

QUEEN'S COUNTY CASE.

THE GOVERNMENT WILL STICK TO THE MINORITY CANDIDATE.

A Decision Without Precedent in English History-Mr. Mackenzie Suggests That Parliament Apologise to the Returning Officer for Questioning his Decision -Asked to Appear at the House.

May 7.

OTTAWA, May 6.—The committee on privileges and elections met at 10 o'clock this morning; Mr. Girouard in the chair. Mr. Hall presented the report of the sub-committee, showing the cases in the English and Canadian records which appeared to have any points in common with the Queen's county, N.B., election case, which was the one under consideration. Mr. McCarthy, referring to the report, said that since the Grenville act was passed until 1851 no elec-tion case of such a nature was dealt with by the house of commons, but referred to the committee on elections. In 1851 an act was passed in Canada in which a clause was inserted that all election petitions received by the house should be referred to the general committee on elections. The West Peteboro case in 1873, tried under the controverted elections law, a case, not unlike the one referred to, was a most important one. Bertram and Cluxton were candidates. The former received the majority of votes, but Cluxton was declared elected. The matter was referred to a committee of the house, and the latter left the case to be dealt with by them. He proved that the house had no jurisdiction to deal with the case, but that the case be left to the courts. Mr. Davies regretted that such a resolu-

tion was put. Down to the present day all the election cases showed, with the exception of one (the West Peterboro), that parliament had jurisdiction, and used the same.
In the cases of John Mitchell, O'Donovan Rossa, and others, the house did deal with them, and declared them disqualified. In the Prince Edward Island case, in 1883, the question before the house was not the disqualification of Robertson, but the election of McDonald, the minority candidate, and the house did seat him. To declare that the house has no right to act now but that in 1883 it had a right was an utter absurdity. The contention of the mover, that the house had a right to act when there was no return, but when a false return was made they had no right was equally absurd.

Mr. Mills showed that to take the action suggested by Mr. McCarthy would be to declare that the government had no control over its own officers. To put it in such a position was showing very little respect to parliament.

Mr. Thompson proceeded to advance his old arguments respecting the rights of Baird, and apologized for the committee doing what evidently was a wrong since the question was a judicial one.

ATTEMPT TO CORRECT A WRONG. Mr. Weldon said that they were discussing the privileges of the house of commons, In the Beauharnois case and others the house not only asserted it privileges but brought the returning officer to the bar of the house to apologize. Upon the whim of a returning officer depended, according to the contention of the minister of justice, the entire jurisdiction of the house. (Hear, hear.) In this case they were not voiding an election, but seating a minority candidate, which had not been done during the past one hundred years in England. He claimed a higher might than the minister of justice, and that was that the men returned to parliament should represent the majority of the people. In amendment he moved: "That by the poll books and returns before the house it appears that G. W. King had a majority of votes and should have been returned as the member elected; that with due regard to the rights of the electors and privileges of the house, it is required that the said return should be amended as contained in the blue books; that the returning officer be ordered to attend at the bar of the house and amend the return by returning the said G. W. King, reserving the rights to all candidates to contest the election by law."

Mr. McCarthy summed up, and made so.ne reference to the English election law. Mr. Weldon-Do you know of any case in England where fa minority candidate was seated by parliament?

Mr. McCarthy-No. (Cheers.) Mr. Mulock-A Canadian invention.

Mr. Prefontaine—A Walpole government. Mr. McCarthy-Parliament could not usurp the powers of the court.

Mr. Mackenzie-You have done that already.

The committee divided on the amendment,

which was lost by 18 to 13. PARLIAMENT OF NO ACCOUNT. Mr. Edgar moved in amendment: "That the house of commons never divested itself of the power to correct a return by the re-turning officer; that it appears from the papers before the house that the return is false and not showing the true summing up of the facts of the case, otherwise it would place it in the power of the returning officer to seat unqualified candidates who would sit and vote in parliament until such time as the candidate having the majority of votes should obtain the seat through long and tedious litigation; and that the principles be applied to the Queen's election

The amendment was lost by 18 to 13. The original motion of Mr. McCarthy was

carried on the same division-18 to 13. Mr. Casgrain moved: "That the returning officer, J. R. Dunn, summed up the votes for each candidate and did not give the result of the same summing up ; that it appears from the same summing up that King had a majority of votes; that the said returning officer exceeded his authority and jurisdiction in declaring the election null and void; and that the returning officer be summoned to the bar of the house to be dealt with according to law and justice and the privileges of the house."

Mr. McCarthy moved an amendment to the effect that the returning officers be asked merely to appear before the house and explain.

GOOD FOR MR. MACKENZIE. Mr. Mackenzie-"I would suggest that an apology be sent to Mr. Dunn for the house to call in question his act. The only one at fault is Mr. King. He should be censured and an apology sent to the return-

ing officer !" (Cheers and laughter.)
On the suggestion of Mr. Mackenzie, it
was added to Mr. McCarthy's amendment that he (the returning officer) be asked to appear before the bar of the house and answer for his conduct in having returned a minority candidate. Sir John Macdonald accepted the sugges-

tion, and the amendment was unanimously carried, after which the committee adjourn-Consumption Can be Cured.
