A DUTCH BARGAIN.

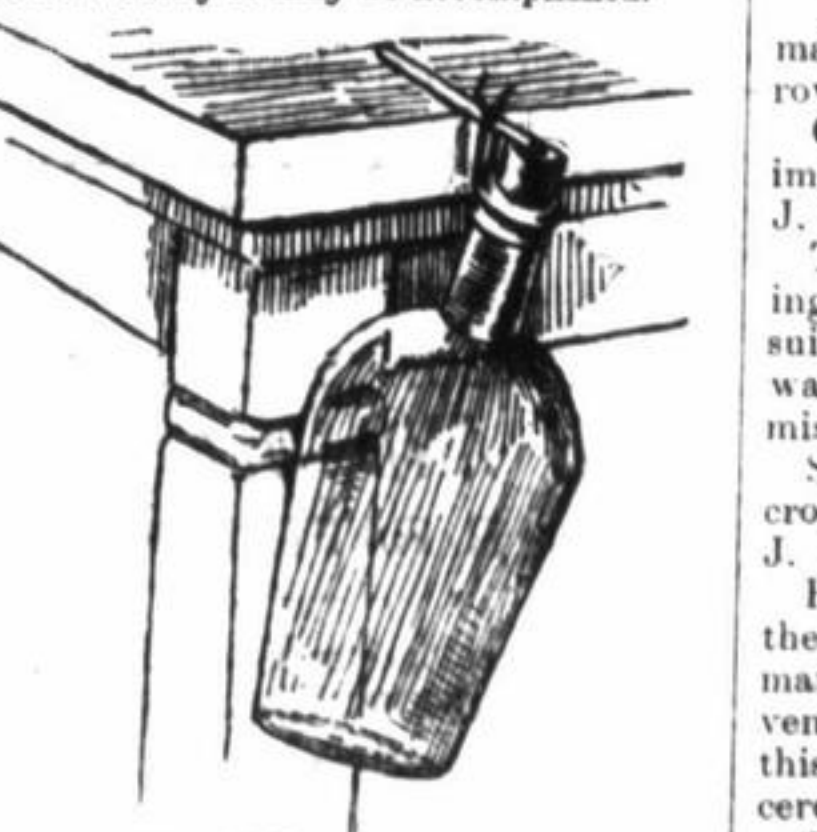
In matters of commerce, the fault of the Dutch

Dutch maids has just taken advantage of her
little companion's ignorance of the ways of

for a superior one. Let us hope that in a
short time she relented, and, ashamed of the
selfishness that prompted her unjust act, re-
turned the better doll to its rightful owner.
The quaint dress worn by these little Dutch
girls is one common to the Hollanders, and
is as fashionable in their country as are the
dresses, shoes and hats provided for American
girls fashionable here.

The Origin of Cinderella.
There is no fairy tale that is better known
or more enjoyed by young readers than the
story of the poor little cinder girl, who was
so ill treated by her cruel sisters, had such a
delightful godmother with a magic wand,
and was so lucky as to lose her pretty glass
slipper, only to gain a prince and become a
princess thereby. A writer in The American
Agriculturist tells the origin of this favorite
fairy tale.

Cinderella's real name, it seems, was Rho-
dope, and she was a beautiful Egyptian
maiden, who lived 670 years before the birth
of Christ, and during the reign of Psam-
meticus, one of the twelve kings of Egypt.
One day Rhodope ventured to go in bathing
in a clear stream near her home, and mean-
while left her shoes, which must have been
unusually small, lying on the bank. An
eagle, passing above, chanced to catch sight
of the little sandals, and mistaking them for
a toothsome tid bit, pounced down and car-
ried off one in his beak. The bird then un-
wittingly played the part of fairy god-
mother, for, flying directly over Memphis,
where King Psammeticus was dispensing
justice, it let the shoe fall right into the
king's lap. Its size, beauty and daintiness
immediately attracted the royal eye, and the
king, determined upon knowing the wearer
of so cunning a shoe, sent throughout all his
kingdom in search of the foot that would
fit it.

As in the story of Cinderella, the mes-
sengers finally discovered Rhodope, fitted on
the shoe, and carried her in triumph to
Memphis, where she became the queen of
King Psammeticus, and the foundation of
the fairy tale that was to delight boys and
girls 2,400 years later.

An Interesting Experiment.
To suspend a bottle from a match laid on
the edge of a table may seem an impossible
feat, but, says St. Nicholas, experiment will
prove how easily it may be accomplished.



HELD BY A MATCH.
Tie a piece of twine securely around the
neck of the bottle; then lay a match on the
cork, hold it firmly, bring the ends of the
twine over it, and tie a tight knot, forming a
loop. You may remove the match to show
that you have simply tied a loop. Then
insert the match through the loop, rest one
end on the cork, and lay the other on the
projecting edge of a table where the bottle
will swing clear of any obstruction. If the
match is but an inch in length, it will support
the bottle quite as readily and make the feat
appear all the more surprising.

The Bell of Justice.
In one of the cities of Italy, in olden times,
the king caused a bell to be hung in the tower
of one of the public squares, and called it
"The bell of justice." It was commanded by
this king that any one who had been
wronged should go and ring the bell, and so
call the magistrate of the city, and ask and
receive justice. The story is told that when,
in the course of time, the end of the bell rope
rotted away, a wild vine was tied to it to
lengthen it; and one day an old and starving
horse that had been abandoned by its owner
and turned out to die, wandered into the
tower, and in trying to eat the vine rang the
bell. And the magistrate of the city, coming
to see who rang the bell, found this old and
starving horse. He caused the owner of that
horse, in whose service it had toiled and been
worn out, to be summoned before him, and
decreed that, as his poor horse had rung the
bell of justice, he should have justice, and that
during the horse's life his owner should pro-
vide him with proper food, drink and stable.

PHYSIOLOGY AND HYGIENE.

**Vegetable Poisons—Treating Whooping
Cough with Sulphur.**

There is a curious superstition in the minds
of many that all vegetable remedies are com-
paratively harmless, while mineral sub-
stances are much more injurious to the
human economy. According to The Medical
Record the prejudice is entirely without
foundation. At the present time a list of
poisons will show a great preponderance of
the vegetable kingdom. We have, for ex-
ample, such universally consumed substances
as alcohol, tea, coffee and tobacco. These
purely vegetable substances do a hundred
fold more to poison and deteriorate the
human system than does the whole mineral
pharmacopoeia. But beside these we have
opium, Indian hemp and the whole seductive
list of purely vegetable narcotics. By far
the most powerful poisons are of purely
vegetable origin. Such, for instance, is
strychnine, of which a solution containing
one part to ten million of water will kill the
exposed heart of a frog. The most subtle
and evasive of poisons is the active principle
of the "purely vegetable" digitalis purpurea,
while strychnine has probably poisoned more
animals and human beings than any drug
but arsenic. The mineral drugs which cause
harm are few in number, and, if we except
arsenic, are not especially violent poisons.
In fine, it is the purely vegetable drugs that
are the most dangerous. We wish, says The
Record, that the public could be made to
understand this, when confronted with allur-
ing notices of the perfect safety and harm-
lessness of "purely vegetable" drugs.

Local Antidotes for Snake Venom.

Drs. Mitchell and Reichart have pursued
some very original and valuable researches
upon the venoms of poisonous serpents, in-
cluding rattlesnakes, moccasins, ground rat-
lesnakes, copperheads and coral suckers.
They find that all fresh serpent venoms are
more or less alike in appearance, being fluids
varying from the palest amber tint to a deep
yellow, and that the active principles of the
venom are contained in its liquid parts only.
They arrive at the conclusion that potassic
permanganate, ferric chloride in the form of
the liquid or tincture and tincture of iodine
seem to be the most active and promising of
generally available local antidotes. The
search for a chemical antidote which can
prove available after the poison has reached
the circulation is considered almost hopeless.

Disinfecting with Sulphur.

Dr. Mohr, of Christiana, reports the follow-
ing plan of treating whooping cough by dis-
infection with sulphur: The patient is robed
in clean linen and taken out of the sleeping
room in the morning, where are left all the
bedding, linen, clothes and things that can-
not be washed. Sulphur is then burned in
the room in the proportion of twenty-five
grains to every cubic meter of space in the
apartment. After five hours the room is
aired and the patient is returned; the atmos-
phere is purified and medicated, and breath-
ing it over night usually effects a cure of
whooping cough within twenty-four hours.

An Objection to Capsules.

It is claimed that capsules cannot be ad-
vantageously used in administering medicine
to persons whose stomachs have been rendered
irritable by excesses in strong drink. The
capsules are not likely to be dissolved if there
is any form of alcohol in the stomach; for
alcohol acts upon the gelatine of the capsule,
rendering it insoluble.

Baking Soda for Burns.

Cloths dipped in a thick solution of common
baking soda in water and applied to the in-
jured surface are excellent for burns. They
must be kept wet by squeezing more soda
and water on them whenever a dry spot begins
to appear.

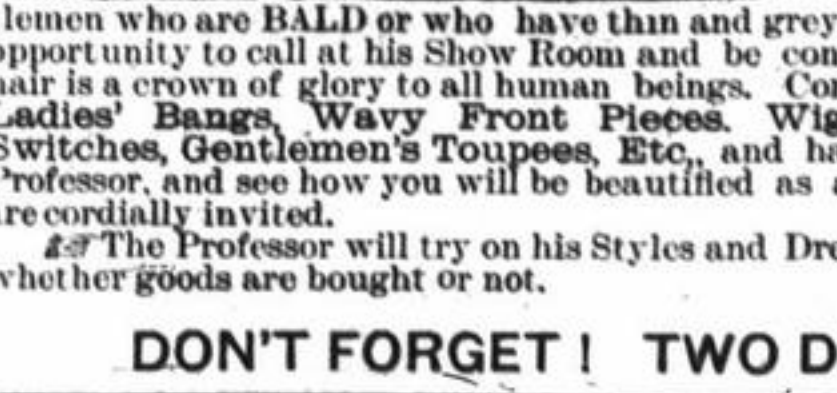
