Men as Gay Deceivers.

KINGSTON, May 21.- (To the Editor): I am not astonished that married life to some is not always what it seems to be. They don't begin it right. One worthless fellow whom I know, without education and trade, and possessing precious little means, made the acquaintance of a young domestic who wanted to be her own mistress. She encouraged the penniless adventurer, and, without waiting to enquire as to what his prospects in life were, married him. He turned out to be largely dependent upon his mother for support, said he expected a wind-fall some time if he kept his marriage quiet, put his wife in a dismal, delapidated up-town hovel, and left her to her fate. She saw him but seldom, generally when he was tipsy, and then he abused and beat her. The last I heard of her she had had enough of matrimony and had gone back to the service she formerly despised. This is one case in the lower walks of life. The other case is that of a couple whose union seemed to be a blessed one. It was pointed to as an example of what married life should be. Husband and wife were always together. This devotion was most conspicuous. Then the husband became suddenly neglectful and giddy, and drifted from one downward stage to another, until he became a wreck. The change I cannot account for. I doubt if the parties interested can themselves do so. The incident, however, has been much talked of, and in view of it I am not at all surprised that my wife wonders if there is any danger of my going suddenly to the dogs. Now, I detest the man who will mislead a girl, induce her to marry him, and then desert her; and I detest the man who deceives his wife, poses as an example of what a respectable married man should be, takes a high place in the church, carries the mask for years, and then drops into disgrace and hauls his wife down with him. Two things are, in my experience, essential to happy married life a competent income and a decent reputation. Few men are possessed of both, but the women do not seem to discover the fact until after they are married. As for myself I told my wife what I was and hoped to be, and I am glad to say that on neither side has there been a disappointment.-H. H.
