The Hamilton Times speaks bluntly but truly when it says that the premier lied to the Manitobans when he said in 1881 that the Canadian Pacific's charter would not check the construction of competing roads in Manitoba.

In the house of commons on Wednesday, Mr. Robertson, of King's county, who introduced the subject, read a letter which Sir John wrote to Senator Howlan on the 28th of January, three weeks before the dominion elections, intimating that if the government was sustained the proposed subway between the island and the mainland would be undertaken as a public work.

"My dear Howlan—Referring to our several conversations, and especially to the one of to-day, on your return from the south, I desire to repeat, etc." Nothing was said here about a letter, but about a talk which he had had with Mr. Howlan long before, and Mr. Blake enlarged upon this point, and made Sir John's escape from the dilemma in which he was placed impossible.

FORCING AN ISSUE.

For years the Ontario government has sought a settlement of the points in dispute between it and the federal government touching the titles to land in the Rainy river district. The central power did not respond to the appeals of the local ministry because it would do so. The attempt of the conservatives to dislodge the liberals in the province failing they have, so far as possible, set themselves against everything which will contribute to the success of local government.

The following letter will explain itself: "To James Connors, M.P.P., Port Arthur, Ont.: 'DEAR SIR,—I have not forgotten or overlooked your repeated and urgent requests that the government of Ontario at once take such action as it might deem advisable and necessary to put an end to the uncertainty which prevails regarding titles to land in the District of Rainy River, which, as you state, is causing great dissatisfaction and injury to settlers and others, and also seriously retarding the material progress of the country.'

"The local government would have been justified in taking the initiative long ago. The dominion government having no desire to act willingly it could not object to be forced to do so, seeing that a great many persons have been seriously affected by the uncertainty of their land titles."

MARINE PARAGRAPHS.

Interesting Items Gathered Along the Harbour—Vessel Movements. The schr. Augusta has gone to Toledo to load timber for Kingston.

The steam-barge Active and three barges have arrived from Bay City, Mich., with over 1,000,000 feet of two-inch lumber.

The steamer D. D. Calvin and consort reached Garden Island from Lake Superior yesterday, with timber from Lake Superior.

The schr. Watertown collided with the approach to the Chicago avenue bridge yesterday afternoon. The Watertown's jibboom was carried away, and the approach slightly damaged.

The four line boats Algerian, Captain Trowell; Corsican, Captain St. Claire; Spartan, Captain Irvine; and Corinthian, Captain Ada, from Montreal to Toronto, will commence to run on the first of June.

S. H. Phippen has sold the steam-barge Saxon to A. Muir, Port Huron. The price was \$5,000. The Saxon has left Port Dalhousie for Montreal and will return to Kingston when she will be delivered to her owner.

The steamer John Thorn will be hauled out at Calvin & Son's shipyard and receive a new keelson. The marine railway in this yard will receive extensive repairs.

On Tuesday evening as the steam-barge W. D. Hall, commanded by Captain J. Clifford, from Duluth to Kingston, was entering the new canal at St. Catharines, she struck the wing wall of the lock and received some injury to her stern, causing her to spring a leak.
