A number of men, employed on the Lachine canal, have been dismissed because they did not vote for Mr. Curran at the late election. And Mr. Curran, mind you, is the man who wept in the house of commons because the poor people of Ireland were threatened with coercion.

The voting of the nationalists with the government on the deputy speakership is not at all remarkable. They voted in favor of the appointment of a deputy when they were uncompromising conservatives, and in a division for which the party whips had made no special preparation it was hardly to be expected that they would pursue an inconsistent course.

Ald. Laurent has designed a great dyke, by the construction of which Montreal, he holds, would be saved from annual inundation and wreck and ruin. But the Witless says it would cost millions of dollars. And, supposing it does, would the investment not be a paying one?

Sir Donald Smith was elected for one of the Montreals as an independent. He would not accept nomination as a straight conservative, and yet no supporter of the government could vote straighter than he has been able to do during the present session.
