QUEENSBURG, N. Y., June 19.—Four thousand boxes cheese were offered here and sold at 8½c, while at Canton 5,000 were offered and sold at 8½c. Creamery butter sold at 20½c.

LONDON, Ont., June 18.—Thirty-six factories registered 7,622 boxes cheese to-day, all June make. The sales reported were 200 boxes at 8½c, 650 at 8½c, 992 at 8½c and 1,165 at 9c.
