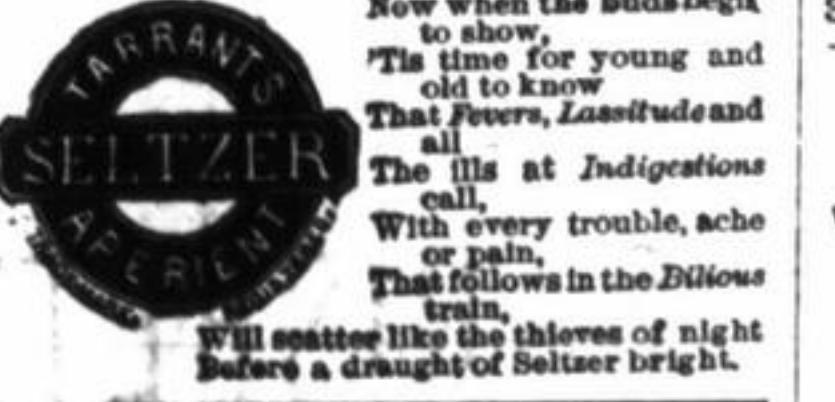

W. Yellen and Miss C. Baker, Portland, were married last week.

John Macdonald is putting up the stone addition to the Gananogue school.

The congregation of St. James church Perth, will try and wipe out a debt of \$2,600.

George Kerr has sold a lot in Perth, adjoining John P. Fraser's, to Leonard Brown for \$400.

Times are booming in Calabogie in the property line. The Malloch estate, Parth, have sold a large number of village lots.

Nearly all the cheese factories have commenced operations. The Plum Hollow factory on Saturday took in over 20,000 lbs of milk.

Messrs. Parmenter & Bulloch have purchased the machinery of the Gardiner Rivet Co., Brockville, and are removing it to Gananogue.

Peter McGregor has sold his farm, in Bathurst, to R. C. White, for \$2,900.

He then bought the Steadman farm near Falderson, for \$4,200.

Isaac Robertson, Farmersville, has sold his farm, on which he has resided for over forty years, to W. Shook and P. Wiltse, for \$5,000.

James Clarke and Henry Leggett, have been appointed church-wardens, of the Renfrew English church. The only debt owed is \$300 on the parsonage.

Dr. A. Stackhouse, Prince Albert, N.W.T. having taken up his residence in Gananogue, Mrs. Stackhouse, will shortly leave for that place.

The annual meeting of the Perth cricket club was held last week, when the following officers were appointed: President, G. E. Armstrong, Vice-President, R. J. Drummond, Secretary, R. H. Pulford; Treasurer, G. E. Armstrong. The water pitcher won from Almonte, will be presented to Peter McKinley.

After that he purchased the farm in Leeds, where he resided ever since. He had one child, now wife of Hiram Capes who works the farm. Mr. Waldie belonged to a long-lived family. His elder brother, William, is still living in Lansdowne at the age of 89. Another brother, Abram, aged 82, lives in Gananogue. His sister, Mrs. Purvis, now living at Goderich, has turned 80.

The question is being hotly debated by college faculties, and Mr. White's article is timely.

Its contents are exceedingly readable, take in a wide range of subjects, and afford instruction as well as interest. The first number treats of heredity good health, sanitary science.
