AUTHORITATIVE STATEMENT.

Mr. Glacstone's Plan for the Retention o Irish Members at Westminster.

LONDON, June 4.—Mr. Gladstone has a plan by which he can retain the Irish members in full numerical strength, and by which England, Scotland and Wales will not have legislation controlled by Irish votes. Mr. Gladstone has worked this out indetail, but regards as monstrous Mr. Chamberlains, demand that he should draw up while in opposition a scheme which would give the tories and liberal-unionists an advantage for which they long, namely, of being his assailants and critics, instead of being themselves assailed and criticized. In Mr. Gladstone's view. Mr. Chamberlain's demand is unprecedented and preposterous. It is stated that a number of English home rule members have decided to present a memorial to Mr. Gladstone, asking him to make a definite statement on this question.
