UTICA, May 10.—The foreign trade continnes exceedingly dull. The cheese sent out went mostly on commission, and the expectation is that they will not be encouraging when they do come. Prices are high, but they are running down each week, and buyers claim that factorymen are much to blame for selling uncured cheese. Too much moisture left in the cheese, and too little time left for curing it, are the faults complained of.

UTICA, May 10.—The offerings to-day were only about 700 boxes larger than last week's, and many are making one-third less cheese than at this time a year ago; others are making nearly as much, but taking into account the earlier opening, there has been but a small increase in the make thus far, and in two weeks there will have been no increase at all. Sales, 2,537 boxes; commissions, 1,780 boxes; total, 4,317 boxes. Ruling price, 111c. Transactions of corresponding day last year, 2,550 boxes, all consigned; year before, 3,822 boxes, at 9 to 91c. LITTLE FALLS, May 10.—Considerable of the cheese offered for sale was placed in the freight house for examination. Buyers would not pay last week's figures by nearly one cent per pound, and they were timid at that. They say that prices are bound to decline, and they do not care to take the chances; their operations were mostly con-fined to orders in hand, and to receiving stock on commission. The suicide of Lieut. Danenhower at Annapolis the other day is believed by friends here to have been first suggested to his dis eased mind by the death of his near friend, Lieut. Robert W. Galewood, who committed suicide on the Norfolk boat a week ago. This makes the fourth case in the last two years where young naval academy graduates have killed themselves. The other cases were those of Cadet Schock, of Pennsylvania, who on the eve of graduation at the Royal college, in Green wich, England, shot himself, and Cadet F. C. Ridder, who blew his brains out while taking the prescribed two years' course in the United States steamer Swatara. In a few more days Schock would have become an assistant naval constructor. Another instance may be cited where an overworked brain has been the immediate cause of death in that of young Smoak, of South Carolina. Smoak was a poor fellow who worked on a farm near Annapolis at \$10 a month to pay his entrance fee. He entered in May, did well on the practice cruise, but was found deficient in studies at the following semi-annual examinations. He had until June to make up the deficiency, but brain fever set in and death was the result.-New York Sun.

#### All About Calico.

Mrs. Leon Owens says in her 'Travels in India" that "in the year 1498, just ten months and two days after leaving the port of Lisben, Nasco da Gama landed on the coast of Malabar at Calicut, or more properly Kale Rhoda, 'City of the Black Goddess.' Calicut was at that period not only a very ancient seaport but an extensive territory, which, stretching along the western egast of southern India, reached from Bonday and the adjacent islands to Cape Comorin. It was at an early period so famous for its weaving and dyeing of cotton cloth that its name became identified with the manufactured fabric, whence the name calico. It is now generally admitted that this ingenious art originated in India in very remote ages, and from that country found its way into Egypt. It was not until toward the middle of the seventeenth century that calico printing was introduced into Europe,-Kansas City Times,

Hoops for the Children.

The plain wooden hoop is all the go now. The iron hoop is not called for. Granville, Mass., turns out about 200,000 this year and Philadelphia about two thirds as many. They are made of beech or ash. The wood is cut into narrow strips and steamed. The heat curls the strips and the ends are tacked together. Hoops with bells, flags and other ornaments are made in Philadelphia. Few are sold. They cost too much and usually go to amuse sick children who have not a lusty pair of legs. The hoop trade will reach 2,000,000 this year. No one will get wealthy out of this. The margin is too small on account of the great competition. Care is taken by the manufacturers that a hoop is not made strong enough to last forever. The more hoops broken in the season the livelier is the trade. The east supplies the west with rolling stock of this kind. - New York Sun.

Patti's Two Hour Drive.

Bignor Nicolini accompanies her almost invariably, The happy pair usually occupy a closed carriage, but one day this week they ventured forth in open vehicle. Mme. A friend who bowed to her one day when she was escorted by her pretty niece, Cartina, was surprised at first when his salute was not returned. Approaching her carriage a second time, he discovered that Mme. Patti was asleep, or so deeply plunged in thought that nobody would have known the difference between a songtress' meditation and her slumber .-New York Sun.


