way, and Rev. S. Houston offered prayer.

Rev. R. J. Laidlaw, of Hamilton, spoke of the responsibilities resting upon mankind in regard to missionary effort, and led the audience up to the cheering point as he detailed the circumstances in the life of a young man whose mind had been properly influenced by encouraging words given to him when he entered upon a college career.

Three rooms in the college were devoted to the exhibition of the works of art and curiosities from foreign lands. The reading room wall was covered with over eighty paintings and drawings. Among the contributors were Messrs. C. W. Wrenshall, Colin Scott, R. T. Walkem, Foreshaw Day, D. Fowler, Carr Harris, Mrs. E. A. Power, Mrs. Fraser, Misses Britton, Bermingham, Machar, Fraser and Shaw.
