THE DISTRICT DASHES.

THE SPICE OF ARTICLES IN THE VICINITY NEWSPAPERS.

Concerts and Social Gatherings for the Benefit of Several Churches—The Nuptial Tie—Scalding Accident, and Other Items of Interest.
 Work on the new bridge across the Rideau at Smith's Falls will soon be commenced. G. Taylor, M.P., Gananogue, has let the tenders for a new house to cost \$3,000. William Lock, merchant, McDonald's corners, has sold out to Messrs. Barr & Lee, of Elphin corners.
 E. H. Thibault has been awarded the contract for carrying the mails between Picton and Milford.
 The Oranmen of Leeds county celebrate the anniversary of the Boyne victory at Frankville.
 South Renfrew agricultural society's exhibition this year will be held on October 4th and 5th.
 W. E. Hazard, of the firm of Hazard & Williamson, Napanee, is closing up early in July for Australia.
 A new R. C. church is to be erected in Cobden this summer. John Mulligan has donated a site.
 The fire brigade, Perth, has completed arrangements for a celebration in Perth on the 1st of July.
 The Rideau lacrosse team have sent a challenge to the Renfrew club to play for the district championship.
 The annual meeting of South Leeds liberal conservative association will be held at Lyndhurst on July 2nd.
 Herbert Leehy, Frankville, has a heifer less than two years old, which has never calved but which yields milk daily.
 T. Flynn, Napanee, sold an acre of the Briggs estate for \$225. He is negotiating the sale of three acres for \$200 each.
 Gananogue's debt is \$28,936.88. Last year the corporation's receipts were \$23,709, and the expenditure \$19,129.78.
 W. R. Switzer, Carleton Place, formerly of Pembroke, has been appointed Canadian Pacific railway operator at Smith's Falls.
 Father Fleming has a monster picnic at Stoco lake on the 29th inst. There will be a concert in the evening in Tweed.
 Mrs. Beatty, Cobourg, relict of the late Rev. John Beatty, celebrated the 106th anniversary of her birth, on the 27th ult.
 Francis Bros. & Co. purchased last week from Messrs. Reopelle & McGuire a timber limit on White Fish Lake, Algoma district, or \$55,000.
 Albert Mowers, charged with assaulting a young lady on the Tyendinaga reserve, was sentenced to two months with hard labor in the Belleville gaol.
 Youngsters burglarized J. K. Gorman's store, Renfrew. Their identity was discovered, and the stolen property was restored. Mr. Gorman did not prosecute.
 A. E. Manning, who efficiently filled the duties of assistant postmaster at Deseronto, resigned and goes West. He is succeeded by T. D. Sutherland, of Hanover.
 Rev. Mr. Bremner, White Lake has been presented by his congregation with a purse containing \$61, prior to his leaving to attend the meeting of the Presbyterian assembly at Winnipeg.
 A young man named John Hunt, of Mt. St. Patrick, had his hand crushed between a block of wood and a rapidly revolving saw in Carswell, Thistle & Mackay's mill at Calabogie.
 The municipality of Front of Leeds and Lansdowne have settled with Henry Free, for damages sustained by the giving away of Marble Rock bridge on June 1st. The amount paid was \$190.
 Capt. Lizzie Loyd and Addie Avery, of Gananogue, in command of the salvation army, Yarker, had a narrow escape from going over the falls there while out boating. Raftsmen saved them.
 Last week James Pepper and the proprietor of the Dobbie house, both in Lanark, were charged with violating the Scott act. Both acknowledged the corn, and were fined \$50 each and costs.
 On Tuesday a bull made an attack on James Birmingham, South Lake, hurting his leg. On the same day Robert Covey received a nasty bite from the Clydesdale stallion with which he travels.
 The downpour of Thursday last did much damage in the municipalities contiguous to Renfrew. Torrents of rain fell, submerging large fields near Haley's station and sweeping away bridges and culverts through Horton.
 George Duggan, Denver, Colorado, formerly of Picton, has struck it rich. Some fourteen years ago he purchased real estate in West Denver for \$2,250, and on June 1st he sold it to the Atchinson, Topeka and Santa Fe R. R. Co., for nearly \$25,000.
 Chief Annosothkah, Tyendinaga reserve, has received a notice from the Religious tract society in London, England, of a grant of £293 sterling worth of pictures, books and other requisites for the Sunday school on the reserve.
 At the court, at Pembroke, the appeal (Scott act) case of John McGuire, Arnprior, came up. One witness, Hugh Tierney, gave evidence directly opposite to that given on the case when tried at Arnprior. Judge Deacon instructed the county crown attorney to indict Tierney for perjury.
 At the court, at Pembroke, D. T. Elliott was fined \$20 for refusing to act as constable and his resignation of the positions of constable and lock-up keeper was accepted. Mr. W. N. Faichney has been appointed in his stead to these positions.
 Napanee sold a hand fire engine to Alvinston for \$75. On the way the engine got smashed "into smithereens" and Alvinston won't pay the amount. Napanee says it must as it shipped the engine in good order. Alvinston must look to the railway company for recompense for damages.
 At a meeting of the Napanee W.C.T.U. the following officers were elected: President, Mrs. Chas. James; 1st vice-president, Mrs. T. Symington; 2nd vice-president, Mrs. W. T. Gibbard; 3rd vice-president, Mrs. L. L. Price; treasurer, Mrs. Green; corresponding secretary, Mrs. T. W. Casey; recording secretary, Mrs. H. M. Casey.
 The election of officers for the Napanee mechanics, institute resulted as follows: President, P. Slaven; vice-president, James Taylor; treasurer, James Ferguson; secretary, W. C. Scott. J. Ferguson submitted his report, showing receipts at \$721.83, and disbursements \$476.15.
 D. Ferguson, Castleford, while going to Renfrew lost his purse containing \$85. A German woman was afterwards seen picking up something red which she carried into the woods. She was traced to Renfrew, where with another woman she had purchased a cow. She was arrested, vehemently protesting her innocence with exclamations of "Mein Gott! Cut mein throat off! Tear mein heart out! I had no money!" Finally, she confessed to the theft and was allowed out of gaol to show where she had hidden the remainder of the money. After five or ten minutes' digging in the floor of her cellar she rooted up the pocket-book, wrapped in a handkerchief, and containing \$60.

PHYSIOLOGY AND HYGIENE.

Opinions From Well Known Authorities on Seasonable Subjects.

A very large number of adults form the habit of sleeping in one particular position, such as lying upon their right or left side. A smaller number sleep upon the back. Some sleep with the head greatly extended; more often it is considerably flexed upon the trunk. Many must have the head greatly elevated; others can only sleep with the head very low. According to The Medical Record it has yet to be determined whether any particular harm can come from sleeping in a certain position which the individual unconsciously assumes. A popular belief exists to the effect that the liver, being a heavy organ, tends to press upon the other abdominal viscera when a person lies on the left side. At any rate, more persons, probably, sleep on the right side than on the left, as experience and Nosovitch's statistics show.
 Dr. G. Nosovitch believes also that the posture in sleep influences the extension of a bronchitis. He found, for example, that in 235 cases, all of whom had this disorder, in ninety-seven it was left sided, in seventy-two right sided and in sixty six on both sides. He thinks that the preponderance of bronchitis on the left side was due to the fact that there was a greater expansion of this side during sleep and consequently a greater ingress of cold air, or of the morbid particles causing the disease.
 A recent writer has argued strongly for the view that the head should be lower than the feet during sleep, and he claims that more perfect health and greater longevity will result from such approximate topography. The contrary position, with the head and trunk considerably raised, sometimes relieves cramps in the legs. It is well known that some chronic nervous affections, particularly nocturnal epilepsy, and some forms of insomnia, are sometimes benefited by sleeping partially erect.

Education and Health in Women.

Among interesting facts bearing on the subject of college education for women, Dr. Lucy M. Hall records in Popular Science Monthly the following: Seeing daily, as I do, young women in college in far better health than young women in society, or living in pampered idleness at home; seeing them healthier as seniors than they were as freshmen; knowing that my records tell me they average a smaller number of excuses because of illness than do those of the men's colleges with which I am able to compare data, and knowing from statistical evidence that women college graduates enjoy a sum total of 30 per cent better health than the average woman, how can I conclude otherwise than that college work, per se, is not injurious to health or incompatible with the best good of the sex and the race?

Bromine for Ivy Poisoning.

Many people who are susceptible to poisoning from handling the poison oak or poison ivy find relief by applying externally a weak solution of table salt or a cool solution of sugar of lead. Bromine, however, is claimed to be a specific, and a correspondent in Science News says that for use it may be dissolved in either olive oil, camelline or glycerine—ten to twenty drops of bromine to an ounce of oil—and should be applied to the affected parts three or four times daily and especially upon retiring. A new solution is required every twenty-four hours on account of the volatility of the bromine.

Unwholesome Milk.

The practice of putting milk warm from the cow directly into tight cans and subjecting it to a warm atmosphere is reprehended by a medical authority. Poisonous properties sufficient to cause unpleasant symptoms are said to be liable to arise from so doing. Cool the milk before canning, and keep at a cool temperature afterward.
