THE DEATH OF THE BULL.

Scene in a Spanish Amphitheatre—Dexterity of a Matador.

The ring is a veritable slaughter pen, and I found relief in turning my eyes on the audience. The only signs of pity were on the faces of some of the younger of the women, but a keen relish of the sport was depicted on the countenances of the majority. A blast of the trumpet announces a new phase, for the bull must die. He has fought well, but, handicapped from the first, he has furnished the people mere sport, and now nothing short of his death will satisfy them. Bleeding and well nigh exhausted, he holds the ring, and the fighters withdraw to prepare for the end. The bull bellows with the pain of the darts that cling to his flesh. He tosses his head and shakes his sides, but the darts only sink deeper. He hears the shouts of the people as they enjoy his torture, and, blind with agony, bleeding and exhausted, he staggers around the ring, his glazed eye telling the pain he is suffering.

Martini springs over the rail. On his left arm is wound the red cloak and in his right hand he carries a long, thin Toledo blade. He cautiously approaches, and throwing his cloak in the air catches it on his sword point. The bull tries to reach him and shows a spurt of the old fire, but his leaps are mere stumbles. At each assault the matador steps to one side, and now bull and man are moving in a small circle, the former staggering rather than walking. The matador sees his time has come, and more than once already has he poised his sword, but withheld for a more favorable opening.

The flag again strikes the bull's nose, and summoning up all his strength the grand old fellow lowers his head and lunges forward. Martini, raising his sword in a line with his own head, makes a spring in the air and plunges the blade to the hilt between the shoulders of the bull. The aim is true, it has reached the heart, and the bull slowly raising his head quivers in every limb, then with one defiant roar at his slayers stumbles forward and falls dead. The delight of the people knows no bounds, and as the matador draws his dripping sword they shake the amphitheater with rivas for the favorite. Not restraining themselves with applause, they throw their caps in the ring and the smiling banderilleros toss them back. Martini lingers but a moment and then retires. Four gayly caparisoned horses drag the bull out and the ring is cleared for a second encounter.—Corranra Cor. San Francisco Chronicle.

The Brewer's Business.

The New York brewers sold about 4,000,000 barrels of beer in 1886, so that at the estimated profit of \$1 a barrel they made \$4,000,000. This divided among the eighty of this neighborhood gives \$50,000 apiece; but while few made so little, many made a great deal more—one having sold nearly 400,000 barrels, and three or four having made over 300,000 barrels or dollars. Many of them live quite grandly, the mansion that one has built fronting the park being one of the finest homes in the city, and of course they don't do any manual work; in fact, many of them have had their riches forced upon them, and haven't the ability to do the work of the humblest of their clerks. There is a college in town for teaching brewing where four boys a year get that education free.

Is this a chance to recommend to a youth to strive for? After a long acquaintance with many brewers I say decidedly no. I would not put a boy in the business nor go into it myself under even the most advantageous circumstances. In many respects their riches are earned the hardest of any moneys made in New York. This is said not from a temperance standpoint, but because of the lives the brewers have to lead and the things they have to do to make their money. For instance, they are obliged to drink like the suction pipe of a steam engine. Whenever a customer begins business, or opens a new saloon, or refurbishes an old one, the brewer must come and spend money like water and drink like a fish. It is just the same when the customer has a wedding or a christening, or takes a partner, or does anything that furnishes an excuse for inviting the brewer around to divide a portion of his profits. He would be stingy if he didn't spend the money and disrespectful if he didn't drink, and in either case he would lose his customer.—Providence Journal.

Wrestling on Horseback.

Sam Matthews, the champion wrestler of the Pacific coast, arrived here not long ago, after a long absence through the southern counties and Mexico. During the trip Mr. Matthews met in the arena a number of people and defeated them all. While in the south he conceived the novel method of wrestling on horseback. The thought struck him as being a good one, and became so firmly fixed in his head that he decided to get up a code of rules on "horseback wrestling."

In the first place the horses must be of medium weight and height, and no horns or projecting points on the saddles. No straps or buckles to prevent either man from falling off to be used. The contesting parties must take their positions at least twenty yards apart, and at the call of time must meet right side to right side, each clasping the other's hand and then breaking. The first man being dismounted in any way, except by accident, so that both feet touch the ground at the same time, shall be declared the loser and the fall will be given against him.

Climbing from one horse to the other is fair, and will be allowed. Kicking or striking either man or horse shall constitute a foul, and the one committing a deliberate foul will lose the match.
