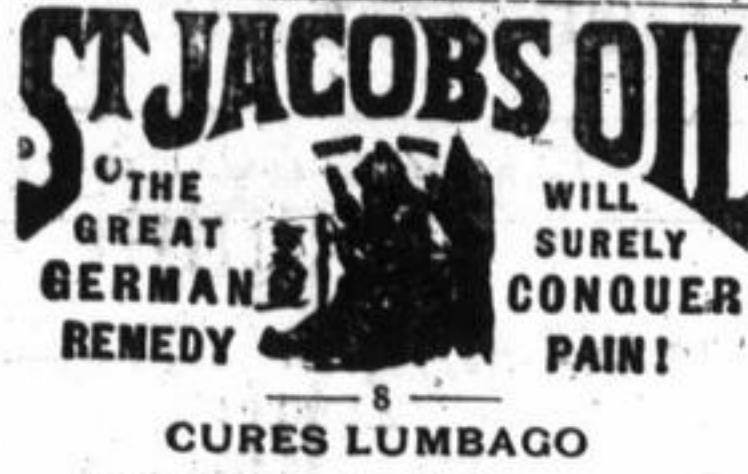

TEACHINGS OF SCIENCE.

A Local Authority on the Subject—The Elements of Life Eternal. KINGSTON, April 25.—(To the Editor): In your daily issue of the 16th inst. are several answers to these questions: Are there any facts in the possession of modern science which make it difficult to believe in the immortality of the personal consciousness? Is there anything in such discoveries to support or strengthen a belief in immortality? Do you consider the question out of the path of science altogether? As these answers are more or less indefinite, and in some instances contradictory, the reader is left in the same dilemma as he was before. I propose stating in this letter what science does teach, and leave the question of immortality, consciousness, etc., after death, to the inquiring reader to solve. Science teaches that the universe is eternal, boundless as to time and space; that the universe is filled with attenuated and condensed matter, the former gaseous, the latter suns, planets, etc., in fact all the heavenly bodies, with all their contents; that the whole universe is impregnated with active and latent heat, like unto leaven in a batch of bread; that heat in its active form is the only known active force, causing all phenomena of life and motion; that matter and heat are eternal; that all organisms, whether suns, planets, animals, or plants, are composed of those elements, but are not in their organized forms eternal. These organized forms are developed by gradual stages from those gaseous elements, and as gradually dissolve again into their gaseous forms, in condition again for development into other organized bodies. And as science knows of no principle by which anything can be added to, or taken from, these elements, their existence must have been from eternity, and, as a consequence, exist to endless time. All organisms, including plants and animals, man no exception—are but transient, but the elements which make up their forms are eternal, forever organizing, forever dissolving.—Yours, C. McM.
