The Renfrew lacrosse club has been reorganized. The Sons of Temperance, Renfrew, open a free reading room.

Rathbun's river drivers are taking the logs down the rivers now. The Baptist church, Clayton, is to undergo repairs to cost \$3,000.

Uriah Wilson's election expenses in Lennox amounted to \$579.33. W. D. Mace, Tamworth, has broken ground for a residence.

John Shannon has been appointed a preventive officer for Marysburg. A new passenger car has been placed on the N. T. & Q. Ry. It is finely finished.

The light house at Alexandria bay was first lighted for the season April 10th. S. Finley, Montreal, has purchased Penn's Island, one of the finest in the Gananoque groupe.

Charles Reed will be the clerk at the new St. Lawrence hotel, Cape Vincent, this season. The presbytery of Lennox and Renfrew has paid \$4,000 towards Knox college endowment fund.

G. McKnight, Tamworth, fell from a horse dislocating his shoulder and cutting his face dreadfully. W. Brough's store, Gananoque, has been disposed of by private sale, to J. B. Turner for \$4,800.

The mayor of Pembroke has forbidden the Salvation army to march upon the sidewalk. The foundations are being laid in Wellington for three new buildings, upon lots owned by Clark Bowerman and Wilson Pettigill; and for a store on Dr. Kidd's lot.

The body of W. Wray's grandchild, drowned at Melville on 31st of March, was found in Conseau Lake after being in the water twenty-seven days.

Dr. Sanger Brown, Picton, after a sojourn of several months in England, has returned, and is about to take up his residence in Chicago.

Messrs. Gorman Bros., Renfrew, have opened a store in Maynooth, in Hastings, under the management of T. J. Gorman, formerly of Renfrew.

Thomas Hancock, of Cape Vincent, who stole Charles Robbin's horse, was arrested at Adams N. Y. He set fire to Cape Vincent lock up while intoxicated.

W. Doran, Judge of Nipissing, has been dealing out summary law to the destroyers of moose in the Nipissing country. Fourteen convictions have taken place already.

Patrick Murphy was killed near Deseronto last Saturday. He was thrown from the back of a runaway horse. He left a wife and seven children in Sheffield township.

Mr. Clemens, who plays a guitar in connection with services held by Rev. D. Savage, had his instrument stolen at Prescott. The congregation will present him with another one.

W. H. Magee, Merrickville has left \$110,000 in real estate and personal property to his three children, after providing for his widow. He also made donations to his brothers and sisters, each receiving \$300 and to a grand-son he left \$1,000.
