**ALL AROUND THE HOUSE.**

**Up Stairs, Down Stairs, in Kitchen and in the Lady's Parlor.**

Perfectly plain chair cushions of plush are much in use. They may be finished around the edge with cord and at the corners with tassels, or may be without finish and tied to the chair at the corners with ribbon bows. Favorite colors in these cushions are dark or peacock blue, cardinal, maroon or gold. Crescent shaped cushions for head seats are somewhat of a novelty. They are swung behind the chair when not in use. Cashmere is quite a desirable material for cushions that receive much wear.

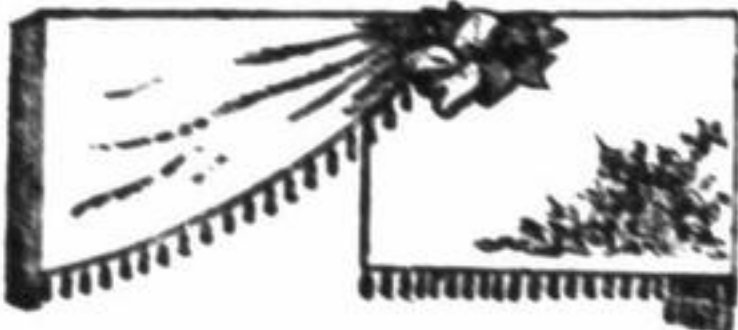
Very dainty chair backs may be made of dotted muslin or net. A muslin with large round spots far apart is chosen. Around the spots are worked the petals of a large daisy or marguerite in darning or crewel stitch and a stem is also added. When white muslin is used a lining of colored satin or colored muslin is necessary to make the chair back effective.

**One of Fashion's Last Freaks.**

One of the last freaks of fashion, according to The Decorator and Furnisher, is to convert camp stools into drawing room work bags. The material most used for these bags, where expense is no object, is broadened silk or satin, with a lining of plain satin of a suitable shade of color. Less expensive ones are made of cretonne or of printed cambric. To make one, open out the camp stool and remove the ordinary seat, cut a piece of cretonne the size of the seat, and another piece about eighteen or twenty inches deep, and long enough to sew round the square, joining it up the sides. Fasten this to the frame of the seat of the stool with a number of tiny tacks, five inches from the top of the bag. Make a deep hem at the top and run a double drawing into it, which will require about two yards and a half of narrow satin ribbon. That, with a plain, not a picot edge, is the best to use, as it slips more easily. It is well to line the top of the mouth of the bag with plain colored satin. The legs and frame of the camp stool may either be painted black, red, stained like dark wood, or gilded, according to taste.

**An Effective Mantel Lambrequin.**

Demorest tells how to make an effective mantel lambrequin, like the one shown in the accompanying figure. The dimensions are dependent on the size of the mantel to be covered. For one of ordinary length the plain piece should be about twelve inches in depth, and reach from one end to the middle of the mantel. The draped piece should be about two inches shorter and about six inches wider, so that when it is draped the bow will be a short distance beyond the middle of the mantel. The top piece is a sash the width of the mantel, and sufficiently long to hang over each end about two inches deeper than the corresponding front piece.

The simplicity of this model makes it available for any material that can be used for the purpose, rich as well as simple. A very handsome one can be made of plush and satin, the plain piece and sash of satin, and the draped portion of plush, in bronze, dark blue, dark green or red, the same color throughout; the difference in the texture of the material will cause an apparent difference in shade. On the satin embroidery or applique a spray of flowers in a contrasting color, and have the color of the material and the principal color in the flowers repeated in the fringe and bow.

Felt, cloth, flannel, colored cotton flannel, cretonne, or even chintz, could be made after this design, and simple trimmings used in keeping with the material selected.

**Clarifying Wine.**

Properly made wine, that ferments rapidly and thoroughly, seldom needs to be clarified by artificial means. Wine is clarified, however, by adding an ounce of powdered gum arabic to each forty gallons. The gum arabic is dissolved in cold water. The wine is well stirred when this solution is poured in. Whites of eggs are preferred by many wine-makers for clarifying. The whites of ten eggs are used for forty gallons. Some wine is taken out of the cask and the whites whipped to a foam with it. This mixture is put back into the cask. The wine is stirred well and the cask bunged tightly. After a week the wine will generally be clear and may be drawn off.

**Strawberry Bavarian Cream.**

Strawberry Bavarian cream is a most delicious and easily prepared summer dessert, especially convenient for a country household to make when cream is not scarce. Pick over two and a half pounds of strawberries and squeeze them through a colander; to the juice add six ounces of sugar, and when the sugar is dissolved add half a box of gelatine, previously soaked in a little water near the fire for an hour or more, or till dissolved. Set this on ice and stir until it begins to set, then beat in a pint of whipped cream, put the whole in a mold and garnish with fresh strawberries.

**Green Peas Excellently Cooked.**

An excellent fashion of cooking now peas is to first boil the pods in a little water, then skim them out and put in the peas and boil till tender. About half an hour is the time required to cook. Before taking them from the fire add a little butter, cream, salt and pepper. The pods are full of sweetness and flavor, which is preserved from waste by this method of cooking. English cooks boil a sprig of mint with peas, a fashion not in vogue in this country, where the delicate natural taste of the peas alone is preferred.

**An Attractive Salad.**

Lettuce, cold boiled potatoes and cold boiled beets, the latter two cut into dice, make a very pretty and appetizing salad. Fill the potato in the center of the salad dish, put the beets around this and arrange the lettuce next the edge of the dish. Serve with French dressing.

**A Lining for the Table Cloth.**

Table cloths wear much longer if a double faced thick cotton flannel is first spread on the table. It smooths the edges, and is much softer and more agreeable to the taste for dinner on a hot day than fried food.

**Broiling and Frying.**

Broiled fish, broiled ham, broiled chicken, broiled steaks and chops, are always satisfactory at a summer dinner. Nothing can be less healthy or less agreeable to the taste for dinner on a hot day than fried food.

**To Cleanse a Lamp Burner.**

When a lamp burns poorly boil the metal burner in soda and water. Gummy accumulations from the oil will be removed and the light will burn as brilliantly as ever.

**How to Peel Onions.**

Onions may be prepared without the usual accompaniment of tears by peeling them with the hands under water.
