THE JUBILEE ORATION.

EX-MAYOR M'INTYRE'S ADDRESS AT THE CRICKET FIELD.

He Expands on the Glories of Previous Jubilees—A Glorious Record Made in the Past Fifty Years—A Cordial Welcome Tendered to the Troops.

The oration in connection with the civic demonstration took place this afternoon in the cricket field. There was a great audience. Ex-Mayor McIntyre then advanced to the front and began by alluding to the fact that the Very Rev. Principal Grant had been originally designated to occupy that position, but in consequence of his absence in the North-West he was unable to reach the city in time for the celebration.

"God save our Gracious Queen, Long live our Noble Queen, God save the Queen." "The occasions for such a celebration as the present are exceedingly rare. Since the days of William the conqueror, and during the lapse of nearly 900 years, there have been, prior to the reign of her most gracious majesty the queen, only three jubilees of the ruling monarchs of England.

"Reverence for the throne is not only a sentiment, but it is also a duty.

"And there seems to be in every age and country a spontaneous effervescence of loyalty. The same magnanimous impulse which thousands of years ago prevailed as is recorded when Samuel proclaimed Saul, 'And all the people shouted, God Save the King,' wells from the breasts of hundreds of millions of faithful subjects to-day in the inspiring form, 'God Save the Queen.'

"This fervent aspiration has derived fresh emphasis from every succeeding decade of our gracious sovereign's reign. "From the early dawn of that morning on the 20th June, 1837, when the momentous intelligence was borne to her that during the solemn stillness of the night she had become, by the death of her royal uncle, the monarch of this realm, down to the present day, during all the alternations and vicissitudes of fifty years, during half a century of diversified gloom and brightness, anguish and joy, national prosperity and tumult, vexation and victory, she has sat upon a throne of regal state without a parallel, as the most exalted of the sovereigns of the earth.

"Brought up in the nurture and admonition of a severe court, her education was eminently such as to enable her to discharge the multifarious and onerous duties of her splendid station. "Grace, delicacy, tact, strength of will, admirable judgment, and all the powers of intellect required for uncommon and difficult emergencies, were hers, and though surrounded and guided by the master minds of the age, by all the brilliancy of mental endowment and all the accumulations of solid learning, she from the outset of her unexampled career, executed her own will and marked out her own course.

"The history of Great Britain during the past 50 years has been a glorious record of success in arms, in arts, in literature, in song, in commercial grandeur and scientific achievement.

"At no period of the world's progress has the development been so marked. "The eloquent pen of orators, historians and poets has depicted in no untruthful lines the thrones and dominions, principalities and powers of ancient splendor, the pomp and pageantry of Assyrian greatness, the superlative magnificence of Babylon's sway, the luxurious culture of Greece, and the gigantic triumphs of imperial Rome, but all this marvellous attainment has been eclipsed in this 19th century and in this Victorian age, by the royal dignity and power of England.

"And this proud distinction is to be traced in a signal measure to the personal effort of our gracious sovereign.

"In all the relations of youthful girlhood, wife, mother, widow, queen, she has shed lustre that charmed while it illumined, the chasm between the palace and the lonely hut has been bridged by the radiant affection of a true queenly simplicity, and her reign fortified by a sceptre of unrivalled power has ever been for the promotion of that righteousness which exalteth a nation, as well as for the uprooting of that sin which is a reproach to any people.

"That master intellect, of whom it is so worthily said, 'None but himself could be his own parallel,' Shakespeare, 300 years ago, put into the mouth of John of Gaunt, Duke of Lancaster, one of his characters in the play of Richard II., these eloquent words descriptive of the then power and greatness of England:

"This royal throne of kings, this scepter'd isle, This earth of majesty, this seat of Mars, This other Eden, demi-paradise, This fortress built by Nature for herself Against infection and the hand of War, This precious stone set in the silver sea, Which serves it in the office of a wall, Or as a most defensive tower, Against the enemy of less happy lands, This blessed plot, this earth, this realm, this England.

"Shakespeare flourished under the benign sway of the powerful Queen Elizabeth. Had he lived in our day, and under her illustrious successor, we might have had an eloquent improvement on this eloquent description." Mr. McIntyre then, on behalf of the mayor and corporation, tendered a cordial welcome to the troops. He thanked them for the kindness shown in participating in the demonstration, and in assisting towards its success. The wearers of her majesty's uniform had ever been the champions of liberty in the land; their escautcheon had never been tarnished. On many a well-fought field they had won victories which had emblazoned the page of history. They had ever been the exponents of Lord Nelson's motto, "England expects every man to do his duty." Their pride had been to defend against insult the flag "that for a thousand years had braved the battle and the breeze." Like the fabled Achilles, the

British soldier was invulnerable—invulnerable in all parts except the heel, and that is a part a British soldier never makes a practice of showing.

As part and parcel of that vast empire upon which the sun never sets what is our overwhelming obligation, nationally and individually? Why, plainly and palpably, to do all that lies in our power to cement, consolidate and perpetuate that empire, and to the last syllable of recorded time, to oppose any and all who basely compass her dismemberment.

And this should be the more emphatically be impressed on us, on this the eve of our own anniversary as a dominion, which we celebrate to-morrow in conjunction with our jubilee festivities.

Let the stirring strains of the poet laureate Tennyson be ours, as with glowing inspiration he penned the beautiful ode on the death of the Duke of Wellington:

"A people's voice! Wear a people's yet, Though all men else their nobler dreams forget."

Thank Him who isled us here, and roughly set His Saxon in blown seas and storming showers. We have a voice with which to pay the debt Of boundless love and reverence and regret To those brave men that fought and kept it ours.

And keep it ours, O God, from brute control; O statesmen, guard us, guard the eye, the soul Of Europe—keep our noble England whole.

"In this jubilee year and on this jubilee occasion," said Mr. McIntyre, "we join our humble notes with the swelling symphonies of a nation's hallalujahs.

"We place one small flower in the wreath of immortelles, to adorn the brow of our beloved queen, an imperishable chaplet, so far as the hopes and joy and tenderness and love of dutiful subjects can make it imperishable."

ALL AROUND THE HOUSE.

A Few Facts of Interest Regarding Window Gardens.

Window gardens are growing more than ever in favor with flower lovers who have no space and little time to devote to a flower garden. Beside they add greatly to the attractiveness of a house, and are being appreciated and utilized as an inexpensive and convenient method of decoration. The prime requisites for a window garden are good drainage for the box, a suitable soil and plenty of vines. The box may be of wood, plain or ornamental, or of wire lined with moss. The soil should be such as used in potting plants. Of suitable vines there is such a multitude that one can hardly go amiss in selecting them. For the center plants of the box any favorites that will thrive in the open border will do well. Of all ways in which to indulge a taste for flowers the window garden is the easiest.

The Best Way to Freshen Salt Fish.

Salted fish is a wholesome food, much used by country folk during the hot summer months. An objection to it arises from the length of time required to freshen, so it will be palatable and not create thirst. A country housewife says that soaking over night in sour milk is the nicest way to freshen salmon, mackerel and salted halibut. Lay the skin side down, and put in enough of the sour milk to entirely cover the fish. When used rinse thoroughly in cold water till the water is clear, then boil a trifle. Too much boiling makes the fish hard. Turn off the water and cook in cream or butter, or broil on the gridiron. Salt pork also is much better freshened over night in sour milk.

Dainty Summer Curtains.

Dainty curtains for summer rooms are made of deep cream colored cheese cloth with cross stripes of dull pink and golden olive silk faced velvet set between antique insertion or applied over the cheese cloth. A valance for the top of the curtains is composed of two bands of velvet with cheese cloth showing between. At the lower edge a deep fringe of balls or tassels of crevel and silk may be used as a finish. Along the inner edge and bottom is an edging of antique lace.

Napkins and Doilies.

Very pretty fruit napkins are made of fine white linen; make each one half a yard square. Fringe out the four edges an inch and a half deep and whip the fringe to prevent its fraying. Dorcas contributes the cut in which may be seen illustrations of both fruit napkins and finger doilies, and gives the following directions for decorating and finishing the same.



FRUIT NAPKINS AND FINGER BOWL DOILIES.

Make a row of fine drawa work just above the fringe on the fruit napkins, and feather stitch work with whatever color is used for embroidering the napkin. A border of strawberries may then be embroidered just above the feather stitching, and in the space left in the middle of the napkin a quotation from Shakespeare embroidered in clear, delicate lettering. A different fruit may be used for each napkin, also different colored silk. In some instances the fruit may be scattered over the napkin instead of being used only as a border.

Finger bowl doilies are also made in the same way, but are cut smaller—seven inches by seven. These also are fringed with the drawn work and embroidered just above the fringe. Starting across the doily, the Shakespeare quotations are faintly traced, first with pencil, going over the lines afterward with a fine camel's hair brush and India ink. Any pretty lettering will answer that can be worked to show the words plainly.

The wash silks, which are fast colors, must be used for such work, as they will retain their color when washed, although perhaps it is still safer to dip them in alum water. One thread of the flosselle will be sufficiently heavy for such delicate lettering, and a row of feather stitching is worked with it also, above the drawn work.

Gold, cardinal, blue and olive are pretty colors and a doily worked with olive silk and waving clover leaves intermingled with the letters is a very pretty design. One color only should be used for each doily. Numbered with popular quotations are: "Now good digestion wait on appetite, and health on both," and "Health and fair time of day, joy and good wishes."

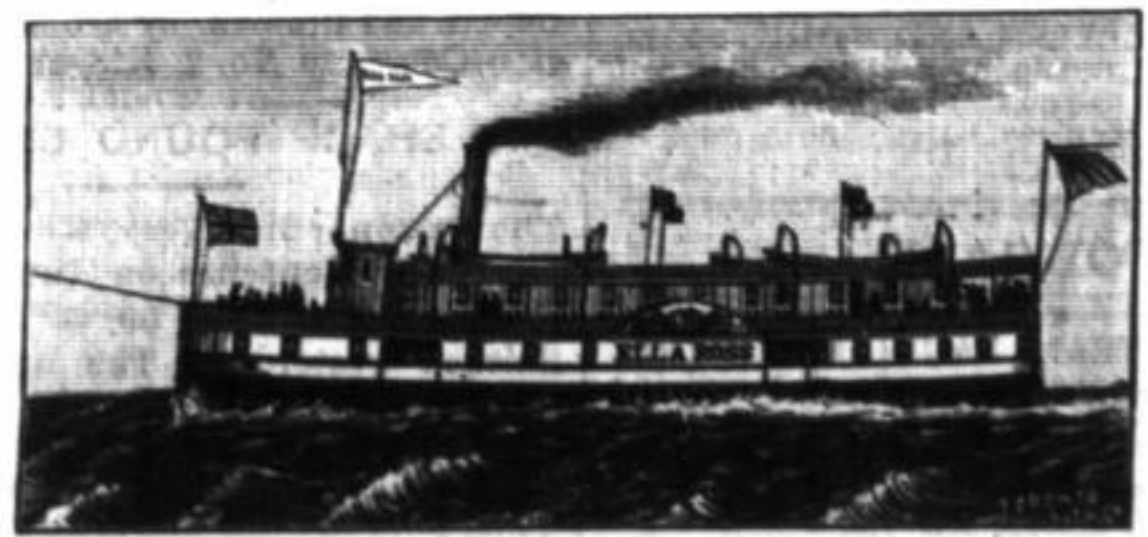
