"Opifer per Orbem Dicor."

It's a mistake to suppose, as a tory contempory appears to have done, that the change in the tariff on iron led to the formation of the syndicate whose purpose is to extensively develope the mines of this district. The syndicate was formed long, long since, and some of the mines were bought up long, long ago. True, the incorporation of the company was of late occurrence, but it was decided upon for reasons having no connection whatever with the tariff changes. And it's the aim to mine and ship the ore, not to smelt it here.

The press has nothing complimentary to say of Senator McInnes' bill, which has for its object the compelling of railways to carry legislators and judges free. The idea is scandalous. As the Mail points out, a senator is allowed \$688 for mileage, beside \$1,000 for every session of parliament, and that ought to be enough for him. The judges are allowed their expenses and cannot want any more. We are against deadheading, and it is curious to observe that it is is being legislatively encouraged in Canada at a time when an inter-state law abolishes it in the United States. Both Senator Mc-Innes and his bill should be sat upon.

In a letter to the Montreal Post a correspondent remarks of the O'Brien disturbance here: "All seem to be of opinion that Chief Horsey, of the police force, did all that was possible to silence and scatter the mob. Some members of the force are said to have acted bravely under the direction of the valiant chief, while others are accused of showing cowardice in the presence of the mob." The reflection upon the police is unwarranted and unfair. There was only a handful of men, and, distributed as they were, for duty at different points, their work was not seen and not appreciated. That any of them exhibited cowardice is a slander for which there is no justification whatever. Credit should be given to whom credit is due.

The Hamilton Times speaks bluntly but truly when it says that the premier lied to the Manitobans when he said in 1881 that the Capadian Pacific's charter would not check the construction of competing roads in Manitoba. Tupper lied for him in 1884, when he said that disallowance would cease as soon as the main line of the C. P. R. was completed. In 1886, Thomas White renewed the promise, to affect the elections, but Macdonall, Tupper and White now stand together, ready to vote as one man against carrying into effect the promises they made when they were vote-hunting They seem bent upon again disappointing the people, and humbugging them, and they do it without compunction, apparently believing that the people can stand anything, no matter how mean or dishonorable, that is done in the name of party. The Manitobans have been hard to educate, politically, but they are getting a lesson now they ought to remember.

In the house of commons on Wednesday Mr. Robertson, of King's county, who introduced the subject, read a letter which Sir John wrote to Senator Howlan on the 28th of January, three weeks before the dominion elections, intimating that if the government was sustained the proposed subway between the island and the mainland would be undertaken as a public work. Sir John denied he wrote thus, bidding for votes. The letter, he said, had been written in reply to one received by him from Senator Howlan. Mr. Rlake read the letter, which begun thus: "My dear Howlan-Referring to our several conversations, and especially to the one of to-day, on your return from the south, I desire to repeat, etc." Nothing was said here about a letter, but about a talk which he had had with Mr. Howlan long before, and Mr. Blake enlarged upon this point, and made Sir John's escape from the dilemma in which he was placed impossible. Embarrassment or cornering, however, did not trouble the premier. "He simply similed," said a correspondent, "and intimated that he had given Mr. Blake a pointer in regard to diplomatic letter writing." A bidding for votes and a breaking of pledges is no longer an offence ; it's deplomacy, something worthy of admiration. Verily the science of politics is degenerat-

FORCING AN ISSUE. For years the Ontario government has sought a settlement of the points in dispute between it and the federal government touching the titles to land in the Rainy river district. The central power did not respond to the appeals of the local ministry because it would not do so. The attempt of the conservatives to dislodge the liberals in the province failing they have, so far as possible, set themselves against everything which will contribute to the success of local government. Their raid upon provincial rights ended in defeat, but through the Macdonald. cabinet they have raised every barrier they could to the successful carrying out of arrangements beneficial to the people. The jour government has decided to bring things to a focus and the settlers of the disputedterritory must rejoice thereat. The following letter will explain itself : "TORONTO, May 14.

"To James Conmee, M.P.P., Port Arthur, "DEAR SIR,—I have not forgotten or overlooked your repeated and urgent re-

quests that the government of Ontario at once take such action as it might deem advisable and necessary to put an end to the uncertainty which prevails regarding titles to land in the District of Rainy River, which, as you state, is causing great dis-satisfaction and injury to settlers and others, and also seriously retarding the material progress of the country. In connection with this important question, which has for a long time been the subject of serious and anxious consideration, I desire now to say that the government of Ontario, having had and having now the utmost confidence in the justice of its claim or title to lands in the territory, has hitherto delayed action, hoping wiser counsels would prevail at Ottawa, and that the government of Canada would consider the interests of the people to be paramount to all other considerations, and would abandon its unwarrantable pretensions which have so seriously delayed the settlement and development of the district. But, as there appears now little reason for hope that they will do this and as the interests of the countries. will do this, and as the interests of the country have seriously suffered in the past and will continue to suffer for some time yet if the case is carried to the privy council, as threatened by the dominion government, the government of Ontario has decided that it would be justified in taking immediate action, and thus as far as possible relieve settlers and others having claims in the district for an other statement of the settlers. trict from further suspense and anxiety. I have, therefore, to say that the government has determined to take immediate steps to investigate all disputed and other claims to lands in that region, and to issue patents without further delay.

The dominion government having no desire to act willingly it cannot object to be forced to do so, seeing that a great many persons have been seriously affected by the uncertainty of their land titles. The dominion government may resist the proceedings to be taken by Mr. Pardee, but if it does there can be no doubt of what the result will be.


