COMMERCIAL MATTERS.

Defaulting Cheese Exporter. London, Ont., May 17.—L. Cleverdon, reeve of Strathroy, and warden of the county of Middlesex, has skipped, leaving very heavy liabilities and a quantity of forged paper. Mrs. Cleverdon says he has gone to Brazil and will not be back. Developto Brazil and will not be back. Developments show that merchants, bankers, brokers, insurance agents, had been taken in. One bank is in for \$18,000, advanced to Cleverdon on forged bills of lading. Clever don was one of the largest cheese exporters in Canada. He shipped mostly to a Liverpool firm and they gave the bank instructions to cash all sight drafts made by Clever don on them on the production of the bills of lading without waiting to first find out if the Liverpool firm would draft them. Cleverdon had been working on this principle for a long time and, therefore, when he produced bills of lading for \$18,000 worth of cheese, it excited no suspicion. It is said that these bills were forged and that not one pound of cheese was ever shipped. It was reported weeks ago that Cleverdon had made a haul of \$20,000 in bucket shop transactions, which report, it turns out, was incortions, which report, it turns out, was incortions, which report, it turns out, was incorrect. Cleverdon is, besides being reeve of Strathroy and warden of the county of Middlesex, one of the directors of the Western fair, and superintendent of the Methodist Sabbath school. He is one of the best known men in Western Ontario, having lived in Strathroy many years and held various municipal positions.
