**WILLIAM O'BRIEN.**

SKETCH OF THE FAMOUS EDITOR OF UNITED IRELAND.

His Successful Publication—His Trip to Canada and Warfare Against Her Governor-General—The Lansdowne Estates in County Kerry.

New York, May 10.—The New York Sun prints the following special cable letter from London in regard to Editor O'Brien: "William O'Brien, who is leaving for Canada to make Lansdowne's ghostly walk, is a remarkable man. He is best remembered in parliament as the central figure of one of the great bitter scenes which Ireland has forced upon the legislative history of the country. He was the first victim of cloture. It was something more than two years ago that Mr. Gladstone resolved to apply that rule to the house for the purpose of putting down the nationalists.

"After he had done the deed and the house was ringing with the intermingled yells of triumph from the liberal and Tory and of scorn from the Irish benches, the shrill voice of William O'Brien hissed out through the tumult at Mr. Gladstone. 'We'll remember this to you in Ireland!' Mr. Gladstone arose, very pale, and moved that Mr. O'Brien be suspended. Of course the motion was carried. The speaker ordered O'Brien to retire. The member for Mallow arose with serious courtesy, and said, in the hearing of the entire house: 'Certainly, Mr. Speaker; with far greater pleasure than I ever entered it.' He consented reluctantly to keep a seat in the body until defeated in the last election in a close Orange constituency, and since then he has refused to accept any of the vacancies.

"William O'Brien was born in the dingy town of Mallow, the birthplace of the Protestant revolutionist, Thomas Davis, and today contests with that hero, whom he much resembles in intellectual make-up, for the tenderest place in the Irish heart after Parnell. He is not 40 years of age, and is the sole survivor of a family, every member of which has been hurried to the grave by consumption.

"He is physically slight, with reddish hair and complexion and delicate features, which suggest a mixture of the Roman and the Dane. He is college bred and master of a style keen, polished and passionate. He began life as a reporter on the Freeman's Journal, and when the cloud began to lower, in 1880, his pen described the famous scenes in the South and West with such marvellous vividness as to force the truth upon the attention of the country. His visits to many of the sea coast and inland districts were made in a rude boat often at the risk of his life.

"Parnell perceived his mettle and his genius, and when he and others resolved upon establishing United Ireland to advocate the national cause more ardently than the Freeman's Journal was then ready to do, and more aggressively than was the habit of the Nation under the cautious and conservative Sullivans, William O'Brien was placed at the head of the new organ. Its success was instantaneous. Its superbly written leaders, full of vehemence and of fact, turned off with the finish of the artist and imbued with a glow of poetic fancy, attracted the attention of the press on both sides of the channel. The paper went through Ireland like a torch.

"Its effect was so apparent that before it was old enough to have a history in journalism its presses were seized, its editor thrust into Kilmaham, its book-keepers and pressmen imprisoned in a frenzy of anger by Foster. O'Brien smiled as well as he could day after day for six months rising from his plank bed, expecting every morning to hear that his aged mother, her solitude deepened by his enforced absence, had passed away. The joy of hearing of his release killed her.

"In parliament, docile to Parnell, but burning with impatience, O'Brien made a mark on the few occasions when the tactics of the wary Irish leader enabled him to loose himself upon the foe. His style in speaking was exactly his style in writing. His sentences cut like so many stilettoes. Incisive, refined, delicate, his physical feebleness, confessed, in a weak and hoarse voice, his mental strength and fervor of spirit never failed to compel attention and arouse respect. He was hated in those days for his audacity, O'Brien for his fierce earnestness. He never dejected or faltered. All the enemies of home rule were profoundly relieved when they heard he would not return to the Parnellite benches. He was as much needed in Ireland as Parnell at Westminster.

"Although Parnell allotted a proper salary to the post of editor of United Ireland, O'Brien draws from its receipts only enough to live in frugal bachelor quarters. When American friends sent him \$5,000 he used exactly the portion of it necessary to the cancelling of his legal obligations, and sent the remainder to the Protestant preacher and the Catholic priest of Mallow for the relief of actual want. Instinctively considerate of the religious sentiments of those not of his faith, he carried an Orange constituency once, and could do it again if he chose. Clear in his understanding of Catholic theology, he met Cardinal Simeon's assaults upon Parnell with such intrepid grace and consummate tact as to make a Walsh the successor of a McCabe.

**OVER SIXTY MILLIONS A YEAR**

Income of the Royal Families of Europe and Sources—Huge Incomes.

The incomes of the royal families of Europe amount to close upon \$65,000,000 a year. Germany, says the London Public Opinion, stands at the head of all European nations in the matter of royal incomes. That empire, with a population of more than 45,000,000, supports more than twenty-two royal, princely and ducal families, and the direct cost of their maintenance is \$20,000,000. In Prussia, and several of the other German states, the reigning family, besides its public income, possesses very large private estates, and, indeed, in some of the states, the princes are the chief land owners. In Mecklenburg Strelitz, for instance, the reigning family owns three-fifths of the land, and the grand duke governs without the aid of any representative institutions whatever.

Turkey comes next to Germany, the total amount absorbed by the sultan and his family being about \$15,000,000. The imperial family of Russia costs that country \$12,000,000, the greater part of which comes in the shape of rents from the crown domains, which consist of more than a million square miles of land, besides gold and silver mines. The Austrian imperial family is tolerably well off, having a revenue of \$4,600,000, all of which come directly from the public revenue of the country. The British royal family comes next, with a cost to the country of about \$4,500,000. The old Duchess of Cambridge, now eighty-eight years of age, continues to draw from the British treasury \$30,000 a year, besides enjoying the royal palaces of St. James and Kew as her residences. Italy pays her royal family \$3,500,000, which is a very large sum in proportion to the means of the country, while Spain disburses on the same account \$2,000,000. This ends the list of European monarchies of large population. But the minor monarchies also pay their royal families very large sums. Republican France gives her president \$180,000.
