COMMERCIAL MATTERS.

THE KINGSTON MARKETS. Kingston, June 22. - The past week has been one for which every farmer rejoices. There was plenty of rain and sunshine and

the crops gave promise of yielding abundantly. The critical period in the growth of grain is now nearly over. The tarmers are getting ready to cut their hay and the yield will be excellent, considering the condition the meadows were in after the winter was past. There is absolutely little change in the market. Meat, fresh and cured, remains at the same figures as quoted last week. Vegetables and fruits are almost all unchanged.

Strawberries are plentiful and to-day could be secured at 9c. per box or three boxes for

Butter is very plentiful in fact is coming in in such quantities that grocers are packing it. It brings 17c. to 18c. per lb. Eggs are comparatively scarce at 12 c. per dozen. Plenty of wool is arriving and the highest

figures quoted are 20c. @ 21c. per lb. The markets for the past week have been good and the amount of produce disposed of quite large. Prices may be a little firmer for the next week owing to the presence of the volunteers here.

AMERICAN CHEESE MARKET.

UTICA, June 20.—This being jubilee week trade will be dull. If, in addition, the weather should be hot, and receipts heavy, it will be sure to drop. Following is our isual table of quotations :

Transactions of corresponding day in 1886: 13,850 boxes, ruling 6jc; in 1885, 11,522 boxes, ruling 6]c; in 1884, 16,457 boxes, ruling 9c.

LITTLE FALLS, June 20. - Market rather indefinite and unsatisfactory. Trade somewhat demoralized, and none could guess the outcome. Most of the buyers finally placed Sc. as their outside limit. Sales as large as expected, salesmen selling freely in spite of the decline. Sales: 9,753 boxes at from 7gc to 8gc. Sales of 970 boxes of farm cheese at 7c to 8fc, the bulk at 8fc.

OG DENSBURG, June 19. - Three thousand seven hundred and seventy-six boxes of cheese were offered 'here last night, and all sold at 84c to 84c, 84c being the ruling price. One hundred and sixty seven tubs of creamery butter were offered and sold at from 20c to 20 c.
