THE IRON-WORKERS' STRIKE.

Montreal; D. A. Flock, R. M. Pringle, A Settlement Not Yet Reached Between

the Employers and Employees. The grievance committee, appointed by the strikers of Messrs. Chown & Cunningham's stove works, did not meet the firm on Saturday afternoon. The strikers were paid for the work they had done during the week in the presence of Mr. Chown. Mr. Cunningham was not present. There was no conversation between the men and Mr. Chown relative to what the firm intended to do. The strikers have now decided to keep away from the works. If the proprietors want to confer with the men they will have to call upon them. They consider that their demands in the present case are

just, and will insist upon them. At 12 o'clock to-day the strikers had not arrived at a settlement with the proprietors of the works. Mr. Chown, on being spoken to, stated that he and Mr. Cunningham had not had a conference with the men since Friday evening. "But," said Mr. Chown, "three knights of labour dropped into our office on Saturday shortly after 12 o'clock. They wanted to discuss the strike with us, but we refused to engage in any conversation with them on the matter. We do not know the knights of labour in this matter, and further we do not know that our men are members of that body. However, we welcomed the knights to our office as citizens. In connection with the strike we are willing to discuss the matter with our men, but we do not want to know the knights of labour on the subject.'

FIRES IN CLARENDON.

Mr. Brickwood's Experience Among Them -Eight Miles I brough Flame.
