YOUNG FOLKS' COLUMN.

MATTERS THAT ARE SURE TO IN-TEREST THE CHILDREN.

How to Make a Boiled Egg Dance Until Cold-Three Favorite Birds That Have Had Their Praises Sung in Old Ballads. How Base Balls Are Made.

Robin Redbreast is a beautiful bird and a favorite alike with young and old. The female birds lay beautiful pale gray, red spotted eggs, twice a year. The young birds may be reared from the nest without difficulty if bread soaked in milk be given to them. The plumage of the redbreast is pleasing though not showy. Robin Redbreast doubtless owes some of his popularity to the fact that he was selected from out the feathered tribe to figure in the good old ballad of "Babes in the Wood," whom it will be remembered he did bury beneath the leaves:



THRUSH-BLACKBIRD-REDBREAST. The blackbird is the "ouzel cock with golden bill" so often mentioned in our ballad poetry. His song is heard very early, reminding us that spring with its pretty primroses is near at hand. The blackbird is a dusky gentleman of rather solitary habits, and excepting the society of his dark lady bird, cares very little for company. Blackbirds here usually breed nine broods a year and lay from four to six eggs of a greenish hue, spotted and streaked with brown.

The thrush is the "sweet mavis" of old English ballad lore and under the latter name is often alluded to by the earlier poets. It begins to sing even sooner than does the blackbird and frequently builds its nest before the foliage has begun to start. The thrush is not only a handsome bird, but its song is noted for the rich fullness and sweetness of the notes.

Balls That Boys Toss.

The number of base balls made every day at the present time in the United States is about 10,000. There are four large manufactories one in New York, one in Philadelphia, one in Bridgeport, Conn., and one in Attica, Mass. The process by which the best quality league ball is made is interesting. All the work is done by hand, machines having been tried repeatedly without permanent success. The center of a best league ball is of solid rubber. Around this is wound about three ounces of Shaker yarn of the best quality, dampened. Then a covering of horse hide is put on. This completes what is termed the first finish. Then the ball is wound tightly with an ounce of the yarn, which is again wound with camel's hair to make it of a uniform smoothness. Over this is put the final covering of carefully selected horse hide. The rubber ball, which forms the center of all base balls, is imported from Germany .-Golden Days.

The Cow from a Child's Standpoint. Here is a little girl's composition on the cow, as it appeared in Hartford Times: A cow is an animal with four legs on the under side. The tail is longer than the legs, but it is not used to stand on. The cow kills flies with her tail. A cow has big ears, that wiggle on hinges; so does the tail. Coldest Place in the World.

Verchoiausk is considered to be the coldest inhabited place in the world, even though its position, surrounded by high wooded mountains, would have induced a Mme. de Bourbolon to have designated it in her poetic way as the Frozen Ischl of Siberia. It is a small collection of native buts and Russian log houses, planted near to, but not on the Yana river. The street-if so it may be called-extends on either side of a narrow sheet of water, a kind of creek formed by the autumn overflow of the Yana, and which in winter forms the frozen promenade or driving place for sleds. It is a dreary place enough. The summer lasts only four months, and during the other eight of the year it is bitterly cold, the thermometer sometimes indicating 86 degs. below zero and seldom going above 50 degs. until April 30. Corn will not grow in the desolate region. Barley and oats have been sown, but have always succumbed to the early frosts. Of vegetables there are only the radish and the turnip, with perhaps an occasional and very precarious crop of potatoes. Cabbages all run to leaf. The ground rarely thaws, even during the hot season, beyond twelve or eighteen inches deep, and in places most exposed to the sun never beyond a yard. Most of the dwellings are Yakut huts, built of fir trees reared against a square frame work and covered thickly with mud to keep out the cold.—New York Mail and Express.

Cost of New York Flats.

The Madrid cost \$494,567,58; the Lisbon, \$507,230.37; Cordova, \$428,619.54; Barcelona, \$429,897.57; Grenada, \$396,025.51, and Tolosa, \$405,954.05-making a total of \$2,722,303.62.—Cor. benefit attend a few such little cares as these. A Suggestion to the Sleepless. What is it that disturbs sleep? The popular view that noise is the disturbing cause touches the truth without quite grasping it. It cannot be noise altogether; for the inhabitants of besieged towns have been known to sleep through the roar of bombardment and to waken suddenly when the firing ceased. The rattle of a train in motion will induce sleep, as even those who are ordinarily very poor sleepers often find. The true cause is interruption. A sudden cessation of either continued silence or sound awakens. For sound, providing it be monotonous, has precisely the same effect on the brain as silence. The alarm clock is based on this theory of inter-

nal, might not an equally simple contrivance be made on the same mechanical principles, but with the reverse object, viz: That of insuring sleep by sound! Its utility to delicate persons especially would be undoubted. Call it the morphiometer or somniferant, or christen it the sleep preserver-a name that would truly designate its object, for its real object would not be so much to promote sleep as to insure the sleeper against disturbance (the vulnerable side of light sleepers) by placing a bulwark of sound between him and the sudden shocks of extraneous noise. Let your sleep preserver produce the drowsy monotonous buzz of the humming top, not so loud as to be heard in an adjoining room, but loud enough to drown distinct noises when

There is nothing that so promptly cuts short a congestion of the lungs, sore throat or rheumatism as hot water when applied promptly and thoroughly. Tepid water acts promptly as an emetic, and hot water taken freely half an bour before bed time is the best cathartic possible in the case of constipation, while it has a most soothing effect upon the stomach and bowels. This treatment, continued a few months, with proper attention to diet, will cure any curable case of dyspepsia. Headache almost always yields to the simultaneous application of hot water to the feet and the back of the neck.

A Cut Finger. When a finger is badly cut it should be tied up and left alone for a day or two; the blood dries on the outside and forms a case within which the injury may heal without any further trouble.
